As we reminisced about their 50 years of active membership, I was truly amazed by the many ways my parents have served God through their church - youth group leaders (before I was even born), elder and deacon (numerous times), moderator of deacons, chair of the board of trustees, Sunday school teacher, chair of a major campaign, Stephen minister, mentor to seminarians, worship committee (helped purchase hand bells and refurbish historic organ), Christian education committee, mission commission (helped resettle Cambodian refugees), and the list goes on and on... There are very few jobs in that church that they haven't done. Planned Giving: Living Forward, Giving Forward



Our church family has been a blessing to us throughout our lifetime, an integral part of our spiritual journey. But when it comes to our estate planning, do we consider our church family in our plans?

Our church believes in being able to serve God and our community in the next few days, months, years, and even decades. [After all, the Christian Church is the oldest organization in continuous operation – for two thousand years - in the world today!] Planned Giving is about making a choice to give toward a better future for those we care about – including our church family. There are many different ways to give a gift to the church for the future: wills, charitable trusts, and insurance policies, to name a few. The most common form of a Planned Gift is through a will. Now is a good time to review our wills and estates in any event, since too many Americans put

off this effort, and sometimes end up failing to provide for those they love.

A simple statement like this can be included in a will: "I give and bequeath the sum of \$ _____ (or the percentage of _____) to be used for the general program of the First Presbyterian Church of Yorktown in Yorktown Heights, NY, 10598, USA." A will is a unique document and must be structured to fit the needs and estate plans of each individual in accordance with the laws of the state in which each of us lives.

To support Planned Giving, our Session approved the establishment of an endowment fund, into which we recommend Planned Gifts be directed. As that endowment fund grows, our church will benefit from the resources the fund generates to further our church mission, but more importantly, future generations will see the benefits as well. We can also contribute directly into the endowment fund with cash gifts during our lifetimes, as the story of Nellie Keller relates (see below).

Please contact any member of our Planned Giving Committee or the Stewardship Commission with any questions. The final choice is, of course, up to each individual, and when we make a Planned Gift through a will, we must access legal counsel, separate from our Church, to finalize our commitment. But this commitment will extend well into the future, to support the most enduring endeavor we can imagine, the work of God.

THE LEGACY OF NELLIE R. KELLER

We celebrated the life of Nellie Keller a few months ago, when she passed away at the age of 106. Nellie held the current record for longevity at our church, being a member of the First Presbyterian Church of Yorktown for 74 years, although her daughter, Barbara Wilkens, is catching up with 71 years as a member of our church!

The church was a big part of Nellie's long and prosperous life. She taught Sunday school and played the piano at church. She would arrange flowers for the church, picking them from her garden and arranging them in the church for whatever event was happening. She had seven children, five girls and two boys. All seven children were confirmed in our church, and all five daughters were married in our church.

At the service honoring her life, the many aspects of her legacy were celebrated: as a great-great grandmother, she had over 100 direct descendants. Her zest for life and her sterling character were described with great affection. Think of all the epic events she witnessed during her lifetime: two world wars, women winning the right to vote, the Great Depression, profound social changes, and technology that took her from the horse-drawn carriages of her youth to traveling the world by jet as an adult.



But Nellie was also the first member of our congregation outside of the governing body of the church to give to the new endowment fund, donating a gift in 2014. As her daughter Barbara described it, "She heard about what the church was trying to establish, and she just thought it was the right thing to do." So in her 106th year, this amazing woman extended her legacy even further, giving generously to support the mission of our church well into the future.

Fifteenth Year Celebration for Simona on June 7th!

During both worship services on June 7th, the First Presbyterian Church of Yorktown will honor Simona Frenkel who has been our Director of Music since 2000. Over the last 15 years, Simona has developed and nurtured a dynamic musical program to enhance the worship life of our church, adding a youth hand bell choir, and introducing instrumentalists and professional musicians to Sunday worship and special services. She is welcoming to all members of our church with an interest in music, and is always encouraging newcomers to join the choir! Simona is also the Musical Director of the FPC Concert Series, which recently completed its fourteenth season, offering 66 concerts to the church and surrounding community.

