The Disciple

What is a Christian disciple?

Before we move too far away from summer and into our new program year, it is worth naming ways our church was doing faithful ministry over the summer. Personally, I appreciated your care for me when my grandmother died as well as your care and celebration of the lives of Craig Hibben and Cal Weber. We embarked on building an endowment fund for future ministry. We celebrated another year of nurturing the faith of our children and youth. Our Stewardship Commission confirmed the faithful generosity of our membership that keeps our ministry strong financially. Over 100 children attended our *Workshop of Wonders* Vacation Bible School, nearly three times as many kids since 2010, and we sent 7 kids to Holmes Presbyterian Camp. We sent a team of youth and adults on a mission trip to do Hurricane Sandy relief work, and commissioned three Young Adult Volunteers to service with refugees in Denver, the poor of Nashville and the conflicted of Belfast, Ireland. Along the way, our food pantry was faithfully staffed and stocked for all the people who need food assistance and we continued to make meals for Jan Peek. In the midst of all of that, commissions have been meeting to plan for the fall. If NYC is the city that never sleeps, we are the church that never sleeps. Thanks to your faith and dedication, our ministry touched many lives.

As we journey through the fall, one question guides us, **“What is a Christian disciple?”** Jesus gave his disciples the Great (the most important) Commission at the end of Matthew’s Gospel. “Go and make disciples” (Matthew 28:19-20). Who is a Christian disciple? What do they do? How do we know when we are being and making the sort of disciples Jesus had in mind?

I’m sure we all have answers to this question. Some may include ways of living our faith that come naturally to us. Others challenge us to grow in our faith, deepen our relationship with God and one another, even venture into the unknown and uncomfortable for the sake of the gospel. Jesus told his disciples, “You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same

way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven” (Matthew 5:14-16). Our goal this fall is to turn on, brighten, and shine the light Jesus tells us we are to be as a community of disciples who lights the world with God’s good news in Jesus Christ.

We’ll discover answers to what a Christian disciple is in many ways. During worship in September and October, we’ll look at six distinct yet interconnected ideas in the Bible. Later this fall, we’ll celebrate people who have helped make us disciples, and in Advent we’ll look at some the characters who lived as disciples even before Jesus gave the church its great commission. Our Church School kicks off a new curriculum called **Spark** that “strives to spark new life in Christian communities” including at home. We’ll be introducing two different daily devotions at the picnic (one in booklet form and the other in digital form for smartphones/ computers) that we can do together. Tami will be introducing a new adult Bible study program called **Covenant** that helps us grow in our understanding of scripture and call to discipleship. Finally, we’ll be invited to take action as Christ’s disciples: to care for the earth (September 21), to better understand how Christian witness and advocacy come together in our lives (September 27&28), and to engage more deeply in our ministry of food justice (October 18). You can read more about all of these in the following pages.

With so many ways to nurture our faith together and live our discipleship, I hope you will join us at the worship service and picnic on Sunday, September 7 to kick off the new year. Thanks to our commissions and committees for your ongoing work this summer and planning for this fall. Our church will continue to grow in faith and action through your planning and work.

"Just Eating" - A Food Justice Conference

Food choices matter. They matter to the workers in the field, to the sustainability of our environment, and to the health of our communities. Join Hudson River Presbytery at Holmes Presbyterian Camp and Conference Center on October 18 for a full day of workshops aimed at making connections between food, faith and the environment. The workshops will build knowledge, explore best practices, and leave you with concrete strategies for engaging in community building ministries that address issues of hunger, equity, and the environment.

From the Parish Associate - How Is Your Faith Growing?

Everywhere I've traveled over the past month or so, I've seen and heard about how well everyone's gardens are growing! Lots of squash and cucumbers, greens and tomatoes, berries and peaches, mile-high fields of corn – all ripe for the picking, a bountiful harvest!

As we enter a new program year at church, how is our faith growing? Are our spiritual lives getting enough sun, rain and nutrients to grow and thrive? Have we put down deep spiritual roots in fertile soil or are we struggling on rocky ground with shallow roots of faith? Is our faith life producing much of a harvest this year, maybe some fruits of the Spirit (love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control)?

