Seeing New Possibilities

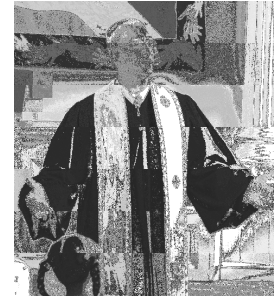
Although it seems like we just finished celebrating Christ's birth, the season of Lent is around the corner. Lent calls us to explore a deeper faith life with God, one another and the world. Making room for a deeper, richer faith life is like making room for a new piece of furniture. We move the items already in a room around, shifting some things and removing others, until the room functions in new ways. The room as it was may have worked well, but that new item creates an opening to think about the room differently and even use it in new ways. Likewise, as we make room for a Christian practice, our lives open up in new ways, and we can see new possibilities to know God and live our faith.

What are Christian practices? Craig Dykstra writes on practicingourfaith.org, "Christian practices are not activities we do to make something spiritual happen in our lives. Nor are they duties we undertake to be obedient to God. Rather, they are patterns of communal action that create openings in our lives where the grace, mercy, and

presence of God may be made known to us. They are places where the power of God is experienced. In the end, these are not ultimately our practices but forms of participation in the practice of God."

During the seasons of Lent and Easter, we will use the book *Practicing Our Faith: A Way of Life for a Searching People* to explore twelve Christian practices which, when we make room for them, can deepen our faith and experience of God in our lives and ministry. They are not intended to be burdensome, nor will we be able to do every one of them all the time. Instead, this is an opportunity to learn about different practices, try them out, make room for them in our homes (our lives) and use one or two (or more) to open up in new ways the faith we already practice.

How might we participate in the work (the practice) of God in new and richer ways? What could open up for us as we make room for a practice and arrange our lives around it? I hope you will join this journey of learning and growing, searching and find-

ing God in the practice of faith. Each week, we will emphasize a practice in worship and then explore it further in weekly discussion groups, a Wednesday night contemplative service, online descriptions of the practices and practical ways to try them out. If you would like to read along with us, books will be available in the church office and on Sunday mornings before and after worship as well as online in e-book form. Donations toward the cost of the books are greatly appreciated.

I pray you will know God in new ways on this journey so that you may live your faith in the everyday experiences of life and the ministry we share.

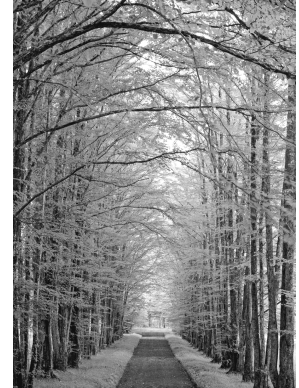

The Ministry of our Deacons

Loaves and Fishes is a ministry that provides a meal (or several) to a member and their family in times of sickness, loss or other forms of need.

Transportation is a ministry that provides a ride (or two or three) to a member who is otherwise unable to get to the doctor or their physical therapist or to Church on a Sunday morning.

Visitation to the Homebound keeps our members who cannot always get to church in touch with the activities and abiding love of the church. The Deacons and the minister bring

communion to the homebound, visit members in nursing homes, assisted living centers and hospitals, and generally bring cheer to those who cannot get out and about.

All of these ministries depend upon you, the members of this church, to help cook, drive and visit as your time allows. Please **complete a form in the next month**, or let a Deacon or Chip know of your interest and availability. We are all one church, and this is a good way to be a vital part of the community!

In February, **the Deacons' Offering goes toward the purchase of school supplies** for the children of our Food Pantry clients. Last year we gave out 250 school kits (divided K thru 2nd grade and grades 3 to 5) as well as supplies for 115 older

children creatively assembled from your contributions. Please continue to be generous during this special offering in February. **The Item of the Month for the Food Pantry is PASTA.** Any kind of pasta is welcome, as it is a staple for our clients, and often **not** available through the Food Bank. We will collect pasta in the basket outside of the Gathering Place as well as near the Deacons' Easel which is displayed during Coffee Hour. Remember - the light of the Lord brings warmth into the coldest corners. Love and enjoy that warmth even as the wind rattles the doors and creeps under window sashes.

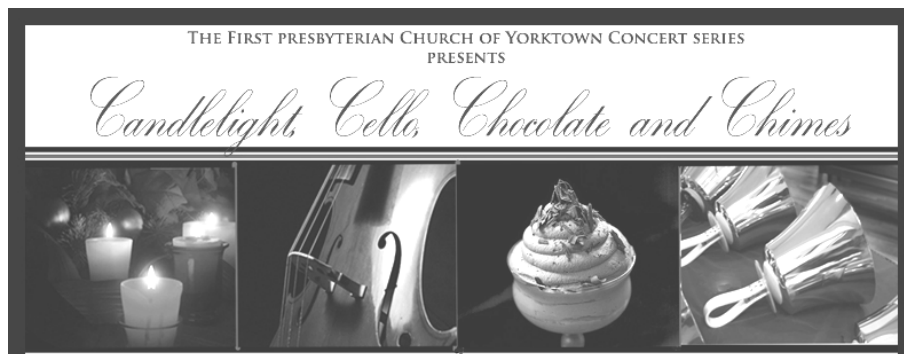
We need volunteers to load bags from 8-9 am on the pantry days. We also need plastic bags, grocery size. (Bring to Room 2.)

