Sunday, June 7th has been designated by our Stewardship Commission as Legacy Sunday. That day in particular is meant to raise our awareness of the legacy of faith, life and ministry we are leaving to future generations. While it's only one Sunday, thinking about the legacy of our lives is an important exercise throughout the year. What do we leave behind for the next generations? What are the values, the church, the faith, the life, the world, we pass on to them? In what shape are those gifts? And, what investment are we making now to insure that our children and all children know what we believe to be important?

In an article I read recently entitled "Teaching People to Die," Bob Kaylor writes, "It's an interesting exercise to consider what life will be like without you in it. According to some statistics, more than half of Americans do not have any sort of will or estate plan. The reasons are myriad. The expense of working with an attorney will make one consider whether that history degree could've been put to better use in pre-law. Some people believe that they don't have enough assets to want to bother with them. For most people, however, I suspect that the main reason they avoid putting together an estate plan is that they don't want to think about dying because somehow they believe that talking about it will make it happen sooner.

"Preparing to die, however, is actually the quintessentially human thing to do since it's the one thing besides birth that all of us will experience. We all have an expiration date, and, no matter how much maneuvering we attempt to avoid it or put it off, it's something we have to think about.

"For Christians, however, thinking about death should be a natural thing. After all, the first act that most of us undergo when we come to Christ is the death of baptism. We die spiritually long before most of us die physically, which acts as a kind of practice. Indeed the whole Christian life is actually a practice in the process of dying--dying to self, dying to our lives before Christ, picking up a cross and walking behind the crucified Christ...The more we can teach people to die



in the way of Christ, the more likely they are to find new life in the present and in the future."

There is much to consider in Kaylor's words. They point us toward the legacy we will leave behind, whether intentionally or not. Yet, as I consider them, I am aware of the legacy of new life we are already creating.

I give thanks for another year of team teaching confirmation classes with Ellen Miles, Pam Darreff, Gordon Braudaway and David Monk. I give thanks for the opportunity to nurture the faith of ten young people, who I believe will make a difference in this world, and to celebrate an important moment in their faith journey on May 3rd.

I give thanks for the women of our lives, mothers biological and/or spiritual, who have passed on a legacy of what it means to be the people God created us to be, and for women everywhere who are working for a better world, oftentimes at great risk to themselves (May 10).

I give thanks for the birthday of the church on Pentecost (May 24), a reminder that we have received a faith, ministry and mission that started long before us and will go on long after us and that we are called to receive it and pass it on faithfully to the next generations.

I give thanks for the legacy of growth and learning experienced by our two Covenant

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
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Bible Study groups which we will celebrate on May 31, and for all the education ministries of our church, including our church school and Children's Day (June 14).

What's new at the Mission Commission?



Feel called to serve but aren't sure where? The Mission Commission can help! We are blessed with many opportunities to connect with the world locally, nationally and internationally. Here are just a few.

You might have noticed that we are a "food church." We feed people through our **FOOD PANTRY** here at our church, the **NOON TIME MEAL** that is cooked in the commercial kitchen at Peekskill Presbyterian Church and served at the Salvation Army, and the meals

that are cooked (usually by two FPCY families) at Jan Peek House in Peekskill once a month. The Mission Commission supports these activities and wants to make sure that everyone knows that each of these opportunities to serve are available to everyone. The food pantry is an activity primarily of the deacons, coordinated by Todd Child and Bud Coccodrilli. Squeegee Mills was the "point person" for the Noon Time meal for many years; Andy Mavian has taken over the reins there. And Bud Coccodrilli has co-ordinated the meals at Jan Peek House since 2003. Thanks to all of these "saints" and the many others who make these things happen.

These activities are sort of like background music in a movie; we only notice when the music is missing (or is awful!). And maybe you haven't noticed these activities because they run, well, like background music! So show up on a food pantry Saturday, or contact Andy to help cook the Noon Time Meal, or sign up to serve a meal at Jan Peek House.

