Practicing Our Faith through VBS

There is a nervous knot in my stomach as I await the entrance of "my" teens into the sanctuary. It is astounding to me that even after all these years at VBS and years of closing programs, how nervous I still get at each one. I have been lucky enough to mentor some of these children since they were kindergarteners and I can't quite wrap my mind around the fact that most of them are now driving and will soon be graduating!

I have shepherded them through countless programs and skits and songs. We have learned how to pray together, played games and learned bible stories, memorized scripture verses and learned theme songs, watched puppet shows and created many, many craft projects. In the past few years as they have grown into teens, they have participated in multiple teen swims, decorated tee shirts for their closing programs, been role models for the younger children and explored more leadership roles. I am incredibly proud of them all. When people ask me "Why

planning and preparation; why the commitment of time and energy and money; why the dedication of 2 weeks of summer vacation each year?" I think back on the Practicing our Faith study we have been working on. We certainly practice Discernment as we come together as a community to organize this event each year. And yes, there is also an element of Forgiveness present as well, as we work toward resolving our differing opinions. We Say Yes and Say No by choosing, with intention, to dedicate our time and talents to this worthwhile endeavor, and we Keep Sabbath by surrounding ourselves with the praise and worship of God. We Honor our Body with every movement and dance learned to every song, by respecting each other and by celebrating the Body of Christ together. We practice Hospitality by hosting this community event every 3 years and by sharing in the Hospitality of others when our sister churches host. The VBS curriculum is all about Testimony – sharing our experiences and faith with everyone - all our welcome. Finally, we Sing our

Lives, with joy and thanksgiving and praise, in every VBS song we learn and perform, and that we will remember for the rest of our lives. So "Why VBS"? Simply put, for myself, I am *Practicing my Faith.* But even more importantly, it is an opportunity and great blessing to be able to share and teach and model these practices for our children, from Pre-k through young adult.

There is the teen's cue - are they ready? Yes, here they come, pouring up the aisles, clapping and singing; so much energy, so much joy! As I gaze around the sanctuary at the upturned, gleeful faces of all the young campers, I wistfully remember when "my" teens were that small. But as I hear again their strong voices raised to Praise and give Glory to God, I am overcome with thankfulness for the opportunity to help them learn how to Practice their own Faith and make use of these practices as they grow to become our future.

We are looking into going back to New Orleans this July to help with project Homecoming, through the PDA (Presbyterian Disaster group). Last year the cost per person was roughly \$900 which included lodging and most meals, a program, airfare and ground transportation in New Orleans. We hope to find lower air fare this year. The Ministry of our Deacons

One of the roles of our Deacons is to provide spiritual care and support to our church family. A visitation team has been created by the Board of Deacons to visit the homebound and sick. Rev. Tami Seidel is working as pastoral advisor with this team. Deacons Christine Lazarus and Heidi Haring are the visit coordinators and the other team members, who help tremendously, are Chuck Radke, Mabel Seymour, Terri Froehlich and Sue Nelson--all former Deacons who still enjoy visiting, and Rev. Chip Low.

We communicate all visits and needs via one e-mail group and visits are tracked in the office and by the coordinating Deacons in order to insure that no one is forgotten. We visit members in hospitals, in Elder Care facilities and at home. We also visit those who have periodic needs, such as those just out of the hospital or in recuperation and those who just need to be checked on from time to time or who are going through especially trying circumstances and need extra encouragement.

As of now we visit: 9 people in Elder Care facilities 6 people Homebound 3 people in Temporary Care 7 people in Check-in care We also share communion with at least 2 people each month.

Because of the visitation team, we were able to accomplish 26 visits last month! Our goal was to visit everyone once per quarter, but thanks to everyone on the team this month we were able to see almost everyone, even with an increase in those hospitalized, in rehab or in extensive recuperation at home.