This fall we will be focusing on what it means to be a Christian disciple. Jesus gives us some advice in John 8:31, **"If you make my word your home, you will indeed be my disciples."**

One of the best ways to grow in your faith and discipleship is to study God's Word together with other disciples. Our Church School is introducing new curricula for all of our children and youth (*Spark, Connect, and Reform*) which will help them grow deeper in God's Word.

Discipleship is a lifelong journey, however, and just as important for adults as children and youth. We have several opportunities for adults to grow in their faith too. The **Women's Circle Bible Study** meets on the 1st Wednesday of every month – all are welcome to join at any time. Our Sunday morning **Adult Forum** meets at 9:30 am and will be doing a study called *Making Sense of the Bible*. For study during the week, we're excited to introduce the **Covenant Bible Study**, an in-depth group Bible Study that centers around our relationships with God, with each other, and with the world.

Come and grow your faith! See what wonderful new things God's Spirit will produce in your life! Let's make ourselves at home in God's Word so that we can follow Jesus more faithfully!

Covenant Bible Study: Come Join Us at the Table

Have you always wanted to know more about the Bible? Would you like Scripture to come alive for you? Would you like to get together with other folks for great discussion and fellowship?

Covenant is an in-depth group Bible Study that centers around our relationships with God, with each other, and with the world. It differs from other Bible studies in that it emphasizes the biblical concept of **Covenant**—the enduring commitment between God and people—as a unifying pattern throughout the entire Bible. It underscores the unique relationship that God chooses with us as God's people.

The 24-week study covers the whole Bible by moving between the Old and New Testaments—discussing books from each in a way that shows the interconnectedness of scripture as a whole. Each week's episode includes a thought-provoking 20-minute video conversation between biblical experts that stimulates further discussion and reflection among the group members. These conversations, held around a handcrafted table, serve as a model for the kind of learning and sharing that is central to Covenant Bible Study. Through *community*—through shared reflection and engagement together—we can best discover the Bible's transformative power.

To help the Covenant group deal with busy schedules, the

episodes are structured in a modular way to provide flexibility without sacrificing

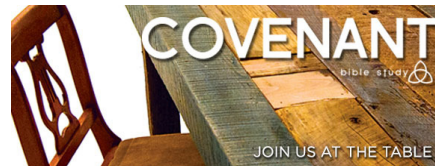
committed study. Three 8-episode segments (fall/winter/spring) each explore a different aspect of Covenant life. **Creating the Covenant** examines how the Covenant community is created and established. **Living the Covenant** focuses on how the community lives out their Covenant in faithful love—how it's applied to actual relationships in everyday life.

Trusting the Covenant looks at the crises that sometimes call Covenant life into question, and how we are restored to trust in God when troubling things happen.

Covenant Bible Study creates a learning experience where scripture meets everyday experience—within and beyond the sphere of church life. It builds trust in others as well as confidence in scripture. And it provides an exciting new opportunity to better understand God's call, God's love, and God's unexpected favor.

It has been a very busy summer! We have made time to have fun, barbecues, travel, fireworks, swimming in the lakes and at the ocean. There is so much to do and see and eat and experience. And so it seems that the summer has flown by for us all and we can hardly believe it is already September!

New in the Church Library

If you watch "The Colbert Report" or listen to public radio, you have probably encountered Father Jim Martin, Jesuit priest and best-selling author. His latest book *Jesus, a Pilgrimage* (232 M) is now in the library. Neither a theology study nor a Bible commentary, it revolves around the author's trip to the Holy Land, trying to see it as Jesus did and imagine what His life was like. He visited nearly all the places mentioned in the gospels (in "blistering heat"), linking them with up-to-date biblical scholarship and his own stories and meditations. As one critic writes: "It isn't often that a book invites you to make a journey through the Holy Land in the company of an inspiring, well-informed and entertaining guide like James Martin. Enjoy the journey, but don't be surprised if it changes you."

