The Disciple

Disciples Around the Manger

This Advent, we are listening to the lives of Disciples Around the Manger. The Bible doesn't necessarily call them disciples like the famous twelve, but they are disciples nonetheless. Each of them has a connection to the baby born in the manger, the Word made flesh, the One who dwells among us. Each of them by their very lives plays a part in telling the story of God's love made real among us. By listening to their lives, we have an opportunity this Advent season to see their connection to Jesus and ponder our own. How do our lives tell the story of our faith? How do our lives wait for, prepare, proclaim, and deliver the story of God's love in Jesus Christ and what he came to do and is doing in the world today?

In a blog post entitled "Amping Up What We Always Do", author Jan Edmiston shares that she and her family have Christmas traditions that they always do. She also writes, "It's easier to name Christmas traditions than Advent traditions perhaps. And chances are that our traditions have more to do with our own families and friends than with strangers." She leads me to wonder, "What if we made Advent the time of preparation it is intended to be by doing things that will tell both the story of our savior coming into the world at Christmas and the good news that we are waiting and serving until our savior finally comes again? What if we practiced this Advent living, not only during the lead-up to Christmas, but all year long?"

Edmiston writes, "What if we started this Advent creating some new practices involving strangers that could become what we always do?

 What if we always bought a handful of \$10 gift cards to Dunkin Donuts or Starbucks or McDonalds and handed them out to street people sometime during the first week in Advent?

- What if we always took a bag of new thick socks to the local shelter sometime during the second week in Advent?
- What if we always wrote notes to people who've lost loved ones since last Christmas?
- What if we always kept our eyes open for Invisible People – those most people don't notice – and we made a special effort to connect with them?
- What if we always spent Advent learning about a group of people (of a different religion, race, nationality) who are not like us. Jesus was born for them too.
- What if we always spent at least one meal during Advent with someone who lives alone?
- What if we always took cookies to our local firefighters or police officers or EMT workers or crossing guards or public librarians a few weeks before Christmas?"

Edmiston's list isn't exhaustive, but her ideas point to the truth of our faith. Our God gives, and we tell the story of that good news through the gift of ourselves. She concludes, "In light of the brokenness of the world, what if we always lived as allies to those who are not in the majority, defenders of those who suffer injustice, partners of those who have a difficult road to walk? What if serving the least of these became the thing we always do – and not just during Advent?" The answer: our world will know through the story of our lives the good news of God's love made real, not just in the life of Jesus, but through us as well. That is worth celebrating this Advent and Christmas season and all year round!


Congregational Support

Why didn't the congregation vote on the youth coordinator position?



One of the outcomes of the most recent Church mission study was the need to develop a youth ministry. A small team formed and took about a year to think about what a program should be. As part of that process, numerous meetings open to all took place to discuss the program. Then, the team developed a proposal. This included a part-time coordinator position. 
In July of 2013, the Youth Design Team brought a proposal for Sustainable Youth Ministry to Session. When Session approved the proposal, *funding for the Coordinator position was part of it.*

Session has been part of all personnel matters related to youth

programming. During the 2013-2014 program year, Alice Chin was hired as interim Coordinator until we were able to find and hire the right person for the position. With the approval of session, Margery Rossi has come on board. We feel we've hit the Coordinator jackpot.

Now that Margery is here, won't she take over all the aspects of the program?

No. We've learned that a sustainable program is built on a stable infrastructure *not* any single individual. Our structure is designed to 1) make sure that many hands share the work; 2) bring many congregation members into the work and joy of youth ministry; 3) help our youth see that adult congregation members are interested in them. Think of Margery as an air traffic controller, bringing volunteers and



youth together; facilitating meeting planning; helping us learn to love our youth into faith just a little bit more.



The Ministry of Our Deacons

Jesus spoke often of the Kingdom of God, the coming Kingdom, the Kingdom within, and building the Kingdom. It's hard sometimes in our everyday busy lives to grasp or remember or even experience what Jesus meant when he spoke about the Kingdom.

But recently I found myself involved in a marvelous example of what The Kingdom and Kingdom Building experience means. In mid-November, Todd Child reported to the Deacons his great concern that the persistently high cost of turkey and the lack of available funds meant that FPCY would not be able to supply all of the Food Pantry clients and families with turkeys for Thanksgiving this year. Then, amazingly, just before Thanksgiving, the concerns were "heard" on high because two major supporters of the Food Pantry in our greater Yorktown community -Polymedco and the Yorktown Lions Club - along with the monetary donations from our FPCY members produced enough funds to purchase over 2,000 pounds of turkeys.