Did you know she began her solo career at the age of eight with a solo debut at the Hall of Columns of the National Philharmonic of Ukraine? And in 1994 was celebrated as the youngest organist to receive *Honored Artist of the Ukraine*, one of the most prestigious musical awards in Ukraine? A reception in her honor will be held following the 10:45 worship service in Fellowship Hall.







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The Ministry of Our Deacons

Jesus loves me! This I know, For the Bible tells me so; Little Ones to Him belong; They are weak, But He is strong.

Jesus loves me! This I know, As he loved so long ago, Taking children on His knee, Saying, "Let them Come to Me."

Remember this hymn?! It's so simple...so sweet....so dear... I don't hear it sung very often, yet when I do it brings back such a good feeling from childhood. I remember Sunday school and Vacation Bible School days when we all would sing that hymn and just wail out the refrain: YES, Jesus loves me! Yes, JESUS loves me! Yes, Jesus loves ME! The Bible tells me so.

What an incredible feeling, as a child, to think that, YES!, Jesus loves ME. And the Bible does tell us so. In three of our Gospels – Matthew, Mark and John, the story is told of mothers who wanted to bring children to Jesus to have him bless them. Sometime later we know that a young boy will bring a few loaves and fished to Jesus and Jesus will feed 5,000. The Disciples had started to turn that boy away too before Jesus rebuked them.

In each of the Gospel versions of the story the Disciples rebuked the women. Rebuked! I looked it up. Rebuke -v. to scold in a sharp way -t to force back, n. a sharp reprimand.

Imagine the scene. The mothers who love their children are eager to approach Jesus whom they have heard so much about. He heals the sick, the lame, the blind. Jesus has raised a Centurion's daughter from the dead and she was not even Jewish!

The Disciples were firm. They told the mothers to go away. They believed they were doing the right thing. After all, Jesus is a busy man... He has more important things to do. But wait! What happens next? Jesus calls the children over to Him. He lets them come and sit on his lap. Jesus blesses each one of the children. He shows his love for each and every one of them. Then he turns to his Disciples and says, "Let the little children come to me! Never send them away! For the Kingdom of God belongs to those who have hearts as trusting as these little children's. And anyone who does not have their kind of faith will never get within the Kingdom's gates."

Indeed, that was Jesus' message all along. God our Heavenly Father loves each and every one of his children – and especially the youngest and most vulnerable of all – the little children. This message may not sound very important to us – we've all hear it so many times – but for the Jewish people it was new and radical. In their minds their God, the God of their forefather, was a God of the "group." The Hebrew, as a group, were God's chosen people. Here is Jesus saying, "No, you are mistaken...God loves each and every one of you individually – unconditionally - even and especially the children! This is radical!!

As a congregation we are committed to looking for ways

and means and places to carry out Jesus' command to love one another as he has loved us and as God loves us. You are aware that the Deacons have many ministries that are aimed at sharing God's love by helping others.

We have recently recognized a need and have committed to a Ministry of delivering diapers whenever we can to clients of our Food Pantry with young babies who are struggling to afford clean diapers for the their children. We have become aware that there are parents who, out of necessity, reuse soiled diapers because they simply do not have the means to provide what is needed by their child. The Deacons have been praying and looking for ways to make this ministry more effective and are reaching out to you to help them make this a reality.

Be a Diaper Sponsor - Help Cover Bottoms in Need!

The Deacon Diaper Ministry is a new initiative to help the youngest in our community. Diapers are expensive! Parents struggling financially are often choosing to change diapers less often so that they can purchase food and other necessities. This leads to discomfort and other health issues for their babies.

While we can't offer an unlimited diaper supply to all, we want to help lighten the burden. Our goal is to set up a table at one Food Pantry per month where we will provide a 5 -day supply of diapers for Food Pantry clients who request it.

