REPORT OF THE PASTOR

Reflections from Russ - Journeys

One of the central characteristics of the Biblical stories is that of journey, or being on a journey. Abraham was told to leave the land of his ancestors and go where God would show him. Moses journeyed with the Israelites for forty years through the wilderness. The wise men journeyed to Bethlehem following a star, returning by a different way. Mary, Joseph, and Jesus had to flee Bethlehem shortly after the birth to avoid Herod's murderous rage. The disciples were invited to follow Jesus on his travels. Even the earliest gatherings of believers were known as people of the way. Although many of these eventually arrived at a destination, their significant learning and growth took place on their journeys.

In so many ways the whole Christian life is a journey, a journey into a deeper faith, greater maturity, more courageous discipleship. As a congregation we too journey out to meet new needs and respond to fresh opportunities. Part of our work this past year was to pause, take a deep breath, and look around at who we are, who are our neighbors, and what is God calling us to be and do in this particular place.

Last spring we completed several surveys and demographic studies, wrote the mission study over the summer, and received approval from the session and presbytery to elect a pastor nominating committee (PNC) this fall. This committee has begun meeting to complete the church information form (CIF – get used to the acronyms!), the document which will go online and be available to interested candidates across the nation. By the spring the committee should begin to receive and review the resumes of pastors seeking to be candidates for the position of pastor here.

Alongside all of this, the busy life of a congregation and the normal responsibilities of a pastor continue. I have performed 8 baptisms, met with and received 4 new members, celebrated 2 weddings, and led 4 funerals or memorial services. (See the complete list, with names, on the following pages.) I remain active in the presbytery by serving on the committee on ministry and leading the joint task force of the Korean Presbyterian Church of Westchester and the Presbyterian Church of New Rochelle.

Amid all the great and small headlines, the seen and unseen miracles all around us, we journey on, looking not for a destination, but only for those signs of where our God is leading us. Let me close with that benediction many of you have asked about:

May the spirit bless you with discomfort at easy answers, half-truths, and superficial relationships, so that you will live deep in your heart.

May the spirit bless you with anger at injustice and oppression, and exploitation of people and the earth, so that you will work for justice, equity, and peace.

May the spirit bless you with tears to shed for those who suffer, so that you will reach out your hand to comfort them.

And may the spirit bless you with foolishness to think that you can make a difference in the world, so you will do the things which others say cannot be done. Amen.

Our Dreams

During this past year, the commission dreamed that our congregation might begin to study the Biblical traditions that inform our imperative to care for our world and its inhabitants and to look more deeply at the issues that surround environmental justice and stewardship of our earth. Cooperating with the Worship, Education and the Congregational Life commissions, we planned and offered a special environmental worship service and then challenged the congregation to pledge to make some changes in daily practices. We learned that many of us in this congregation were already practicing many of these environmentally pro active things. The Session passed a motion challenging all commissions to consider the environmental impact in their decisions and to begin to take actions that will move our church to become more of a "green" church.

The Mission Commission discussed the growing issue of hunger in our world and in our local community. We decided to hold up to the congregation as the focus of our Peace and Justice service, some of the ongoing and long standing programs and projects that members of our church are involved with, that work to address hunger in our region. Each of the programs is also supported by our dollars. These include our Food Pantry, the Noontime Meal Program, the Jan Peek House and CHOP, Food Bank and the Midnight Run. Squeegee Mills coordinated together with the Education, Worship and Congregational Life Commissions, a wonderful worship service featuring farmer/pastor, David Frost, followed by a meal prepared using the recipe and ingredients of the meal served each month to the clients of the Noontime Meal at the Salvation Army in Peekskill. For several weeks, issues of food, agriculture, CSA (community supported agriculture) and hunger were the focus of our adult education hour.

This year, our international mission focus was brought to us in a presentation to the commission by Andrew Winget who had become aware of an organization, Student Movement for Real Change and one of their work projects, The Kenya Water Project. The purpose of this project is to bring clean drinking water via a pipeline and cistern system into a remote area of Kenya. That project is well underway and benefiting from contributions that came through a portion of our Easter Offering. Although Andrew's ambitious goal to complete a hike of the Appalachian Trail was ended abruptly due to an injury, the funds generated through interest in this effort have gone directly to the work on that water pipeline.

