
The Disciple

Throw a Water Balloon

The cartoon *The Wizard of Id*, a cartoon I grew up reading as a kid (in something called a newspaper) is running a series of cartoons entitled “Six Things You Should Do This Summer”. In one of the cartoons, set in medieval times, two soldiers are high-fiving each other after setting off their catapult. The object they have shot is about to land on the king and his aide, and the caption says, “Throw a water balloon.” That is good advice for summer. Throw a water balloon. The point is that it’s different than what’s expected. It’s new. It’s fun, and it’s certainly less harmful than the expected boulder. What are five more things you could do this summer that might bring a little splash into your life, that would be different than what’s expected of you so that your summer might be more meaningful, new, different?

Our church is doing some things that are different and new as a part of our six things this summer. We are hosting and leading **Vacation Bible School** at our church this summer for an estimated 100 kids who will learn about G-Force: God’s Love in Action. We are sending a team of high school youth and adults to **New Jersey** to work on Hurricane Sandy Relief. We are doing **Green Faith** audits around our church (thanks to a PC(USA) grant and our mission budget) to see how we care for creation with our building and ministry. We are sending a team of adults and youth to the **Dominican Republic** to work on various projects there. In September, our Middle School Youth Group with adult supervision is going to **Stony Point Conference Center** to learn about farming and food justice for three days. And, hopefully, our sixth event of the summer will be **rest**, rest during the vacations we take, rest in our worship together, rest in our fellowship, resting to know the presence of God in new ways. None of these is quite like throwing a water balloon, but maybe we’ll throw one sometime during these events.

More importantly, all of these activities are new and different ways we can live our mission as FPC Yorktown to “*Connect with God, One Another and the World.*” Each of them in their own way invites us to see what God is doing in new ways and places, how God wants to work in and through us, and how we can learn from others about our connections to God, one another and the world. Each of them invites us to have open minds and hearts and learn from others about their lives and culture. We aren’t just fixing people in these events; we are learning about the lives of others and what it means to know them and be known by them. Each of them invites us as a



church to see how our ministry connects with the world around and beyond us which God loves so much.

We do all of this because of something Jesus said to his disciples. “Go on your way. See, I am sending you out...” (Luke 10:3a). One fundamental characteristic of disciples of Jesus Christ is that they go out because Jesus sends them. To be stationary too long is to become ineffective for the gospel of Jesus Christ. To connect with God, one another and the world is to be actively involved in the work God is doing. So, Jesus calls us to ask, “What is God doing? How are we getting involved in it? How is our ministry on the go, sending us out to share the good news?” When Jesus’ words begin to take hold, it won’t be just a one-week Vacation Bible School or week-long mission trips in which we live his words. Everything we do will be about embodying them, from church school to youth ministry, from adult education to worship to our year-round work to serve our community. You and I will go. We will do these things because God has sent us to be with children and youth. God has sent us to be with the poor, lonely, and the left out. God has sent us to be a place where the broken find healing. The Bible has a word for people who understand their lives and faith as being sent by Jesus. Apostle. The Greek word means “sent”.

What six things are doing this summer to be on the go, to be a disciple who understands that Jesus sends you? How will you live your calling to be an apostle of Jesus Christ with a living and active faith? I’m looking forward to hearing how you answer those questions and what God does in and through you.

Be a Diaper Sponsor - Help Cover Bottoms in Need!

The Deacon Diaper Ministry is a new initiative to help the youngest in our community. Diapers are expensive! Parents struggling financially are often choosing to change diapers less often so that they can purchase food and other necessities. This leads to discomfort and other health issues for their babies.

While we can't offer an unlimited diaper supply to all, we want to help lighten the burden. Our goal is to set up a table at one Food Pantry per month where we will provide a 5-day supply of diapers for Food Pantry clients who request it.

Through the generosity of the Deacons Fund, we are able to provide diaper assistance for just over HALF of the people who ask. We don't want to turn away people in need, so we are extending our call for help! We have reached out to businesses and foundations, and now we are reaching out directly to the FPCY Faith Community.

Donations in any amount can be sent to the office or dropped in the offering plate marked "diapers", or entered through our online giving page. Or you can also select one of the "sponsorship" levels in the chart to the right.

As a reminder, the Diaper Drive is a ministry of the Deacons. This is operated entirely through the Deacons Fund and is handled separately from Food Pantry donations.

On Sunday, August 30, we will commission Young Adult Volunteers of the Presbyterian Church (USA) to a year of service.

YAVs are young adults from 19 to 30 years. They live in intentional Christian community, deepening and developing their faith while serving alongside partners in sites across the United States and around the world. YAVs serve for one academic year, August - July, as they explore God's calling in their lives. Volunteers are placed in community agencies or local churches, with jobs depending on the needs of partners and the skills of the Young Adult Volunteer. YAVs are exposed to some of the hardest problems in the world – poverty, violence and reconciliation, and sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ – while living and reflecting with other volunteers on the meaning and motivation of their Christian faith. All YAVs receive health insurance and student loan repayment is available for qualified applicants. The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), you and your supporting congregation and presbytery, and some placement agencies share funding of this program.

