The Disciple

By God's great mercy God has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. ~1 Peter 1:3

Happy Easter! As we live through this Easter season, youth ministry is on my mind. I'm writing this article the day after our Session received eleven confirmation students into membership by profession of faith and the day before I travel to Princeton Theological Seminary to attend the Princeton Forum on Youth Ministry (April 29 to May 2). I'm celebrating the work our eleven students did over the last year to grow in their faith and then to find the words to express their faith to our elders and on Sunday, May 4 to our church. I'm also anticipating a good conference on youth ministry in today's context that I hope will help us as a church move our new ministry to youth into its next phase.

The focus of the Princeton conference is very appropriate to the work the confirmation class did to profess their faith. This year's theme is on the power of testimony. From the website (ptsem.edu/Forum2014) of the conference, "Young people often struggle to articulate their faith and subsequently don't identify strongly as Christian disciples. However, as young people become fluent in the language of faith through vital relationships, they make meaningful connections that enable them to speak boldly of God's work in their lives and in the world."

I appreciate and enjoy the process that our confirmation class goes through each year to find the words to express what they believe, but I fear that confirmation is sometimes seen as an isolated event and even worse as a culminating experience of church. Confirmation is an important milestone along a lifelong journey of Christian nurture that reflects our church's commitment to honor our baptismal promise. At baptism, we made a covenant, a promise, to nurture all the children (young and old) whom God gives us in the Christian faith so that they can articulate their faith and talk about God in their lives. If we stop our ministry with youth at confirmation, is it any wonder that they don't identify strongly as Christian disciples? If our parents don't learn the faith and share it with them, if our church members don't build vital relationships with them, how will they make meaningful connections to God's work in their lives and in the world? Too often we leave them "to make their own choices," and I'm pretty sure we all know how that ends. Only 2 out of every 10 confirmation students, on average, stays connected to church beyond confirmation.

In a recent edition of the magazine *Presbyterian Outlook*, Rick Harrison, president of Presbyterian Camp and Conference Centers, Inc., wrote that he believes it is time to "make youth the number one priority in the church. Nearly 80% of all Christians began their journey with Christ in their teen years.

In comparison, only 2% of Christians come to faith

after the age of 30. Can you imagine what a church would look like whose mission statement read, 'To raise up young leaders in the church'? And, once we have raised them up, empower them by letting them lead. I'm not talking about one or two token youth serving as elders, but give them a majority on session and see what happens!"

I like Harrison's words






because they are bold. They make me wonder many things about our ministry. Are we a part of God's mission to share the new life we know in Jesus Christ with all ages, or are we only consumers of religion who make faith about us? Are we, the members of our church, as concerned for the next generations of Christians in our ministry, or have we "retired" and decided to "let the parents do it," so that we can focus more on preserving our own history and memory of the church? If someone were to examine our church closely, would they see a vision "to raise up young leaders in the church," or a church that acquiesces to all the other demands our culture makes on youths' and families' lives? Are we raising up youth who can speak boldly of God's work in their lives and in the world? These are not questions for me as pastor or the Youth Design Team alone. These are questions for our whole church.

The redevelopment of our youth ministry is still in its infancy, and we need your prayers and active support to grow it. Your financial generosity has made it possible to hire a part-time youth coordinator, and we are currently searching for that person. Many thanks to Alice Chin for filling that role on an interim basis. However, a youth ministry coordinator is not the whole answer to growing our youth ministry. Our youth ministry needs the presence, faith, leadership and relationships of our church members in order to grow and raise up young leaders in our church. The Youth Design Team and Program Team welcome your involvement as we begin now to plan for the next year. I would invite you to pray about your role with our youth (as well as with our children-see Tami's article). God has given us everything we need to grow our ministry to include youth. What a wonderful testimony it is when we can share with the next generations the faith that gives us life and hope.

Who Taught You?

Train children in the way they should go; when they grow old, they won't depart from it. ~Proverbs 22:6

Last month as I was preparing to lead one of the adult studies on the glittering vices, I was reminded yet again of what a big influence my Sunday School teachers had on my faith and life. The two men who taught my junior high Sunday School class were both fathers of younger children; one was a businessman, the other a social worker. At our first class, I remember them saying that they both liked hanging out with teenagers and that the in this important ministry, as center leaders, teen years were a really important time for figuring out who we were and what life was all about. They wanted to help us on this journey and to share their time, their support and their faith with us. These two men created a safe space in which my friends and I could think and talk about not just how you can get involved. You can also contact Bible stories and faith, but all those awkward issues and touchy subjects (like relationships, peer pressure, and tough choices). They imparted some life lessons that I still carry with me today.