God Uses Your Gifts

It has often been suggested that the conscience and focus of a congregation can be best understood by examining the mission budget. This congregation has been clear about the importance of mission and outreach to the life and heart of this church. Despite some very hard times and very difficult decisions, we have continued to uphold that value and that focus, but with some difficult budgetary changes.

Our Commission has continued to deliberate mindfully and prayerfully about how we can do mission in our community and the world. Sadly, during this past year we were faced with a very difficult decision about how to balance the budget without losing our way as a mission focused church. Our decisions about giving had to reflect the financial realities and changes within our congregation. After much prayer and long discussion, it became necessary for this commission to recommend that a reduction be made in our total contribution to the larger church. After a significant reduction of \$12,000, our congregation budgeted \$33,160 to the General Mission of the Presbyterian Church USA, the Synod of the Northeast and the Presbytery of the Hudson River, sent monthly for the programs the larger church supports. (www.pcusa.org) In addition, we dispersed over \$46,009 to organizations and programs we support.

We also open our doors to organizations that provide helpful and healing ministries to members of our community. More than 3,000 people walk through our doors each week.

Special Mention

Alternative Giving Market for Heifer International

In November, our church school held our third Annual Alternative Giving Market for Heifer International. The purpose was to raise money by selling shares of Heifer Animals and to support Mission Commission (continued)

foreign communities by selling fair trade products such as coffees and teas and crafts from Africa and South America, and items handmade by our children. We netted \$650 for Heifer International. In addition

to raising money, we tried to raise awareness of Christmas materialism—an alternative way to shop <u>and</u> help others.

Amnesty International.

Thanks to the continuing leadership of Carol Myers we have an active participation and commitment to the social witness of Amnesty International. Through financial support and monthly letter writing initiatives, we lend our voices in support of victims of conscience and victims of human rights abuse who are brought to our attention by A.I. as "urgent action" cases in need of immediate vocal support.

Children's Center at Bedford Prison

Heidi Haring continues as our liaison to this program. Toys were purchased and donated by Church School children so that incarcerated mothers could give them as Christmas gifts to their children.

C.H.O.P., Inc.

This is an umbrella organization that oversees the Jan Peek Shelter in Peekskill and a breakfast program, The Sunny Donut, also in Peekskill. In addition to financial support members of our congregation prepare a dinner on the 4th Saturday of each month. Residents and staff are touched by the generosity of food an friendship extended to them. The shelter houses 19 single adult men and women. The shelter has also recently reinstituted a food pantry in order to help to address the incredible increase in hunger in the Peekskill area. The Sunny Donut serves breakfast Monday-Friday to people of all ages at the Salvation Army site. Michael Deemer. John Chessa and Lynda Spring serve on the Board of directors and Michael is treasurer.

Midnight Run

This program takes food, clothing, and blankets to and human interaction with the homeless folk of New York City. Youth runs and an adult run were generously supported by this congregation. A Midnight Run happens because of a community of efforts and contributions of time, energy and things. Thanks to the clothing contributors and sorters; kitchen coordinators, toiletry item contributors and toiletry bag assemblers, lunch preparers, soup makers, van drivers and Run participants. This year we again offered for sale to the benefit of the Midnight Run, alternative giving Christmas Gift cards.

More Light Presbyterians

We have continued our financial support of the More Light Presbyterians and have worked this year to make our More Light position more visible in our community. That is, making it very apparent that we strive to be an openly welcoming and loving congregation. MLP works through education and out reach, to reduce prejudice and support lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender equality within the Presbyterian Church USA. www.MLP.org

My Second Home

The commission has identified the area of support for the caregiver as a great area of need within our community and congregation. More and more people find themselves struggling to find ways and means to care for aging and infirm parents and other relatives while also caring for a job and children. My Second Home is a social model adult day program located on Radio Circle in Mt. Kisco and run by Family Services of Westchester. It provides a compassionate, cost efficient, community based and intergenerational alternative to assisted living or nursing home care to seniors in need of individual

attention during the work day. Our support goes to a scholarship fund to make the program even more affordable.

