# **Hopeful Anticipation**

Sunday, October 19 was an exciting day that heralds an even more exciting future ahead. We (Chip and Tami) appreciated the overwhelming vote of confidence in us to be your pastors and a sense of trust that God has called us all together to do wonderful ministry for our church and in our wider community. We enthusiastically answer your call to us and say, "We do!" We are looking forward to what God has in store as we live into this new vision of shared ministry and what it will mean for all of our work together.



The vision for co-pastors is one part of an overall vision for our church to be and make disciples. That was Jesus' commission to his first disciples and continues to be his commission to all of his followers, including us, the Body of Christ called First Presbyterian Church of Yorktown. In order to live into that calling and commission even more in 2015, we are building on the strengths of our church in four specific ways. We are increasing our **mission giving and programs**, both to the larger Presbyterian Church's ministry and by preparing and sending our youth and adults on mission trips. And we continue to maintain a **healthy and hospitable building and grounds** as a primary place where we gather together and welcome people and groups who need our space to find healing and wholeness. Leadership, Youth, Mission and Place – four ways we can be and make disciples.

The strength of our ministry this year, in the past and heading into the future is the generosity we practice so faithfully. **We are a giving church!** As we think about our commitment to our shared ministry, the Stewardship Commission invites us to increase our giving in one of two ways:

- 1) increase your pledge by 17% over your pledge in 2014, or
- 2) increase your pledge by 1% of your income.

Either way is an invitation to live your faith and generosity. Both ways may seem big, but that is exactly the sort of hope we have for our faith and our ministry – that God will do some big things through us as we grow in our own faith and in our opportunities to be and make disciples.

As you consider God's call to discipleship and generosity in your life, we hope that you will make a number of commitments:

- To pray that your giving reflects God's generosity and your discipleship.
- To give financially in such a way that it leads to deeper trust in God and gratitude for God's blessings.
- To offer your time and talents as part of your journey of discipleship to share God's love through our ministry.

Thank you for your vision and faith, your leadership and dedicated participation. All of these will sustain, build and take our ministry into ever new directions of faithfulness to God's vision for our church. We are blessed to be in ministry with you, to increase our own financial giving to ministry with you and to grow in faith together.

# Christmas Alternative Giving Market - November 16 & 23

Back by popular demand, our annual Fair Trade and Heifer Christmas Market, which is sponsored by our Sunday School, for an International mission project. Mission Commission also supports this project. We will be selling shares of Heifer animals to be given to poor women, families, and villages to enable them to work and lift themselves out of the worst of their poverty. "Everybody got a water buffalo?", if not come see us and you may even get a song with your water buffalo on November 23.

We will also be selling some wonderful handcrafted gifts such as jewelry, Christmas Ornaments, Authentic Fair Trade coffee, jams, and other interesting items. Do your Christmas shopping with us and you get more "bang for your buck"; a present to give to a loved one or friend and a gift to the world--to craft cooperatives in poor communities working their way out poverty by selling their handmade goods at a fair price. Truly a gift for Jesus' birthday. We will have items from Peru, India, Palestinian Territories, Phillipines, Kenya and a number of other countries. Celtic Christmas songs CDs will also be for sale. They were made by musicians in the Presbyterian church at large and donated to raise money for the Living Waters project. You may remember that we were raising funds last year to help with the maintenance of our Living Water system at the Big House Orphanage in Haiti. This is the same organization that provides the systems and helps to train locals to run and maintain them. Parents, we hope that you bring your kids to the market and talk with them ahead of time about our market: how these gifts are a present for Jesus' birthday that helps people, using your Christmas money in less commercial ways, and giving the world a present all at the same time. ## Pledging in 3D

Shared during Worship on October 5, 2014

Our theme for this year's pledge campaign is Pledging in 3D. This is a reference to how we experience all of what God's creation offers us. We experience things most fully in all three dimensions. We want to focus on the following three concepts: Discipleship, Discovery and Donations.

Our hopes for 2015 include four principle items: supporting the possibility of a co-pastor leadership team, increasing our youth ministry budget, increasing our mission giving, and continuing to maintain our property well. All of this increases our budget and the level of giving necessary to make these hopes a reality for our church.



However, stewardship starts well before budgets or percentage increases in pledging. In fact, stewardship is not all about money. It is not about meeting a budget. The Church is not in the balancing budget business but in the disciple making business.

Stewardship is about being faithful disciples, caring for and managing all God has given us. It is the grateful response to Christ's redeeming love. As disciples we are called to be generous, using our gifts and resources to reveal God's Kingdom here on earth.

It is hard to imagine anyone who is serious about discipleship giving one or two percent of his or her income to God's work through the church. It is equally difficult to imagine a tither who isn't serious about discipleship. So, as we begin this season of stewardship, let me invite us to reflect on our giving as a part of our discipleship. How does our giving reflect our discipleship? How does our generosity show God's generous gifts?