That Food Pantry Saturday was an exceptionally busy day!! Dozens and dozens of volunteers young and "older" - Girls Scouts - middle school, high school and college kids - adults and Seniors worked alongside some of the very clients the Food Pantry serves bagging and organizing the food for $I \frac{1}{2}$ hours to prepare for the 9:00 AM opening! There was incredible excitement in the air and somewhat of an "organized chaos" as Todd put it. The Food Pantry distribution was an incredible time too. Volunteers continued to pack up bags of groceries for another $I \frac{1}{2}$ hours. There were several men who spent their time breaking down all of the empty boxes to be placed out for recycling. And yet, by late morning all of the 7,000 pounds of food had been distributed, the turkeys

were all given out and the hallways and classrooms on the east side of the building cleared out and cleaned up. Families left with food, produce, meat and baked goods to enjoy the Thanksgiving Holiday – and if that wasn't "Kingdom Building" then I don't know what is?!?!

Your Deacons need your help again this month of December. We are now collecting in anticipation of the need at Christmas. In addition to "Toys for Tots" we are asking that you help by donating "Toys/Gifts for TEENS". Items collected will be used locally as well as at the Bedford Womens' Prison so the women serving their time will be able to choose a gift for their child or teen for when they are permitted their Christmas visitation. And don't forget the "Hat and Mitten" tree located in the Gathering Space where you can bring new hats and mittens to be disbursed this winter season!

It is a busy Advent season as we all prepare for the excitement of the birth of our Lord and Savior. Let us all remember the reason for Jesus' coming. Love came down at Christmas – to show us God's love for each and every one of us. This was Jesus' message; the loving Fatherhood of God and our brother and sisterhood as God's beloved children. We welcome your part in "Building the Kingdom." Join in the excitement! Join in the fun!

Remember, for every dollar you donate directly to the Food Pantry another dollar is added from the "Matching Grant." Please help your Deacons reach \$10,000.00 in giving so we can benefit from the full amount of the matching grant again this year.

Congregational Meeting

The Session has called a congregational meeting for Sunday, December 14 at 12noon to elect 6 adult elders, 2 youth elders, 4 adult deacons, and 2 youth deacons.

Church History - Early 1970's

Pastor Ronald James stated that of the 108 churches in the Hudson River Presbytery, we are 7th in overall giving, 6th in size, 6th in benevolences, 4th in number of baptisms, 3rd in size of church school and 2nd in the rate of growth.

The Gospel ministry has continued to be preached without interruption. Surely the church has been richly blessed as many families and friends will testify, spiritually and in service to others. Ron James was our 17th pastor. William Kenny served as pastor from 1977-1980, Charles Barton as the 19th pastor in 1982, followed by Chip Low as our 20th pastor.

In 1989 the pipe organ was installed at a cost of \$72,000. It has 561 pipes. To provide space for the pipes, the walkway at the top of the balcony stairs was closed off."

Operations Report

Winterization Work:

We have completed our work to winterize our facilities and grounds. All A/C units have been covered or taken in. Snow stakes have been put out as well as buckets of sand and ice melter. All hoses have been stored inside and the outside water spigots shut off and drained. The underground water line to the outdoor prayer area has been blown out so that no freeze damage will occur. The grasses have been cut back and the Iris beds trimmed. All debris was taken to Yorktown Recycling.

Other Maintenance & Improvement Efforts:

- We have made excellent progress on the work we are doing in the Sanctuary Balcony to spruce things up and repair areas that have been chipped and scraped. All of the pews on the east side of the balcony have been hand sanded, primed and painted. This includes the wrap-around railing immediately in front of the pews and the top flat surface. The safety railings in front of the three windows have been removed, rehab'ed with new "spokes" and all paint removed. The safety railings are now ready to be primed and painted. These railings will be put back in place when there are services in the

Sanctuary as they are critical safety devices. - We now have energy saving bulbs (CFL's and LED's) installed throughout Room 14. Also, we have LED's deployed in the Gathering Space.

- Both sets of the new Bilco Cellar Doors have been installed at the basement entrances. These doors have air plungers which hold the doors open and are much safer than the old doors which deteriorated and were no longer safe to use. - EnerPath in conjunction with NYSEG has performed a lighting energy audit. The audit is designed to determine the cost of moving to more energy efficient lighting. A portion of the cost of switching over to more energy efficient lighting would be offset by NYSEG. The costs and energy efficiency resulting from such an upgrade endeavor are not yet known. We will have to determine whether the costs are affordable and whether the payback period is reasonable for us.

In conjunction with Eleanor Hibben, we have selected and planted two Kousa Dogwood trees in honor of Craig. These trees are over 12 feet high and are excellent specimens. All of our new trees were watered regularly throughout the Fall and are doing fine. This includes the two pinky-winky hydrangeas that were planted by the Sherman's and the Colorado Spruce that replaced the one we lost in the late Fall. All of

these trees are memorials to loved ones. Many minor maintenance items have been completed over the past couple of months. We depend on feedback when something is not up to par. Therefore, if you see something amiss, we would very much appreciate knowing about it. We will endeavor to remedy any issue quickly or plan for a longer range improvement if that is what is called for.