Mission Commission (continued)

Noontime Meal Program-Peekskill.

The Peekskill Area's Pastor Association (PAPA) sponsors a noontime meal program at the Salvation Army in Peekskill. Volunteers from our church purchase, prepare and serve a lunch every month for nearly 20 years.

Rural and Migrant Ministry

This organization advocates for farm workers and rural poor families through education and Youth Empowerment Programs. For more information, check the RMM website <u>www.ruralmigrantministry.org</u> and <u>hope@ruralmigrantministry.org</u>.

White Gift Sunday

For the 48th year we shared Christmas gifts with the 2000 clients of the Taconic Developmental Center. Our donations make it possible for the residents to each receive gifts during the holidays. This worship service in December always moves me with the generosity and thoughtful giving of our congregation.

Fair Trade Coffee

This continues to be served from our kitchen. This program through the Presbyterian Coffee Project pays farmers a fair price so they can support their families and obtain affordable credit. Donna Gresh has made this possible.

Northern Westchester Chaplaincy Fund

2008 Stewardship Annual Report

The theme of the 2008 Stewardship campaign was gratitude—In everything give thanks, for this is God's will for you in Christ. "Gratitude stories" were presented in worship by several congregational members during "stewardship minutes" and in bulletin inserts. All of these expressions of gratitude highlighted the deep appreciation of the blessings of this Church. We celebrated Consecration Sunday on October 26, when we presented our pledge commitments during worship and shared the gifts of food and fellowship following the worship services.

It is important to note that during this transition period in our church, our congregation continues to face various challenges. The number of giving units has decreased, some because of deaths and people moving out of the area. Also, in 2008, we have trended down from 185 giving units to 165.

During its retreat, Session determined the budget to be presented at the Feb. 8th Annual Meeting.

The Stewardship Task Force thanks all who shared their personal stories of gratefulness during our Stewardship campaign. We remain grateful for this Church and its caring and committed congregation.

2 Infant Nurture

When one of our church families has a new infant, a silk rose is placed in the Sanctuary on Sunday to celebrate that new life. The rose is given to the new parents after worship. Infant nurture material is sent to the family for a period of three years. **Ruth Deemer** organizes and runs this ministry.

3 Yorktown Presbyterian Preschool

The Preschool has become a well-established and well-regarded service to families in the Yorktown community. It is staffed by **Connie Stringer** (Director/Teacher), **Susan Davies** (Teacher), **and Lisa Eliasson** (Teacher). It runs consistently full morning and afternoon classes for three and four year olds. The school is open to the community, and because of high demand, a point system gives preference to church members and siblings of alumni to ensure fairness in registration. The Preschool operates as a cooperative with active involvement of all parents in classroom and support activities.

In addition, the Preschool offers a "Mommy and Me" program two mornings a week. This is a program of socialization for two-year old children with special needs and typically developing two-year old children. "Mommy and Me" is run in collaboration with the Westchester County Early Intervention Program.

Oversight of the Preschool is provided by a board of parents and church appointed members. The 2008-2009 church appointed members are Jane Amato (chair), Don Blaney, Ed de Jong, Kathy Hodgkinson and Melissa Shaughnessy.

4 Crib Room

For families with pre-school children consistent high quality childcare during Sunday services is an important consideration. Our Crib Room Caregiver is **Colleen Correa**. The Crib room is now operating as a parent-cooperative with additional volunteers from among our youth group.

5 Church School

The Church School program continues to be a signature ministry of our Church. CS offers education to children ages pre-school through middle school every Sunday during the academic year, excepting Christmas week and Easter Sunday. CS Superintendents **Suzy Rishel** and **Beth Gruber** are responsible for the smooth administration of the Sunday School. Our thanks to **Emily Monk** who completed her commitment in 2008 and enriched our lives with her enthusiasm and love.

The Church School Committee shares responsibility for recruitment of teachers, curriculum selection and provides leadership and guidance in policy decisions. The Church School Committee members for 2008 included Kathy Anderson, Kathy Blaney, Robin Corpolongo, Beth Gruber, Aloha Hicks (chair),

Heidi Haring, Anne Matthews, Emily Monk, Suzy Rishel, Ken Shulman, Lynn Shulman and Angela Skinner, Associate Pastor.