Times change, people move on but the need doesn't go away. In particular, it's time to find someone else to coordinate our mission to feed the homeless at **JAN PEEK HOUSE**. After 12 years Bud Coccodrilli would like to transition out of this role. He'll help whoever is interested in coordinating, and coordinating is the main job-making sure that two families have signed up to serve the meal, making sure that Jan Peek knows we're coming. Bud has a great step-by-step sheet he provides to participants that tells exactly what is to be done. Feel called to be involved? The **AMNESTY LETTER WRITING CAMPAIGN** is another way we connect with the world. Amnesty International identifies human rights issues and provides information and templates for letters. You can learn more here: http://www.amnestyusa.org/get-involved/take-action-now. Carol Myers has coordinated the Amnesty Table for nine years. Some years she's had help from a high school student or a member of the congregation. We also connect with the world through **MISSION TRIPS**. Can't go on a mission trip? Don't worry, help send someone! Later this year during a worship service we will be commissioning those who are using their own hands and feet to go on a mission trip on behalf of the rest of us (to Point Pleasant, the Dominican Republic or Stony Point). The Mission Commission has some funds to support these activities, and the congregation can support them with prayers and financial contributions. Look for "hands and feet" in the fellowship hall in June (see Heidi's article below). Can't wait? You can contribute on-line, at MyFPCY, under "mission trips."

We need volunteers from 8-11 am on the pantry days. with someone – a loved one or a friend – and watched helplessly as they experienced emotions like the ones in Psalm 77?

As Deacons it feels like we are always traveling between the highs and the very lows of emotions as we meet with, serve and try to help those of our church community and beyond. Recently the Deacons have witnessed and experienced significant hurts and losses as they have seen several of our long term and beloved members and their families through dark and difficult times. It is often hard not to give in to these feelings of hopelessness, helplessness and despair ourselves.

Thankfully, though, the Deacons have many ways in which we can support and encourage each other in

our faith and remind ourselves to trust in the eternal promises God makes to all of us. We meet on a regular basis and exchange experiences, thoughts, information, feelings and reactions. We also use texts and emails as well as traditional telephone calls. The many Ministries of the Deacons also give us concrete things we can do to help others.

Chuck Radke is our Deacon coordinating the Transportation Ministry. If there is a funeral service for one of our members, for example, Chuck arranges for transportation for anyone who would like to attend but is not able to get to church on their own. Likewise, if there is a special function and you would like to come, Chuck can arrange transportation for that too. Most often he does it himself!

Wanda Diaz sends cards and letters to those who may be

grieving, sick, hospitalized, homebound or otherwise in need. Thankfully, she often sends congratulations for significant birthdays, anniversaries or other major joyful events in someone's life. She even sends "Thank You" notes.

Recently, our Deacon, Carl Anderson, has written grant requests and has been able to obtain donations from area merchants and organizations to support our Food Pantry, School Supply and Diaper Ministries. Here a "Thank You" note from Wanda is another JOY to celebrate!

John Chessa manages the Deacons' finances and keeps us on Budget. He reports to us as your gifts come into the Deacons' Fund. We are always grateful for your prayers and support and continually welcome your gifts to expand and enhance the Ministries that are so vital to those in need. John also rotates with others like Bud Coccodrilli to organize the "Loaves and Fishes."

Our Visitation and Bereavement team consists not only of our current members – Christine Lazarus, Marianna Sherman, John Winget, and Chuck Radke, and Tami Seidel– but also continues to be served by faithful Deacons that are no longer in office but have grown to love and value this ministry and the people we serve.

The Food Pantry Ministry is coordinated by Todd Child and Bud Coccodrilli and assisted by dozens and dozens of volunteers twice each month as an amazing amount of food and groceries (tons!) pass through our church walls and out again into the community.

Among our new members on the Board of Deacons, in addition to Marianna and Bud, are Emma Capichioni, Justin Leftwich and Debbie Hager. They serve alongside in these many Ministries including ushering during services.

Yes, there can be much pain and hurt in the world around us. Yet there is always hope, joy and peace that can be found as we individually and together as Brothers and Sisters in faith look to God our Heavenly Father and Jesus our Brother and Savior to direct us, guide us, and sustain us as we live out our lives. 

Operation Commission

Spring Work Party May 30—Starting at 8:30 am with lunch provided at 12:30 pm

Help us set a new record for the number of volunteers participating in the Spring Work Party! This is a time not only of work to cleanup and spruce-up our grounds and facilities, but also a time of camaraderie and fun. The Spring Work Party is our Big attempt to get things back in order after a tough winter. We have tasks for all comers. There will be "lite" work and some rather heavy work. Deanna Collins is our coordinator and she works very hard to match volunteers to specific tasks. Feel free to give Deanna a call and find a task that is just right for you. If you call Deanna, it will make her job much easier.



