**Abundance As Something We Live Into**

Jesus said, "I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly" (John 10:10b). Psalm 23:5 says, "My cup overflows." On the fifth day of creation, God said, "Let the water teem with living creatures" (Genesis 1:20). A friend of Job says, "God gives food in abundance" (36:31b). The Psalmist says of the Israelites in the wilderness, "They asked, and God brought quails, and gave them food from heaven in abundance" (105:40). The parable of the sower and the seed concludes, "Other seed fell into good soil and brought forth grain, growing up and increasing and yielding thirty and sixty and a hundredfold" (Mark 4:8). Jesus preached, "See how the lilies of the field grow. They do not labor or spin. Yet I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendor was dressed like one of these" (Matthew 6:28-29).

What do all of these scripture verses have in common? They all speak about abundance as something more than what we accumulate. They speak about abundance as something we live into that is around us all the time. So, I invite you to take the 31-Day Abundance Challenge during the month of October and live into the abundance all around us. Can you name 31 different signs of abundance in your life? Can you name 31 signs of abundance in your faith, our church and ministry? Can you name 31 examples of God's plentiful blessings in the larger world?

Our stewardship theme this year is #abundance. The "#" (called hashtag) symbol typed before a word in social media that helps organize thoughts people share



online. If you want to see what people are saying about the United States Men's National Team on Facebook or Twitter, search under #USNMT. During presbytery meetings, you can search #hudrivpres on Twitter to see what people are talking related to the meeting's content. We are using # in front of the word abundance this year to do what happens all the time in social media—organize our lives around that word.

Really, it is more than a word. #abundance is a practice, the practice of seeing the blessings in our lives, what is plentiful, what is good, what is beautiful. How can we create space for 31 days to see the abundance of life, the abundance of God's presence, the abun-

dance of faith? The verses above point to signs of abundance everywhere, but we may be missing them. We may be caught in narratives of scarcity, brokenness, injustice, loss. The 31-day challenge invites us to practice abundance, to make it a verb rather than a noun, something we see and do rather than get and hoard. How can we live abundance that seeks a life that is becoming as generous as God has been to us?

#abundance also invites us to consider our ministry. How can we share what we have to continue growing as the generous, life-giving body of Christ that we are? I'm hoping we all have an answer to that question (31 perhaps). One particular answer is youth. God has blessed us with an abundance of youth, but there is a gap in our ministry because we are not engaging them after confirmation. We are, instead, confirming them out of the church. So, what should we conclude? We have an abundance of youth not attending church, or an abundance of youth we could reach and walk with through their lives? We have set a goal for ourselves to engage youth. What abundance has God already given us that prepares us to do that? How can we live into the abundance we already have and make that ministry real?

I hope you will join us at one of the small group conversations to discuss your answers to these questions. They are intended to be a conversation about the ministry and direction of our church. These conversations will highlight the work of the Youth Design Team and what it means to broaden our church's ministry to engage youth both inside and outside our church, discuss the budget plans for 2014 and the direction of our ministry, and to invite us to live #abundance in our ministry for all people. I hope you will come to listen, ask questions, share your thoughts, enjoy fellowship and eat delicious desserts. Thanks to our host families for creating a space for all of that to happen.

As we become more aware of God's #abundance in us, around us and through us, our faith, our life together and our ministry in our community can only grow. We will be living the mission of our ministry: connecting to God, one another and the world. I pray that will happen as we enter the 31 days of abundance challenge this month.

## Planned Giving and Our Church

What is "planned giving"? It is a decision now to make a gift in the future. The most common legal device for Planned Giving is a will (a bequest), but there are several other ways of conveying a Planned Gift, such as appreciated securities, real estate, life insurance, charitable gift annuities, or charitable trusts. If we have attended a college or university, or if we have paid for our children to attend one, we are probably already very familiar with those institutions' appeals for Planned Gifts. This reflects the increased attention being paid by many US charitable organizations to the value and importance of Planned Gifts.

Churches have been a bit slower to embrace this concept, but we are now catching up, because the concept of Planned Giving can be very helpful for the Church and its mission.