This year's curriculum was entitled, "The Messiah." The lessons included: David; 23rd Psalm; Isaiah; Fulfillment of Prophesy; Handel's Messiah; Prince of Peace; Jesus' Baptism; Jesus washes Feet of Disciples; Images of Jesus in the Arts; and Appearances of the Holy Spirit.

6 Vacation Bible School 2008

Every July we join with the United Methodist and Saint Andrew's Lutheran Churches of Yorktown for Vacation Bible School.

In 2008 the Lutheran Church hosted VBS. Our thanks to **Barbara Santagata** and **Liz Gilbert** for being our coordinators. **Debbie Amorese, Heidi Haring, Nicole Mulcahy** and many of our youth were instrumental in making this year's VBS a tremendous success. VBS could not exist without the significant contribution of parents and older siblings who serve as its teachers and assistants. We especially thank **Rebecca Amorese and Karla and Ben Santagata** who gave up two weeks of summer vacation to make VBS a joy filled Christian adventure for the younger children. In July 2009, VBS will be at the First Presbyterian Church of Yorktown.

7 Confirmation Class

Confirmation is a young person's initiation into the adult life of the Church. Sixteen youth finished a year of study of the Bible, reformed theology and Presbyterian governance with Associate Pastor Angela Skinner and were welcomed into church membership on June 1, 2008. For the 2008-2009 school year, to date there are eight participants. Under the leadership of Pastor Russ Feroe, we are experimenting this year with a new confirmation curriculum entitled <u>Making Disciples</u>. This new curriculum focuses on nurturing the beginning of life-long adult faith habits and fostering relationships between youth and adult role models (mentors) who are engaged in the life and work of our faith community. This is a shift in emphasis from our former curriculum, which was a more academic approach.

8 Youth Groups

Under the leadership of Associate Pastor Angela Skinner, junior and senior high youth met January – June 2008 once a week for socialization, recreation and service projects. The Church's annual Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper was run by our youth. Three of our senior youth participated in a week-long retreat in June at Silver Bay, Lake George, New York, and Pastor Skinner served as chaplain.

With Pastor Skinner's call in fall 2008 to the Palisades Presbyterian Church, a strong team of volunteers from the congregation has come forward to conduct and support our youth ministry. With **Heidi Haring** serving in the newly created position of youth program coordinator, **Ryan and Nicole Mulcahy** have emerged as the linchpins of the volunteer leadership team. Activities for the 2008-2009 program year were launched with the help of Ryan and Nicole as well as Nancy Caswell, Katharine Frase, Charlotte Savino, and Squeegee Mills.

We have had meetings twice a month on Sundays after church with an average attendance of 6 to 8. There was a scary movie meeting for Halloween, a baking meeting for the Food Pantry for Thanksgiving with dodge ball on the parking lot with Ryan. For the food packing night before the Thanksgiving Food Pantry and for the actual distribution on Saturday we had many of our youth and youth from the community, scouts groups, etc. For December we made lunch and then went Christmas caroling along with 8 adult church members at Holy Comforter, Seabury Home and the Country House.

Other activities were the Great Jack-o-Lantern Blaze at Van Cortlandt Manor, the Crop Walk with the Methodist Church, the Midnight Run and a trip to NYC in December. The Midnight Run was a great success despite the low youth turn out, thanks to adult support. A big THANK YOU to our wonderful Midnight Run helpers: Bud and Gloria Cocodrilli, Jack Shaughnessy, Don Blaney, Ken Shulman, Nicole, Amy Wilson and friend Liz. We request all the prayer help we can get.

9 Adult Education

Our Adult Education program offers a variety of seminars, discussions, films, and workshops, both during the Sunday morning Church School hour and at other times. Topics range from Bible study to current popular spiritual writings, to issues of peace, social justice, and care of the earth. While our emphasis is on the Bible and other Christian writings, we also explore the wisdom of other faith traditions. We aim to support the individual's faith journey by providing a safe place to bring our doubts. We also challenge one another to grow. Although we may disagree with one another, we support one another in our search. We find affirmation in our search for the truth as we strive to live the questions.