A further breakdown of our campaign results for adult pledging is shown below:

While we fell short of our goal of \$460,000, our results are terrific in that we had 89% of our pledges in the increase, same or new categories. Between this good news and the evident faithful generosity of the church, we can move forward in confidence to live our vision together!

Interesting quotes from some of the first Disciples from the 1950's.

Seventy years ago "The Young Ladies Missionary Society" was organized on April 18, 1882. Mrs. Cummings and her sister were charter members who gathered for the first of the monthly meetings. Mrs. Cummings was then Miss Eloise White, but soon after married the popular minister, W. J. Cummings. (He was the 10th pastor, 1876-1906). Through the seventy years, the group has met

each month to study, work, and contribute money to the cause of the mission around the world.

Some Diary Dates from September 1952

7th - Sunday services resume in our own church
8th - The Session will meet in the Parish House
11th - 13th - Grange Fair
14th - Sunday 3pm - 8:30pm - Church Leaders Planning Conference
16th - 8pm - Married Couples Group will resume monthly

17th - 10am-3pm - Peach Lake Conference and Field Day of Presbyterians. Bring lunch and meet people from other Presbyterian churches.

21st - 10am - Special Missions Service under the direction of Women's Missionary Society.

In the early 50's there were 9 session members and 9 trustees.

USHERING is a very important part of the worship service on Sunday mornings. One usher acts as a greeter at the front entrance. He or she is the first person to greet those coming to worship. The other ushers stand at each of the doors with the bulletins, a smile and a "Good Morning" to greet worshipers and walk them to a seat. Four Ushers are needed every Sunday. (The first Sunday of the month is done by elders and deacons.) Ushers are needed on February 17, 24 and March 10, 17, 24, & 31 for both services. If you can help at the 8:30 service call Terri Froehlich at 528- 0811. To help at 10:45 call Pat Prauda at 737-4674. If you have never served as an usher before, we will make sure you are with someone who has. This is a great way to meet people at church! Upkeep and Maintenance: Operations Commission

We are looking forward to 2013 to continue our building and grounds improvement plans as well as to welcome some very significant changes in our overall mission activities. A key change is the possible addition of a Parish Associate so that the Pastor and others can focus more time on Youth Ministry. The Operations Commission will support this initiative in whichever ways may be needed.

Improvements:

- Our improvement program for the Library/Lounge has been completed. The very old kitchenette has been removed and replaced with modern oak-faced cabinets and counter top. Under counter lights were added. We have an electric kettle for heating water. There is much more cabinet space now and the entire look & feel of the room has been improved. Jose has completed painting the ceiling and will soon begin painting the walls. We are also looking into the possibility of updating the cushion covers on the chairs. A coat tree has been added and we are planning on moving the water cooler from the main office to the Library/Lounge so that there will be a ready source of water for the electric kettle.

Lastly, we will be reinstalling the hand sanitizer.

- A new oak-faced cabinet has been permanently installed in Room #16 which is heavily used by the Noon Unity group. This larger cabinet provides storage space for all of their supplies so that they do not have to interrupt meeting taking place in the Library/Lounge. The Noon Unity group is now self-sufficient in Room #16.

- The kitchen has undergone a significant upgrade. The old dishwasher, which hasn't been working for years (and was too costly to repair) has been removed. In its place a three drawer cabinet has been installed. The electricity and drain for the dishwasher were disconnected and sealed by our electrician and plumber. While on site, the electrician and plumber provisioned the kitchen for new electric stoves.

- New wall-base rubber molding has been installed throughout the kitchen. This eliminates the wood molding which rested next to the floor. The new molding is sealed and prevents water from accumulating behind it. This is an improvement we have

wanted to undertake for some time and now we have a much better environment for maintaining cleanliness.

- Jose has made excellent progress on our painting project in the Nursery. The ceiling and most of the walls are now freshly painted with all holes and imperfections being spackled and evened out.

- We are beginning to look ahead to spring and have set the date of May 18th for our traditional clean-up and spruce-up of all of our facilities and grounds. It is not too early to mark your calendars for the Spring Clean-up on May 18th.

We continue to strive to keep our facilities and grounds in first-class condition. If you see something that needs repair or improvement, please do not hesitate to bring it to the attention of the Operations Commission. You may contact any member of the Commission or me. Thanks to all for helping us to keep things in good shape and for volunteering when we call for assistance. Everyone's effort is very much appreciated!

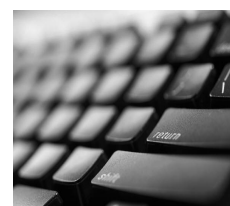
A Note from the Office