Our Session has approved the Stewardship Commission's goal of developing an approach to Planned Giving for our church. We are moving very deliberately and methodically, and we aim to present an overall plan at the congregation's Annual Meeting in 2014. For now, we just want to make the congregation aware of the concept, to plant the initial seed about planning now for a gift in the future to help the mission of our Church.

As our approach for Planned Giving develops, there will be many opportunities for members to ask questions and to comment on how best to use this method of giving for the benefit of our Church, so please do not hesitate to contact me (as the co-chair of the Stewardship Commission; contact information, below), or to contact our pastors, elders, or deacons about this important concept.

## Concert Series 2013-2014

The 13<sup>th</sup> FPC Concert Series will open on Sunday, October 6<sup>th</sup> at 4:30 pm with a performance by internationally acclaimed pianist Mykola Suk. Ukrainian-American Suk gained recognition as the winner of the First Prize and Gold Medal at the 1971 International Liszt-Bartok competition in Budapest, and his career has spanned four continents, performing in the most prestigious venues from the Great Hall of Moscow Conservatory to Carnegie Hall in New York. Mr Suk is available as the opening performance of our Concert Series because of his long friendship with Simona, and because his concert tour brings him to our New York area immediately before leaving on a European concert tour the next morning.

Mr. Suk has appeared as a soloist with numerous leading orchestras and has collaborated artistically with the world's outstanding conductors. Before coming to the United States, he served as professor of Piano at the Kiev State Conservatory and Moscow State Conservatory. He has given master classes at many festivals and music schools around the world. The European Piano Teacher's Journal wrote that he is "surely the most towering and volcanic talent to have come out of Russia since Anton Rubenstein". Renown for his power, passion, poetry, and exquisite keyboard

control, he is best known for his interpretation of Liszt as well as other classical and modern composers.

## Operations Update

We continue to make progress in keeping our facilities maintained and improved. Our most recent projects include:

- Removal of the built-in A/C units in the Pastor's & Treasurer's offices. A big Thank You to Skip Mahncke and Bill Friscia for their help to me in completing this project.

- A significant rehab of the Portico in front of the Sanctuary has been completed. Here, my shout-out goes to Bud Coccodrilli for a really significant effort in breaking out the old cracked mortar between the bluestone slabs and the granite steps and then putting in new mortar and sponging off the excess. Uneven areas were smoothed out to eliminate trip hazards. The wrought iron railings have been resealed with hydraulic cement so they are now very stable. This was an eyesore that really needed attention. I am hoping everyone who sees the finished project likes what they see.

- The south wall of the Youth Room has been completely re-

done. Thanks to Jose for a superb job in priming, spackling and sanding the wall. The young people of our Youth Group can now decorate the wall to their liking. This follow-on work will be under the supervision of Jack Shaughnessy.

- Operations' has approved the installation of new carpeting for the Youth Room. The carpeting will be installed after all painting is complete.

- Also, approved is a significant rehabilitation of the kitchen floor. The existing linoleum is very old and worn. It is impossible to keep looking good. The new floor will be vinyl tile with new cove molding throughout. This will be a great addition to an otherwise excellent room.

- All of the lines in the driveways and parking lots have been re-stripped. This was a big task, but one that helps to keep order for driving lanes, one-way traffic and parking spaces.

- We will soon be adding speaker wires which will go from the audio console in the Sanctuary to

the nursery and kitchen. This will soon allow people who are serving in those spaces to be aware of progress of services in the Sanctuary. We hope to add the actual powered speaker units in late October.

- A very big Thank You is sent out to several people who have helped with the weeding chores around our property. These people include: Nancy Caswell, Lucas Eliasson, Ed de Jong, Craig Hibben and me. There is a lot more weeding needed. Anyone who wants to help need only pick a spot and weed it. Leave the weeds in a pile and I will pick them up and take them to Yorktown Recycling. Thanks in advance to everyone who will help with this work!

Thanks to all for helping us to keep things in good shape and for volunteering when we call for assistance. Everyone's effort is very much appreciated!