Then I started to think about some of my other Sunday School teachers and I was surprised to realize what a diverse group they were. There were a few young moms and dads in the group, but most of my faith teachers were older women and men who either didn't have children or whose children were grown and no longer in Sunday School. I'm so grateful to them for continuing to

give of themselves to nurture my faith and the faith of future generations.

When you think about children and youth of our church, which age group comes to mind? The preschoolers? Elementary? Middle school? High school? Which group makes you smile or which one could you see yourself working with?

Our Christian Education program has been blessed by many wonderful teachers, and we're hoping that many will want to continue to serve in this way. We also need some new folks to join us shepherds and team teachers. We hope you will think about how God is calling you to nurture the faith of our children and youth. All are invited to come to our new curriculum information night on Monday, May 12 at 7:30 pm to learn more about our Church School leaders (Suzy Rishel, Jocelyn Fontana, and Jen Dixon) if you are unable to attend but would like to help.

Come, help us keep the promise we make every time we baptize a child or adult – to nurture them in faith and to help them know and follow Jesus. The future of their faith depends on us.

The Ministry of Our Deacons

Three times mention is made in the Gospels of how children wanted to come to Jesus and how the Disciples tried to turn them away. Three times the writers recount that Jesus rebuked them and said, "Let the children come to me! Never send them away! For the Kingdom of God belongs to those who have hearts as trusting as these little children."

Can you imagine the excitement of the children when they were allowed to come, when Jesus told them how much he loved them as well as all people, individually – personally? They understood that Jesus meant everyone – young and old, rich or poor, strong or weak – and yes, especially those in greatest need, those held in the lowest esteem. How it must have impressed the children that Jesus would go out of his way to bless them and to touch and heal the sick, the lame, the despised, the lost, the hungry and the outcasts.

Children love to hear the stories of the Bible that tell them God loves them and that they are to love each other. There is a wonderful Vacation Bible School song sung by children that I learned over twenty five years ago. It would be their natural response to Jesus' love and command as demonstrated in his own life. It was written by Judith Helms and goes like this:

"Let me be your hands, dear Jesus,
helping those who come my way.
Let me be your feet, dear Jesus,
running errands every day.
Let me be your voice, dear Jesus,
telling people of your love.
Let me share your work, dear Jesus,
Me on earth and you above.
Let me be your ears, dear Jesus,
hearing those who cry for help.
Let me share in helping others
and not just think of myself."

As a new Deacon, I have been so deeply touched to see how your Deacons go about daily, quietly and behind the scenes carrying out their mission to serve Jesus and show God's love for all of His children in the world. Today they are calling, texting and e-mailing to communicate and set up meetings to visit the sick, pray with the homebound and to arrange for deliveries of food. I can't help but think that all of them were at one time just like the children in the Gospels who came to Jesus and were blessed. I wonder, did they hear and learn this song too?

Your support is important, as the need in recent months has been great. April 2014 hit an all-time high: 500 bags given out to persons in need at the food pantry. Our visitation team has been meeting and praying with so many recently hospitalized, recovering from or dealing with illness or end of life issues.

New in the Church Library

Biblical scholar Elaine Pagels' recent book Revelations; Visions, Prophecy & Politics in the Book of Revelation (226 P) is a profound exploration of the Bible's strangest and most controversial book. She writes that Revelation represents in coded form the fierce arguments between lewish and gentile Christians near the end of the first century, somewhat like political cartoons. For example, "When John says that 'the beast that I saw was like a leopard, its feet were like a bear's and its mouth was like a lion's mouth,' he revises Daniels' vision to picture

Rome as the worst empire of all." She explores the ways Revelation has been interpreted over time, and how each new generation has seen its own conflicts, suffering, and hope reflected in powerful images of cosmic war and divine victory. In addition, Pagels discusses other apocalyptic writings from the same period, and how this one nearly missed being included in the Bible. Although scholarly, it is clearly written and a fascinating study of this mysterious book.