Through the generosity of the Deacons Fund, we are able to provide diaper assistance for just over HALF of the people who ask. We don't want to turn away people in need, so we are extending our call for help! We have reached out to businesses and foundations, and now we are reaching out directly to the FPCY Faith Community.

As a reminder, the Diaper Drive is a ministry of the Deacons. This is operated entirely through the Deacons Fund and is handled separately from Food Pantry donations.

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For over 30 years, the FPCY Food Pantry has been serving the less fortunate of our community.

And as with many things, it started small. As a matter of fact, it was a closet. The Deacons had been reactivated in 1984 and one of their first initiatives was to open a Food Closet in 1985. Yes, it was one of the closets in the office, where food

was stored and distributed as needed. Members of the church would go to Food Patch located in Millwood and bring food items to resupply the Food Closet. As the number of needy clients grew steadily in the early 1990s, so did the Food Closet. We moved out of the church office and expanded into TWO closets in Room 1.

Over time Food Patch grew and so did we. Food Patch became the Food Bank for Westchester and we became an officially recognized Food Pantry Agency with the Food Bank in 1992. To maintain agency status we must comply with sanitation, food safety, quality of food bags (i.e. balanced, nutritious food), and record keeping on clients and number of meals provided.

The Food Pantry is open from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. on the 2nd and 4th Saturday of each month with the exception of November and December when the schedule is modified to address the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays.

In the early 1990s we benefited from a newly established delivery system which brought our food order to the church. We operated out of Room I. We would distribute between 40 to 60 bags at each pantry day, and the food products that were offered were all "dry and canned" grocery products such as: powdered milk, spaghetti, tomato sauce, canned and dry beans Soup, rice, canned fruit, and our favorite item, USDA canned pork product. In addition bread was distributed when it was available.

The Food Pantry experienced a large increase in demand in the late '90s and we were fortunate to be the recipient of grants ranging from \$15,000 to \$20,000 each year. In this period we were also able to greatly enhance the range of food offered. This included fresh produce and fruits (Green Thumb Program), breads from Panera and JV Bagels, and quality meat products e.g. whole chickens.

The next move was to Room 16 on Pantry Days to accommodate increased demand and to offer flexibility in moving clients thru the process. Room 2 was made available to store inventory. Our limited freezer space was augmented with one grant supporting the purchase of the double door freezer currently in the kitchen.

By the year 2005 we were in crisis mode because corporate and other agency grants that underpinned our funding were disappearing, but client numbers were on the rise. Especially following the Great Recession in 2008, our clients' needs have skyrocketed. The price of food continued to climb but wages had stagnated so those who were on the edge of poverty before now found themselves in it. But major funding was running out.

Current Facts:

Numbers of clients 150 families, 500 individuals per pantry

Food Supplied average 5000 lbs per pantry

Volunteers average 15-25 per pantry

To our great good fortune we were awarded a donation from The Frase-Stockwell Fund leading to the creation of the FPCY FOOD PANTRY TRUST with a Matching Grant of \$100,000. Our yearly draw down is about \$10,000 a year which goes to matching congregation (and community) donations of approximately that amount.

If you would like to donate to the food pantry (your gift will be matched by the Food Pantry Trust!) you can write a check to the church specifying "Food Pantry," For those who use online giving, there is a Food Pantry line item for this!

Looking forward, we will endeavor to continue this wonderful community outreach program which connects FPCY directly to needy individuals.

Adults and teenagers are invited to join us at 8am to help prepare food bags, distribute the food, and help recipients carry bags to their cars. Just show up at the Church any Food Pantry morning.

What's new at the Mission Commission?




From Stacey Kennealy, the director of the GreenFaith certification program:

It is my great pleasure to welcome your church into the GreenFaith Certification Program. Your application was outstanding, clearly demonstrating leadership and commitment to environmental stewardship. We are proud to welcome you into a thriving Certification community, with over 75 congregations from 24 states.