Church History: from "Remebered Days" by Elizabeth White

One hundred years ago, Elizabeth Brett White was eleven. She and her family worshiped at our church. Elizabeth went to college, earned her masters degree and then her doctorate. Dr. White was, for many years, dean of women and professor of history at Ursinus College in PA. She lived to be 101. When she was still young (age 86), she wrote a book about her youth titled, "Remebered Days." Here is what she remembered about this church:

"Everyone loved the little white church. It had been built in 1840 to replace the original one put up in 1738, which had been burned by British troops in 1779 after they had used it as a barracks and then as a stable. It was partially rebuilt in 1785 and used till the present one was erected. There were tall pillars in front and long windows at the side, with many small panes of glass. The floor was covered with a red carpet. The central part of the church was filled with long pews with high backs, and there were shorter pews at the side and across the front

corners, all opening into the side aisles. The Sunday School classes sat in the corner seats. The room was lighted with clusters of kerosene lamps, with round globes set in brackets fastened to the side walls. Two big wood burning stoves, at the back of the room, furnished heat, when it was needed, and plenty of it. A gallery above ran around three sides. It had once been used by slaves. In our time the section at the rear was reserved for the choir and a small organ, which cousin Ella Cumming, the pastor's wife, played. Never did the old church lack for paint or other care. Even when the people lacked money to do what they wished for their own property, they felt that the 'House of the Lord' must be cared for reverently and affectionately. Their sacrifices were repaid in their lasting influences and happy memories connected with it and their belief that eventually they would meet again as they had gathered in the church of their childhood, even if in lifetime they had scattered to many parts of the earth as duty or need required."

Operations Report

Steady Progress: Over the Summer months we have been able to continue our work in fixing and improving our facilities. Our goal is to achieve pleasant, safe and functional facilities through which we can conduct our mission activities within the Church and with the community at large. Some of the items completed over the past several months are listed below:

- Spring Clean up.
- Leveling & compacting the North parking lots. This year the work included a top-dressing of small stone.
- Regular power blowing of sidewalks & driveways to help cut down on sand & dirt being brought into the building.
- Repair of cracked and loose floor tiles in Fellowship Hall. This is a temporary measure while we are deliberating on a replacement strategy.
- Removal of a Kousa Dogwood tree that had died and spraying of others to bring them back to health. This included a treatment of root stimulation as well.
- Repair & painting of the Treasurer's Office.
- Engagement of J.P. McHale for pest management.
- Addition of lighting in storage closets in the Narthex.
- Revamping of the lighting switches for the sanctuary chandelier and balcony lights so that all lighting can be controlled from the console area in the Sanctuary.
- Rehab of the Board/Music Room to highlight the "Chapel Wall". A very big "shout-out and thank you" to Skip Mahncke for his work in rebuilding the closet doors. All woodwork has been stained to bring back the polish and freshness of the wood. We will also strip the tile floor and apply three coats of new wax to complete this renovation.
- Another big "shout-out and thank you" is offered to Bud Coccodrilli for the many projects he helped with over the summer including replacement of down-

spouts, trimming of bushes, getting ready for Spring Clean-up and more.

- The hallway leading into the Preschool area has been painted. The door jams are now bright and bold colors to make this area much more "kid friendly". Lisa offered this idea and selected the colors as a way to make the preschool entrance more appealing to the children. The preschool floor has been freshly waxed so that all is ready for the new school year.
- Routine maintenance has included: waxing of floors, repair of A/C units, servicing of all A/C units, repair of lighting ballasts, replacement of steeple flood lights, and steam cleaning of carpets.

Fall Work Party: We are planning our Fall Work Party to take place on October 18, 2014 beginning at 8:30am. We will again have major "outside work" as well as some lighter inside chores. All are invited to participate. We will have lunch at 12:30 pm. Deanna Collins has graciously agreed to pair-up people with tasks. If you can join us for this half-day of work, fun and camaraderie, please mark the date on your calendar and let Deanna know what kind of work you are willing to do.

If you see something, please say something. We are striving to keep our facilities in first class shape. If you see something that isn't quite right, please bring it to the attention of any member of Operations or myself. We will endeavor to remedy the issue quickly or plan for a longer range improvement if that is what is called for.
