
On February 15th we have our Mardi Gras Party in the fellowship hall. The focus will be on teaching our children about the Lenten period in Preparation for East-

We are certainly a mission-oriented church! The Mission Commission coordinates our outreach to others, and we have many mission activities, both planned and on-going. **Middle** school students are invited to take part in a mission trip to the Stony Point Center Farm in Rockland County, September 13-15, 2015. While there, students will participate in harvesting and preserving crops; learn about organic farming and food justice; experience worship and devotions with members of the multi-faith community that lives on campus; and of course, make time for some fun - possibly kayaking or hiking. The middle school

Heidi Haring is heading up a trip for <u>high school</u> students to Pt. # A labyrinth is the same thing as a maze: true or false?

False!! A labyrinth has only one path in and out, with no "dead ends," while a maze has many dead ends. Or as Wikipedia puts it, "In colloquial English, *labyrinth* is generally synonymous with *maze* but many contemporary scholars observe a distinction between the two: *maze* refers to a complex branching (multicursal) puzzle with choices of path and direction; while a single-path (unicursal) *labyrinth* has only a single path to the center."

And why does that matter? One reason is that if you aren't thinking about which direction to move in, you can think about something else. Like God, perhaps.

Come learn more about labyrinths. On February 22, 2015 Lynn Brown, a labyrinth facilitator, will join us as we begin the Lenten season with a labyrinth walk. Lynn will be bringing a portable 24 foot canvas labyrinth in a modified Chartes style. Drop in any time between 5:00 PM

and 8:00 PM, and give yourself about half an hour to walk the labyrinth and watch the video.

You can also learn more about church labyrinths in the book *Church Labyrinths*, by Robert D. Ferre` which is in our library. This book provides background about the ways that a church might use a labyrinth different from the more "generic" ways that a labyrinth might be used. The book includes twelve reasons to have a church labyrinth, including reasons such as: the labyrinth is traditional, the labyrinth is contemporary, labyrinth walking is a spiritual practice, and the labyrinth embodies prayer.

The last weekend of January, with its deep blanket of snow, was an extraordinary first in the history of our First Presbyterian Church of Yorktown. The Elders and the Deacons met together for an intensive retreat at the Presbyterian Conference Center at Holmes, New York. We each came as separate individuals that first evening - each from our separate homes - our separate jobs - our separate concerns - to meet as ONE. We ate together, got to know each other, read and discussed scripture, prayed and worshiped together - all with our focus on visioning for ourselves and our church how God would have us grow into this next year.

We arrived separately in the dark Friday evening. By Saturday morning as we gathered again in an enormous circular room with huge windows almost all around us, we all looked out at the amazing beauty of the new fallen snow and the surrounding beauty of the natural setting. By this time we were starting to feel like a cohesive group.

We focused on scripture including the passage from John 21 and Jesus' 3rd appearance to his Disciples after his crucifixion, death and resurrection. The stunned and disoriented group of 7 former fishermen had been out all night doing what they knew how to do - fishing- yet they had caught nothing. Jesus, who was standing on the shoreline, commanded them to throw the net over the right side of the boat. Although they did not recognize Jesus at first, the Disciples obeyed and cast their net over the right side. The fish they caught were so large and numerous they could not even haul the net back into the boat. With that their eyes were opened and they recognized their Lord, their beloved teacher, their friend, their leader.

We realized, too, that we are called together in one circle to

ordered ministries and to share our individual gifts while participating in various functions. We do this so that the Ministries of the Church for everyone of God's children may flourish. We do not do this alone. We do not need

to feel lost, discouraged or afraid to move forward. We can dream boldly. We too have Jesus who is the head of the church who remains our teacher and our example. Jesus is the one we look to, follow and obey in building The Kingdom of God.

Our vision is one of partnering in leadership; partnering with our new Co-Pastor leadership model; partnering as Deacons with Elders; partnering with the Presbytery, the Synod, the General Assembly; partnering with all members of our Congregation; and, most especially listening for God's guidance in the ministries and missions we undertake while living out Jesus' command to "Love one another as I have loved you." So be it.

Music in the Night - An Evening of Cello and Candlelight

This winter has brought two amazing string concerts to the FPC Concert Series by internationally acclaimed performers. Our February concert featuring violinist Dmitry Berlinsky and pianist Simona Frenkel was hailed as one of the most exciting concerts in our 14 year history, and brought the audience to its feet for two cheering, standing ovations! On Saturday March 28th the Concert Series presents yet another virtuoso international artist Andre Tchekmazov, cellist, with Simona Fenkel on the piano. Mr. Tchekmazov is hailed by the Washington Post as an "extraordinary musician". He was the Grand Prize winner of the Vittorio Gui International Chamber Music Competition and the Premio Trio di Trieste. He has performed extensively throughout North and South America, Europe, Russia and Asia, appearing at the Great Hall of Moscow Conservatory, Osaka Symphony Hall in Japan, New York's Alice Tully Hall and Brazil's Sala Cecilia Mereles with orchestras such as the Sao Paolo Symphony, the Moscow Chamber Orchestra, the Kiev Philharmonic and the Teatro Alfa Symphony. Mr. Tchekmazov's performances have been featured on WQXR, WGBH, NPR, and other TV and radio stations around the world. The concert will feature well-beloved cello pieces including the Bach/Gounod Ave Maria, Schumann's Fastasiestucke, Tchaikovsky's Nocturn for cello, and other romantic works by Rachmaninoff and Rimsky-Korsakov. We at FPC already know Simona Frenkel's ability to attract internationally known performers such as Mr. Berlinsky and now Mr. Tchekmazov to our Concert Series, which is a reflection of her own reputation as an established international performer and musical director. Come spend a warm, beautiful late-winter evening in the candlelit sanctuary. A reception will follow and a donation is suggested to help support the concert series.