GreenFaith includes organizations from diverse religious traditions who wish to demonstrate and grow their commitment to environmental stewardship. The certification program is a two-year process which includes activity requirements in the areas of Spirit, Stewardship, Justice and Communications. Some components of the requirements are including ecological themes in some of our worship services, participating in interfaith environmental activities, conducting educational programs on the theme of environmental justice, and implementing good stewardship practices, examples of which might be reducing our energy usage, implementing composting, or conserving water. The program allows great flexibility in how we choose to fulfill the requirements, allowing us to choose activities which best match how we see God asking us to care for our world.

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Operation Commission



Improvement Projects

Sanctuary: Several areas of the ceiling and balcony walls are in need of repair. The north wall (behind the pulpit) was reworked by Dick Seymour and Jose Sandoval in 2011 and remains in good condition. On the ceiling however, there are areas of peeling which have gotten worse over the past year as well as numerous hairline cracks in the balcony walls. Dick requested Tom Clemmens of Clemco Construction for a proposal to refinish these areas and it was subsequently approved by Session on May 5th. This work is a significant undertaking in that the entire space above the downstairs pews must be scaffolded in order to safely refinish the ceiling. As a result we will lose the use of the Sanctuary for the 3 last Sundays of June. Unfortunately there is very little wiggle room in dates and this will cause some disruption to planned events, notably the Children's Sunday service which will now be held in Fellowship Hall. There are sufficient funds in our Maintenance Reserve Fund to cover the cost of this project. In order to minimize both expenses and disruption to Church life, people have volunteered to help with painting preparation and clean up however, we will be calling for more assistance to help set up Fellowship Hall for the June 14th Children's Service and the prior evening's Progressive Dinner dessert gathering.



Maintenance

Spring Work Party: Please mark May 30th on your calendars with a rain date of June 6th. This will be a Church wide effort to accomplish much work outside and inside our facilities. Minutes for Mission will be offered to the congregation this month to make everyone aware of this work effort.



Other Items: As previously reported and thanks to Jose who has done the bulk of the work, we have completed the rehab of the pews and front wall of the east balcony along with all of the white woodwork around the windows and along the baseboard. The South wall is nearly completed and work has begun on the pews, wall and white woodwork on the west side of the balcony.

The crabapple trees along the east walkway and the dogwoods on the west side of the paved parking lot were professionally pruned and thinned by SavaTree in January. Many branches were trimmed, chipped and taken away from the property. SavaTree has also been contracted to do several spray treatments of the dogwoods along route 132. Last year, we lost one tree and had to take prune many stressed branches. This spraying treatment will help to keep these trees in good health.



The entire north parking lot has been leveled and the stone spread evenly over the surface by Dick. Hopefully, as a result of the work, we will not need to engage Lawton Adams Construction this spring as previously envisioned.



Finally, now that warmer weather is upon us all air conditioning units have been uncovered and are ready for use when needed.

July 15th and August 19th will be our traditional pot luck lunch.



Check it Out! New in the Church Library:

Two new books by theologians who have completely re-oriented aspects of their beliefs:

The Bible's YES to Same-Sex Marriage" (305.38 A) begins "This book is a story of a change of heart." Author and Presbyterian pastor Mark Achtemeier was a leading opponent of ordination of homosexuals in the 1990's. He gradually realized that the antigay stance of the church was causing pain and alienation for gay people. His "spiritual travelogue" with the Bible led him to the conviction that the best Biblical insights about marriage and sexuality make it possible for all Christian couples to experience God's blessings, no matter their sexual orientation.





In Executing God; Rethinking Everything You've Been Taught about Salvation and the Cross" (231 B), Sharon L. Baker begins, "Once upon a time I was a fundamentalist, Southern Baptist and I had God all figured out." A crisis in her life forces her to reexamine the concept of atonement, resulting in her basic premise that Jesus is the best representation of God. And if that is true, then how do we reconcile the God of compassion, love, and forgiveness we find in Jesus and the God who demands a violent death in order to extend his forgiveness? If you've asked this question you'll want to read this accessible discussion of a difficult topic.