Join us Sunday, August 30 to commission YAVs from across the country. Prayerfully consider if God is calling you to a year of service, exploration and discernment.



A Reflection on Covenant Bible Study, by Karen Gerth

To tell the truth, I started out better than I finished.

Covenant Bible Study seems to be a thorough, methodical review of selected Bible texts broken into 3 study guides. 1. Creating the Covenant, 2. Living the Covenant, 3. Trusting the Covenant.

I have always enjoyed small group gatherings at church. I really appreciate being with friends that want to know God better. (That isn't a conversation that I have at work).

When I had the self-discipline to do the daily readings, "my take" on a reading could be very different from my classmates ... but Tami created a safe environment to question, explore and even laugh about what we read. It was okay to read tough scripture and be stuck on "what" or "why"?

Some of the episodes I enjoyed the most were entitled:

- New Instructions for a New Kingdom
- Grateful Love Serves
- Love Never Fails
- Renewing the Covenant
- What is Good for My Life?
- Seek Good
- Hospitality is Christian Love in Action
- Living with Crisis
- Don't Abandon Each Other

I fully admit I only selected the "warm, fuzzy" titles. I did not include titles that included Lament, Tragedy or Civil Disobedience (there were plenty of those)!

I did get frustrated for a while with Old Testament readings. I became resistant and would skip some. Those Old Testament people worshipping other gods and turning their backs on a God who loved them and wanted to be in relationship with them. At one point I decided I must be a New-Testament-only Christian ... Just tell me what Jesus had to say – but as I sat with that thought for a week or so ... I have come to believe that I'm not a fan of the Old Testament stories and those stiff necked, hard-hearted people doing whatever they wanted/ worshipping other idols ... because I may be more like them, than I realized or am comfortable with.

I struggled with keeping a daily reading practice ... but that said ... I practiced. I read the Bible every week, if not every day ... and for me that was a good step in my personal faith journey.


I'll close by highlighting how I grew in affection for my classmates. We spent months together exploring the Bible, in discussion, watching a weekly video and considering something new that you might have missed. This was very cool. It was another way to be in community.

I feel like we have just scratched the surface of all that God might have to say to us. However, His Word is right here for us and I plan to continue to build a daily reading practice, with renewed discipline and willingness to be in relationship with the God who loves us.

Operation Commission



Over the next month we will be working in concert with Tami, Chip and other Commissions to reallocate responsibilities where appropriate.

Improvement Projects

Sanctuary: work was completed on schedule and we were able to resume our usual worship in the Sanctuary on June 28th! Be sure to look up and check out the ceiling and walls above the balcony. Thanks to all who helped make our temporary worship in the Fellowship Hall possible by moving chairs, hymnals, etc. Thanks to all for being patient and flexible during that time!

Maintenance

Spring Work Party: A sincere thanks to the more than 50 volunteers who came out on May 30th to clean the church interior, tend gardens and work on the outside grounds. The daunting “to do” list was almost entirely completed and knocking off those very few remaining items is being coordinated by Deanna Collins.



Other Items: The woodwork on the east outside wall from Tami’s office to the Boardroom is showing signs of moisture and sun damage. Plans are to replace the drip molding as well as re-establish a concrete ramp on the sidewalk where the Food Pantry supplies are brought in.

The dogwoods along Route 132 appear to be doing fine. SavaTree is performing spraying treatments and there are no longer signs of disease on the older trees that we saw last year. Also, the pachysandra on the hill at the corner of Routes 132 and 202 has come through the winter in good shape.

The head of the office cooling system was not working properly necessitating replacement of the float/condensate pump. This repair ran close to \$1,000 and we will be reviewing once again the most cost effective maintenance program – on call or scheduled contractor visits.




Summer Reading! New in the Church Library:

Parenting can be overwhelming! Although there are many parenting books, when it comes to speaking with children about Christian faith and sexuality the choices are slim. In *Sex + Faith; talking with your child from birth to adolescence* (248.8 O) Kate Ott, Professor of Christian Social Education, helps parents share values in a healthy way as well as respond with confidence to the queries of children and teens. This book could be a resource for parenting groups; it includes chapters for each age group, quizzes for parents, and lists of additional resources.

When my children were young and watching "Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood," I assumed that Fred Rogers was just a gentle person who helped children feel OK about themselves. Michael G. Long's, book *Peaceful Neighbor; discovering the countercultural Mister Rogers* (261.8 L), reveals that Rogers was an ordained Presbyterian minister, deeply committed to peace and wholeness in the world. The author places Fred Rogers in the context of his time (Vietnam War, race riots, Cold War, Gulf War, etc), demonstrating that through his TV series he shared his values of radical nonviolence and unconditional care for one another, animals, and the earth.