Chapter 25, verse 36 of Matthew's gospel tells us "...For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me..."

Andy Mavian, the current volunteer coordinator of the monthly Noontime Meal that is provided by our church, first got involved in this ministry the same way that many of us have gotten involved in the things we are involved with...he was asked if he could step in as the coordinator and he said yes. He enjoys being involved with the meal because he lives in Peekskill and wanted to serve his local community, and he is able to fit this ministry into his regular schedule. An added benefit that Andy has found is being able to meet and work with other members of our congregation. Lately, the shopping has been done by either Ruth Deemer or Pat Prauda. In December Pat shared a heart-warming story with the congregation about a recent shopping trip during which she was talking with a man in front of her on the checkout line. During the conversation she told the man that she was shopping for the meal that would be provided to the clients of the Salvation Army. The man finished paying for his groceries, and when Pat had finished having her groceries scanned the man returned and paid her bill in its entirety and asked for nothing in return.

The meal preparation is a group effort that involves 8 to 10 volunteers from a base that has included the likes of John Collins, Pam Darreff, George Forbes-Freeze, Dick Hunter, Bruce Johnson, Mary-Lou McArdle, Dick & Squeegee Mills, Jerrie Pospisil, Jocelyn Ramage, and Ken Sherman. (Apologies to anyone not mentioned.) It is a fun and lively group, so the hour or two it takes to prepare everything passes quickly. We have been fortunate to have Lynda Spring and Marleen DeVaul as regular volunteers for the serving of the meal, which at times has counted as many as 50 people enjoying the meal.

The list of previous coordinators includes Squeegee Mills and Ken Sherman. The list of volunteers varies each month, although there are some that help frequently. Squeegee and Ken made a tremendous impact when they assembled a great and dedicated crew of volunteers shoppers, meal preparers, and meal servers which made the whole effort easy and enjoyable. Other churches and community service groups prepare meals on other days, meaning that the volunteers from FPCY are clearly just one part of a larger group effort answering God's call.

Typically, the meal consists of a ham and vegetable casserole (a whopping six large trays), a beverage and a delicious, home-made dessert often made by Tricia Dineen. The meal is prepared one day at the Peekskill Presbyterian Church (705 South Street) and then served the next day at the Peekskill Salvation Army (117 Nelson Avenue).

The upcoming meal preparation dates are March 10th and April 7th, with the meal served the following day. It is a good opportunity to connect with God, one another and the world through fellowship and service. New volunteers are always welcomed to help in any way they can as we all have busy schedules and many hands make for light work.

The Lemon Tree (261.8 T) of the title refers to a tree in the backyard of a home in Ramallah, Israel, owned by Dalia, a Jewish woman whose family of Holocaust survivors emigrated from Bulgaria. But before Israel gained its independence in 1948, the house was owned by the Palestinian family of Bashir, who meets Dalia when he returns to see his family home after the Six-Day War of 1967. Journalist Sandy Tolan traces the history of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict through the parallel personal histories of Dalia and Bashir and their families—all refugees seeking a home. As Tolan takes this true story forward, Dalia struggles with her Israeli identity, and Bashir struggles with decades in Israeli prisons for suspected terrorist activities. Although there's no magical solution, through Dalia and Bashir's friendship one of the world's most stubborn conflicts comes alive.

## Highlights of Church History

Taken from the Yorktown Historical Society talk given on 1/28.

1997 was a big move to add to the building, bringing the total area to 6,380 sq. ft. Six new classrooms, new kitchen fellowship hall, gathering area, coat room, nursery and a walkway to the church were added at a cost of \$1.2 million.

1985 - The sanctuary was restored to its original integrity by Tom Clemmons, restoration carpenter from Ossining. Seven layers of paint was stripped, and the window sashes were replaced while retaining the windows and glass. The soffit was rebuilt, and the tower spirals were replaced using pine and later mahogany. Layers of shingles were stripped from the roof and replaced with cedar shake. Scaffolding was put up in the church to redo the inside and ceiling. Cost was about \$180,000.

1969-70 was a big turning point in the church. We were growing, along with the town of Yorktown. The membership was over 1,000, both services were full, and we had two choirs. The O'Connell house next to the manse was for sale. The asking price was \$75,000 for house plus 2.747 acres. In January,

1969, the congregation gave approval to purchase the property for future expansion and as long range protection to the church. The Presbytery of Hudson River agreed to lend the down payment of \$20,000. Mr. O'Connell agreed to take back a mortgage for \$55,000 at 6% with a 25 year amortization and with payment privileges. After 12 years, the rate of interest was to be renegotiated. The pastor's office and that of the secretary were moved to the new house. Funds from the estate of Gertrude Hyatt were used for a new entrance to the building and basement so young people might use that space. A three year campaign for funds known as the Program for Progress was initiated in September, 1969. The house later became the pastor's house. In 1983, the old manse and newer manse/office building were sold. Money was used for housing for the pastor. More to follow in future Disciples. Pictures of the church building at different years and seasons will be posted on the history board....take a look!
