The Disciple

On the Way to GA! "ABOUND IN HOPE"

This month, I'm headed to Detroit for the 221st General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA) which will take place June 14-21. I am one of 4 commissioners elected and sent by our Presbytery to this biennial meeting of our national denomination. Although I've been Presbyterian my whole life, I've never been to GA before, so I thought it might be helpful to learn a bit more about GA and share it with you.

Did you know?

- The PC(USA) has approximately 1.8 million members in over 10,000 congregations in the US? These congregations are organized into 173 presbyteries (district governing bodies) which make up 16 synods (regional governing bodies). FPC Yorktown is a congregation of the Presbytery of Hudson River which is located in the Synod of the Northeast.
- This year's General Assembly will have 654 commissioners who are elected by their presbyteries to attend and vote on business at the assembly. Half of the commissioners are ruling elders (lay leaders) and half are teaching elders (ministers). There are also 219 advisory delegates from different groups – young adults, theological students, missionaries and ecumenical representatives.
- In addition, another 3000-4000 people from 50 states and many different countries will attend GA. Some of these will be delegates from sister denominations around the world. Others will be representatives of various organizations within the PC(USA) and the broader church. Many will have exhibits and booths set up in the huge exhibit hall. Still others will be there just to observe. Whatever their purpose, that's a lot of people!
- The purpose of the General Assembly is to discern the mind of Christ and the will of God for the PC(USA) through worship, conversation, committee meetings, and plenary sessions. It is a weighty assignment, but one that we believe and pray will be guided by the Holy Spirit. "We begin and end with worship, and in between there are celebrations, deliberations and inspirations for everyone."

The General Assembly will act on issues ranging from theology (what we believe) to social witness (how we live our faith in the world) to self -governance (how we organize ourselves to



be the most faithful and effective church we can be). There will be a number of "hot button" issues before the GA this year, including marriage equality and Israel/Palestine relations. GA will act on hundreds of items of business which it receives through the reports and recommendations of various assembly entities and through overtures from synods and presbyteries. It will be a busy 8 days!

This year's theme is "Abound in Hope," based on Romans 15:13. As we have been discussing in our Thursday morning study group on the Great Emergence, our church and our world are in the midst of an era of profound transition. The church is wrestling with many challenges to its identity and purpose in the world. As we live into the uncertainties and opportunities of God's future, our anchor is the hope we know and cling to in Jesus Christ, who promises to go with us wherever God leads.

As our General Assembly convenes in Detroit and as God leads us into the future, please pray for all those working to be faithful to God's future. I'll look forward to sharing my adventures with you when I return!

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit. (Romans 15:13)

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Planned Giving: Living Forward, Giving Forward

Our church family has been a blessing to us throughout our lifetime, an integral part of our spiritual journey. But when it comes to our estate planning, do we consider our church family in our plans?

Our church believes in being able to serve God and our community in the next few days, months, years, and even decades. Planned Giving is about making a choice to give toward a better future for those we care about – including our church family. Planned Giving provides a long-term contribution to strengthen our church family and to make a difference for the future.

There are many different ways to give a gift to the church for the future: wills, charitable trusts, and insurance policies, to name a few. The most common form of a Planned Gift is through a will. Now is a good time to review our wills and estates in any event, since too many Americans put off this effort, and sometimes end up failing to provide for those they love.

A simple statement like this can be included in a will: "I give and bequeath the sum of \$ _____ (or the percentage of _____) to be used for the general program of the First Presbyterian Church of Yorktown in Yorktown Heights, NY, 10598, USA." A will is a unique document and must be structured to fit the needs and estate plans of each individual in accordance with the laws of the state in which each of us lives. Therefore, we should always consult with a lawyer to assist us in drawing up our will. Drawing up a will helps us provide for the future of the ones we love, and it can also help the future mission of our church.

How can a Planned Gift through a will help our church? Please read these words from Beryl Harper, whose late husband Jim remembered our church in his will a few years ago:

"I am pleased to deliver the enclosed check as a bequest in Jim Harper's will to the First Presbyterian Church of Yorktown...

We lived in Yorktown for 27 years and were members (of the church) for almost 20. Jim particularly enjoyed the camaraderie of singing in the choir with the bass section. He also served on the Corporate Affairs Commission, now Operations, and was instrumental in installing a wheelchair-accessible bathroom many years ago. Our daughters both participated in many of the church activities during their school years; two that stand out in my memory are the choirs and the Midnight Run."

Jim's gift has helped the mission of our church, and his generosity endures as a tribute to his faith.

Our Session has approved the establishment of an endowment fund, into which we recommend Planned Gifts be directed. As that endowment fund grows, our church will benefit from the resources the fund generates to further our church mission, but more importantly, future generations will see the benefits as well.

Please contact any member of our Planned Giving Committee (as part of our Stewardship Commission) with any questions. The final choice is, of course, up to each individual, and when we make a Planned Gift through a will, we must access legal counsel, separate from our Church, to finalize our commitment. But this is a commitment that will extend well into the future, to support the most enduring endeavor we can imagine, the work of God.