How are we living the full life of a disciple in the way we give? How are we giving in 3D? Yes, we want to increase our budget. Yes, we want pledges to meet our financial hopes for 2015. But the biggest goal is that our giving would reflect our discipleship and our gratitude for all that God has blessed us with, that we are following Christ's call to be disciples and to make disciples of all ages.

Exciting possibilities are in store for us at First Presbyterian in 2015! We ask you to prayerfully consider your pledge for next year.

#### **Mission Commission**



The Mission Commission is excited about our Peace and Justice Service. Reverend Margery Rossi will be preaching (see the note under Adult Education). The Mission Commission has dedicated our portion of the Peace & Global Witness Offering to Rural & Migrant Ministry (RMM), an organization that "works for the creation of a just rural New York State." The Hudson River Presbytery has been "in covenant" with RMM for over 25 years.

To get a sense of the situation faced by many farmworkers in this country, the Mission Commission encourages everyone to see the film "Food Chains." This is a film that shows the plight of farmworkers by focusing on the Coalition of Immokalee workers. On Saturday November 22at 7 PM the film will be shown at the Quad Cinema in NYC, and following the film Gerardo Reyes will be speaking. # Church History - The 1960's

- Our 16th pastor was George N. Barford (February 1950 March, 1966), his wife Barbara and their four children, Brian, Carolyn, Rebecca and Mark. The church and the community were saddened by the death of Barbara after a long illness. Later, Rev. Barford married Miss Rose Grano.
- In March 1961, through the malfunctioning of the oil burner, the walls and interior of the church building were covered with soot. Samuel Bunyea & Sons painted the walls and woodwork, two coats, for \$2,230. Insurance covered \$1,025.
- In June, the ceiling in the old Parish Hall was lowered and new light fixtures put in. Lighting fixtures were installed in the new addition, as well as new furniture and equipment.
- The church received a loan of \$25,000 from the Board of National Mission
- The annual church family picnic was held at the Presbyterian Conference grounds at Denton Lake, NY.
- The Clerk of Session reported at the annual meeting a membership of 477. The Executive Committee presented a budget of \$35,730 for 1960.
- Thirty new members were received at the service on November 28, 1965. The Couples Club was very active.
- In May, a confirmation class of 27 young people and 6 adults joined the church.

January 1966, the church annual report for 1965 listed a budget of \$57,800. Staff salaries \$29,000 including pastor's salary (\$9,000) plus manse and auto expense. Benevolences were \$10.650. Membership as of December 31, 1965 was 720.

# **Operations Report**

Fall Work Party: We had a very successful Fall Work Party with over 30 adults and four Boy Scouts participating. All of our planned work was completed. Much work was done in the gardens and inside the church facilities. The big addition this year was the complete rehab of the "hill" at the corners of Rt's 132 & 202. After preparation of the area, 20 flats of pachysandra (approximately 2000 plants) were planted. A stone channel was installed to allow drainage of water from the parking lot without erosion of the soil or pachysandra (we hope!). A very big Thank You is offered to all who participated..

#### Other Maintenance & Improvement Efforts:

We are continuing work in the balcony of the Sanctuary to repair chips and peeling of paint. This is a huge job as all sanding must be done by hand to minimize dust. We are working on small sections at a time so that we can completely clean-up following our work efforts. A big thank you is offered to Jose who has done the bulk of the work to date.

We have installed CFL bulbs in the Board/Music Room to improve the lighting, make it more consistent across the room and save energy. Thanks to Tricia Dineen for the suggestion and for working with Jose to complete the change of the bulbs. We are looking into installing LED lighting in other sections of the building to minimize energy usage and cost. We are also looking into automatic lighting shut-offs if no one is using the rooms. This latter item will likely apply only to Fellowship Hall, the Gathering Space and the kitchen.

New Bilco Cellar Doors have been installed at the basement en-

trance under Room #1. The old doors had become dangerous as they no longer would latch properly in the raised position. The new doors have an air plunger which

holds the doors open. The doors have to be "pulled down" to close them. Another set of Bilco Cellar Doors will soon be installed at the basement entrance under the Sanctuary. This will further improve our buildings and make these entrances much more safe.



Our pest control efforts under our contract with J.P. McHale is proving to be an excellent investment.

We have chosen two Kousa Dogwood trees to honor Craig Hibben. These trees will be provided by the Hibben family and others. These trees were planted by Dick Seymour and Bud Coccodrilli.

Two Pinky-Winky Hydrangeas were planted on either side of the entrance sidewalk leading from the paved parking lot. These trees honor the memory of Ken and Marianna Sherman's son, Doug.

If you see something, please say something. We are striving to keep our facilities in first class shape. If you see something that isn't quite right, please bring it to the attention of any member of Operations or myself. We will endeavor to remedy the issue quickly or plan for a longer range improvement if that is what is called for.