Outdoor activities: Weeding and mulching of the iris beds Clean-up and weeding of all gardens and beds Placement of the concrete stopper chocks that got knocked out of place Mulching around the trees Raking gravel around the periphery of the north parking lots Weeding the berm and Island in the north parking lots Blowing all walkways, driveways and the paved parking lot

Indoor activities:

Clean-up and scrub down of the kitchen Dusting throughout the facilities Washing of as many of our windows as possible Vacuuming of pews in the Sanctuary and furniture in the Library

Improvements:

Our work continues in the balcony of the Sanctuary. The bulk of this work is being done by Jose. I am hopeful that I will be able to contribute to this effort soon. This project entails hand sanding where necessary of all of the white woodwork and then priming the sanded spots and painting the entire area. As previously reported, the east side of the balcony has been completed and much of the south wall has been done. We are now working in the west side of the balcony.

North Parking Lots: A portion of the rail fence bordering the west side of the parking lots got crashed and one of the posts was broken off. This has now been replaced along with several of the rails. Due to the nature of our north parking lots, a lot of the stone covering the surface gets pushed around when the lots are snow plowed. I have been working with my machine to bring the stone back into place and form an even surface. At the Spring work party, we will do some raking of the stones from the grassy areas and bring the remaining stone back onto the parking lots.

<u>Routine Maintenance:</u> Pest Management: Our contract with J.P. McHale for on-going pest management has been very successful. We have had no recurrence of ants and less evidence of unwanted critters in the cellars.

Lighting: We have had several lighting ballasts fail recently. This required replacement of the failed ballasts. We are monitoring this situation to try to determine why the ballasts have failed. Also, we are tracking our usage of electricity carefully to determine the effect of changing all of our lighting over to LED's or CFL's. It will take several months to get a good picture of how we are doing.

<u>Conclusion:</u> Our rather extensive facilities are used by well over twelve hundred people each week. This is a blessing as it is a fundamental part of our mission work and community outreach. However, as a result of our high usage and the increasing age of our facilities, routine maintenance is required on a daily basis. We don't always see something amiss as soon as a user of the facility or a member of the Church does. Therefore, we continue our requests to please let us know if you see something that is not up to par. We will endeavor to remedy any issue quickly or plan for a longer range improvement if that is what is called for.



They are in the bottom of the kitchen closet for now and as soon as a space is found in another cabinet for them they will be moved and you will be notified.

Amnesty International Letter Writing

You are invited to the Amnesty letter writing table in Fellowship Hall on May 10 as we again send letters of support for those whose human rights are being violated. We have received some information on previous cases. **Last month** we sent letters on behalf of five women activists in China, who were detained as they prepared to stage public protests against sexual harassment on public transportation. They have been released from custody, but are still being monitored by the police. In **February** we advocated for Raif Badawi of Saudi Arabia, who was sentenced to 10 years and 1,000 lashes for the creation of the Saudi Arabian Liberals website. The flogging has been discontinued, but his sentence still stands. His wife has written to Amnesty, thanking the members for the many thousands of letters. The public outcry in both of these cases, which includes our letters, has sent a message to officials in both these countries that the world is aware of and concerned about their actions. Hopefully, continued pressure will result in full justice for these victims. Thanks for all who participated in these vital missions.

Two books new to the Church Library are heartfelt and emotional responses to life crises. *Caring for Mother; a Daughter's Long Goodbye* (155.9 O), by Virginia Stem Owens, describes the seven years she spent caring for her mother, who had Parkinson's disease and dementia. In addition to vivid descriptions of the challenges she faced, at the end she details a number of specific suggestions for caregivers, based on her experiences.

John Karlik, a California lawyer, faced fraying family relationships, possible bankruptcy, and health issues. When he thought it couldn't get worse, he received a thank-you note in the mail. Inspired by that, he resolved to send a thank-you note to someone every day for one year. These acts of finding something to be grateful for paid big dividends in both his outlook and his personal life. In A Simple Act of Gratitude, How Learning to say Thank You Changed my Life (248 K), he describes his journey from desperation to hope.