Responsibility

This Commission oversees the needs of our faith community as it gathers for worship. This includes reviewing the content and order of worship, planning and implementing special services, scheduling ushers, greeters, and lay leaders, making arrangements for the serving of the Lord's Supper, and planning for appropriate decoration of the Sanctuary (such as banners, candles, flowers, and greens). Overview

Momhors

The Operations Commission, in its capacity as the financial stewards and caretaker of the Sanctuary, adjacent buildings and grounds, was faced with and tackled the task of upgrading facilities to cope both with some deterioration as well as the higher cost of utilities and maintenance. Some of these tasks involved unanticipated costs (covered) and some are ongoing as will be detailed.

The successful achievement of this Commission's works is dependent upon the efforts, financial support of the congregation and dedication of many volunteers, both within the Church family and the community groups using our facilities. Particular thanks go to Dick Seymour who continually identified problems within the infra-structure and led many remedial projects and to the many members of the Commission who gave of their time, particularly on Saturday mornings to facilitate and speed up the process.

Major Projects, Improvements and Changes

The year just ended was again an active one for the Operations Committee with a major concern continuing to be a plan to stabilize the Steeple.

SANCTUARY

Steeple: A structural problem related to weight and load distribution has led to tilting of the Steeple. This problem was identified early in the year by Tom Clemmens, while he was undertaking the Steeple restoration exercise funded by the 275th Anniversary Campaign, and prompted the Commission to engage the services of Bill Stivale, a New York City Based Conservator of historic buildings. In turn, we engaged the services of Mary Ennis, a licensed engineer who has assessed the problem. To date, and at an initial cost of \$6,000, they have come up with a plan along with a plan suggested by Dick Seymour and Tom Clemmens. We are almost in the bidding process but await further details before proceeding. This will be an extended project but one necessary for the preservation of the structure as we and the greater Yorktown Community have come to recognize it.

General Rodent Infestation: During installation of the air conditioning system, severe infestation was noted along with associated debris. As noted previously, the problem was addressed in a humane manner and subsequent inspections suggest that the problem has been eliminated.

Basement Flooding: Many steps were undertaken throughout the year to identify and remedy flooding issues that have plagued the Sanctuary and CE Building basements and results have been successful thus far.

Operations Commission (continued)

SAFETY and SECURITY

Alarm systems are performing as hoped and there has been no general breach of the system as well as no false alarms. There has been no reported breach of security nor has there been any reported theft.

Additional fire extinguishers were added around the Sanctuary to ensure the safety of building users.

ADJACENT STRUCTURES: As the energy crisis worsened, we were prompted to explore ways to make the structures more energy efficient. Examination of the attic spaces in the CE building showed that they were under insulated and housed many potentially flammable materials. To that end, work parties were organized to rid attics and crawl spaces of all garbage. More importantly, we contracted for and funded complete insulation of the premises. This included all attic space and all basement space. Work was done to seal all potential sources of outside air and members of the Commission put down a special plastic coat on the dirt basement floors to further eliminate moisture from creeping in.

Problems relating to the heating system were addressed once again with the most major issue being the failure of a pump that provided heat to the Gathering Spaces, Fellowship Hall and the Library.

Mold problems in certain bathrooms were identified and addressed.

The exterior of the South side of the CE structure (Room1) containing classrooms etc., had shown significant signs of deterioration mostly related to moisture. After special dispensation from Session, a repair using vinyl rather than wood was chosen and affected. A new energy efficient door was also installed.

User groups have all been contacted and asked to consider their voluntary contributions for upkeep relative to the rising costs of goods and services. The response has been positive and we thank them for continued support.

Full exterior lighting has been restored.

GROUNDS

Cemetery: The Columbarium has been staked out and a committee will be established on an ad hoc basis to address any issues pertaining to the cemetery. There are now approximately 90 spaces available in the cemetery.

Our East Yard facilities continue to be taken care of by Androsko Landscaping and when required they have taken care emergency issues as they have arisen with haste.

Rear Parking Lot: We are still working with the Town of Yorktown and the DEP to gain permission to pave the back parking lot and pothole alley.