We hope you'll share information with us if you or someone in our congregation is going to be in the hospital or in one of these circumstances. We'd love to visit them on behalf of the church. If you are also visiting people in our church, thank you. If you would like to join the Visitation Team, please speak to Christine, Heidi, Tami or Chip.

Have you seen the New Construction?

Connecting to God, One Another and the World

No, this is not a missed capital campaign, nor is it construction of the hammer and nail, two by four variety. It is your Youth Ministry Design team, comprised of Alice Chin, George Freeze, Kelly Humphrey, Karen LaBonte, Dave Monk, and Jack Shaughnessy, nearing completion of the First Phase of a Plan for FPCY Sustainable Youth Ministry.

As you may recall, the Youth Ministry Design Team started to work in February to fulfill one of the goals of our last mission study. We, as a church, have long sought a strong, enduring way to connect our youth and our larger church community. With this in mind, Pastor Low recommended that we begin with a study of *Sustainable Youth Ministry – Why Most Youth Ministry Doesn't Last and What Your Church Can Do About It*, by Mark DeVries. The

book identifies characteristics of successful youth programming while providing anecdotes about youth ministry failures and the unrealistic expectations that often accompany these failures. Armed with Devries' information and insights, the Design Team is undaunted.

On April 17th, we hosted a conversation with 25+ members of our Church community to gain an insight into what has been valuable in our own experiences of youth programming. Drawing on this conversation, we are well on our way to developing our Mission and Value Statements. We aim to have these drafted by April 30.

With a May 31st internal deadline, we will be hosting another conversation in May to dig a little deeper so as to better understand the Congregation's goals for our Youth Ministry. Like the Mission and Values Statement, Goals will be compiled and included in our final report to Session. The final part of our report will deal with what we are calling the "Nitty Gritty," or the day to day aspects of running the FPCY Youth Group.



We plan to deliver our report to the Session at its July Meeting. We want to emphasize that Youth Ministry is not exclusively for parents or relatives of youth. Connecting with our youth is, for all of us, an opportunity to grow our faith, perhaps in ways we haven't yet imagined.

A Glimpse Of the Past

Provided by Dick Hunter, Church Historian Check the history bulletin board highlights of the 70's by the Communications Committee chaired by Joan Givens.

Below is an excerpt about a former FPCY Pastor. "The 8th pastor was the Rev. Richard Wynkoop, who was called March 17, 1827 at a salary of \$300, parsonage, and eight cords of wood. He was installed on June 14. He was born in the City of New York on December 16, 1798. He graduated from Columbia College, 1819. After studying law for a time, he determined to enter the ministry. He pursued his theological course at New Brunswick with Dr. Robert McCartee of New York. After serving for a time as missionary in the Dutch Church of Cato, NY, he accepted a call to this church where he remained until April 16, 1834 when the pastoral relation was dissolved that he might become pastor of the Presbyterian Church of Hagerstown, MD, where he died April 5, 1842. He was a man of rare energy, clear head, indomitable courage, fully determined, as far as lay in his power,

that everything should be done decently and in order. Laws, civil and ecclesiastical, in his estimation, were made to be enforced. His sermons were doctrinal, and the purpose for which they were written was to instill into the people views of divine truth which were thoroughly Calvinistic. By nature and education he was essentially a lawyer, and this in a measure unfitted him for success in the ministry. He carried from the legal profession into the church ideas which, while proper in the former, were impracticable in the latter. The words compromise and conciliation were not in his vocabulary. Wrongs in the church were not to be righted by forgetting them, nor were breaches to be healed by conciliation, but by discipline; and we all know from history and experience that in church difficulties and divisions, discibline is useless. Tact and the balm of kind words and a forgiving and forgetting spirit are the only remedies which can remove them.

During his pastorship the two church came back together after separation in 1806. During Mr. Wynkoop's ministry 16 were added to the church on examination and four by certificate."

Mother's Day Project

A joint program of PCUSA World Mission and Presbyterian Women, the Mother's Day Project is a simple and meaning mission activity that Presbyterians have supported since 2001.