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The Ministry of Our Deacons

"We're Here to Serve" words & Music by Sarah Moore

> How many needs are in this world? Seems too much for any boy or girl Start with one and when you're done, Start all over again. (Refrain) Find a Place where you can serve. Lend a hand to heal a hurt. Make a difference in your world. We all are here to serve.

You may be starting to realize by now how much I love singing with children and how simple the message of the Gospel really is - when put into words children can understand. But how do we know we are here to serve? Answer: Because Jesus our Lord and Master has shown us and told us so.

The Gospel of John is the only one of the four Gospels that tells of the time during the Last Supper that Jesus took off his robes, tied a towel around himself and began to wash his disciples' feet. Peter was adamant. "No, Master you will not wash my feet!" Jesus continued what he was doing. He answered Peter, saying, that unless he allowed Jesus to wash his feet, Peter would not be able to partner and work with him in building the Kingdom.

How quickly Peter exclaimed," Then wash my hands and head as well....not just my feet." When Jesus was finished he said,".... I am your Lord and Master. I have given you all an example to follow. Do as I have done to you....that is the pathway of blessing." For the complete account of this story see John chapter 13.

What a humble act out Savior performed! What an incredible glimpse into Jesus' true character and the character Jesus wants all of us to adopt. As Christians we are to follow Jesus' example of ministering to and serving one another.

BUT, how many times have you wondered just how you could serve? How you could help? There are as many ways as there are people, really! We all have such varied and wonderful talents and abilities that are meant to be used and shared.

Recently I spoke with Jane Amato, one of our Deacons. Jane has been ordained as a Deacon for many, many years now. She may actually be among one of our "oldest" Deacons – in terms of years of service – that is. I asked Jane how she had become a Deacon and why she had returned over and over again for another three year term of service. Jane simply said," Well, I was asked."

To which I heard myself reply," You were asked????"

"Yes, I was asked and I thought that if they were asking me, there must be a need. I didn't really know what Deacons did but I had been wondering how I could serve and become more involved in living out my faith."

Jane told me she also wondered about making a commitment for three years and whether her part would be of any significance. Quickly, however, she came to see all of the work that needed to be done. Jane learned that in working together with a group of people committed to serving in Jesus' name to build the Kingdom, that there was much she could do that was significant.

Jane was saddened at the end of her first year when 1/3 of the group finished their term and were replaced by newly ordained Deacons. Would the new ones be as good? Would it be hard to get to know them? Could they now be as effective?

To Jane's surprise, she found that her fears were groundless. The newly ordained Deacons turned out to be wonderful people, too! She made more friendships in the church! "I became more and more exposed to other people who shared my faith and were committed to following Jesus' example of showing God's love for each and every person. I felt good that I could help make a difference."

And therein was the blessing just as Jesus had promised!! Jane experienced for herself all of the fullness of feeling that comes with loving and serving. Saint Francis of Assisi said it so well at the end of his famous prayer - "As much as we give – that much we are given.....I die to myself...at last I am living!"

Interestingly, there are many persons, formerly ordained as well as those who are not yet ordained, who presently work alongside our Deacons on an ongoing basis in various ministries of our church - such as Visitation and the Food Pantry. We are grateful to all who contribute their loving service with us. We are grateful as well to those who support our ministries financially by making their donations to the Deacon's Fund and donating food items to our pantry basket in the Gathering Space. Operations Report

Spring Clean-up We anticipate a very good turnout of volunteers for Spring Clean-up on May 31 By the time you are reading this, our facilities will be dressed up for the summer season. Our work during Spring Clean-up entails both inside and outside work. Some volunteers spend time outside the specific schedule to accommodate their own schedules and be able to contribute.

Once again, we salute and are very grateful to Deanna Collins who does an immense amount of work behind the scenes to organize tasks, recruit volunteers and match volunteers to specific jobs. Thank you, Deanna..

Improvement Projects: Jose's work in the Treasurer's Office has been completed. He is now working in the Board Room/Music Room for painting and fixing up.

Routine Work: Jose has begun our normal spring work of getting things in shape. A/C's are being unwrapped, hoses deployed, water turned on for outside faucets, snow stakes stored, icemelter stored in the shed & sand buckets taken inside.

We have also recruited volunteers to power-

blow our walks and driveways in an attempt to cut down on the sand and grit that is carried in on shoes. Thanks to Bud Coccodrilli, Peter Marsh & Bill Fricia for taking turns at this endeavor. We have also replaced the scuff mats at each of our doors to help with this issue.

Our electrician has recently replaced bulbs and ballasts in the steeple spotlight fixtures.

Our normal remediation of the North Parking Lots will take place soon. This work entails scarifying the surface, leveling, laying down of peagravel and rolling with a heavy duty vibratory compactor. Overall, the North parking lots have remained in very good shape, but they do require annual maintenance to keep them up.

We are striving to keep our facilities in first class shape. If you see something that isn't quite right, please bring it to the attention of any member of Operations or myself. We will endeavor to remedy the issue quickly or plan for a longer range improvement if that is what is called for.