Spring and Fall Cleanups

Spring and fall cleanups were quite a success with weather not being an impediment for a change. Participation in the spring event was robust and enthusiastic, and the Fall event attracted the right amount of people to get the job(s) done. Our thanks go to **Deanna Collins** for organizing these events.

Operations Commission (continued)

Peace Pole: The peace Pole was installed with blue stone walkway and beds installed around it.

Sanctuary Plantings:

Craig Hibben developed a plan for replacing the matured yews that formerly surrounded the Sanctuary. Again, a work party led by Craig and Dick Seymour, ripped out the older bushes and readied the soil for planting in the spring of 2009. We are excited and eagerly anticipate the new look.

PROCEDURES AND FINANCIAL OVERSIGHT

Procedures: Policies and procedures have been established for opening and closing of facilities and in future will not require as much intervention from members of Session as in the past.

Increases to fees for weddings were approved

A comprehensive job description for the Custodial position was developed updating the document last done in 1994 and was reviewed with Peter S. We anticipate this Description will provide both Peter and the Pastor responsible for day to day supervision a set of guidelines that will keep our facilities in top shape

Financial Oversight: The Treasurers sub-committee kept us aware of the budget relative to spending and 2008 appears to have been a good year particularly in light of the many financial problems surrounding us in general.

FUTURE WORK

Our main focus will be the Steeple stabilization project but other projects include paving the back parking lot and pothole alley.

Food Pantry

The pantry is open the second and fourth Saturday of each month from 9:00-11:00AM. The coordinators in 2008 were: **Peter Marsh, Todd Child, Darren McAuliffe and Lynn Shulman**. The food pantry benefited from a generous outpouring of contributions from the congregation including part of the Peacemaking Offering.

Total operating costs for the food pantry was \$9,428.70.

The Total of grants/donations/matching funds for 2008 was \$29,386.00.

Of this amount the congregation provided \$11,943.00, the Frase-Stockwell Fund provided \$11,943.00, and the balance \$5,500 (51%) was derived from external agency grants.

Granting agencies included HPNAP (Hunger Prevention Nutrition Assistance Program from New York State and administered by the Food Bank for Westchester), FEMA, and Shop-Rite Adopt- A- Pantry Grant. We also received community support in terms of food received through the community drive sponsored by the United States Postal Carriers Union, Yorktown High School Canned Food Drive, Yorktown Jewish Center, a company who wishes to be anonymous and of course the weekly food items left in our pantry cart by the congregation.

This year we gave out 2299 grocery bags of food an increase of 324 versus 2007 which served an average of 69 families per pantry.

Toys for Tots

This year **Kathy Anderson** coordinated the distribution of toys at Christmas time to our Food Pantry clients' children. Toys for Tots provided approximately 800 new toys. Additionally, we received 74 toys from the congregation that were "gently used." The Girl Scouts of Troop 1284 helped with the distribution as "shopper elves."

School Supplies 2008

Homebound/Hospital Visitation

Each week, the pastors inform the deacons of individuals who need to be visited in the hospital and/or home. Visits are primarily done on Sunday which enables the deacons to take flowers from the Sanctuary as well as the weekly bulletin.

Loaves and Fishes

Transportation

Kathy Anderson and Marsha Henderson coordinated transportation needed by individuals to and from church or to doctor's offices or hospitals.

Bereavement

Louise Fang, Sal Gaetani and Lynn Shulman were available to lend support and ease the stress of families in this most difficult time. For those families who chose to have a reception at the Church after the Memorial Service, the Bereavement Committee of the deacons assisted 3 families this year.

Contact to the Homebound

Marsha Henderson and **Jane Amato** made phone calls as well as home and hospital visits to church members who were alone and needed personal contact and comfort.

Health Care Racks

Amy Savino filled these racks with pamphlets containing information on health-related issues. The racks are in the West Hall and in the East Hall near the fire door.

Blood Bank

Sal Gaetani kept the congregation informed about Blood Drives in the area and made sure announcements were placed in the Disciple and the Bulletin. This year The First Presbyterian Church of Yorktown hosted a blood drive on April 26th.

Monthly Financial Reports

Gloria Coccodrilli prepares a monthly spread sheet for Deacon spending and designated funding.

Outreach

This year the deacons sponsored local families for counseling and emergency situations.
