
"The Earth is the Lord's and all that is in it, the world and those who live in it."

~Psalm 24:1

Take a moment and think about this verse. What does it mean to say that the Earth and everything in it belongs to God? Every person, place and thing, every plant and animal, every drop of water and grain of sand, every speck of dust, every atom — all of it belongs to God. That is quite a statement of faith!

Go ahead and memorize this verse. Tack it up on your refrigerator, write it on a post-it note at work or on the bathroom mirror, put it by your computer or someplace where you will see it every day.

This verse is going to be our theme for the fall. Starting on **September 13** with our worship service and picnic in the park, we are going to explore what this verse means for how we live our lives as people of faith. On September 13, we highlight our Green Faith initiative and recognize our Green Team which has already been working hard through the summer toward our 2-year certification as a Green Faith congregation. On September 20, we kick off our program year and return to two worship services with Church School and Adult education. Church School is also following a "green" theme for the year, starting with the creation story in Genesis and exploring other creationoriented stories throughout the year. On **September 27**, we celebrate the faithful work of all the youth and adults who participated in the mission trips this summer and fall. Then during the month of October, we will explore what it means for us to live faith-



ful, generous lives in light of this basic truth - all that we are and all that we have belong to God.

We are also inviting everyone to further engage this theme in your personal devotional lives by purchasing a copy of the book **Earth** Gospel: A Guide to Prayer for God's Creation by Sam Hamilton-Poore. Hamilton-Poore is a PC(USA) minister, spiritual director and professor at San Francisco Theological Seminary. He has put together a wonderful collection of prayers, hymns and writings that span the globe and the centuries. It is organized into a 4-week cycle of morning, midday and evening devotions that is easy to follow and adapt to your schedule. Books are available for \$7 in the office and after worship services. Join us as we pray for God's creation and deepen our understanding and appreciation of it as both a blessing and sacred trust from our Creator.

Operations Commission

With many of the Operations Commission members away on vacation we decided to cancel our August meeting and reconvene in September. Even though the summer offers many the chance to take a well earned rest from our busy schedules, this quieter period in the life of the church also presents an ideal opportunity to tackle a few tasks that would otherwise conflict with normal activities.

The largest of these is the waxing of tiled floors. As of late August work has been completed on the Gathering Space, Pre-School, Fellowship Hall and adjacent hallways. All remaining floors should be finished by the end of the first week in Sep-

tember. Similarly, carpets in several locations are getting attention as well and cleaning of selected areas will be completed in the same time frame. Other items on our to-do list that have been addressed include repairs to lifting sanctuary ramp floor tiles, kitchen counter tops and playground gate, replacement of broken sanctuary glass panes, window screens and ladies room hand dryer and cleaning of eaves. Unfortunately we are starting to see some paint distress in several locations on the outside of our buildings. We will do our best to touch up these areas ourselves rather than call in a contractor.

If you see any items that need attention please do not hesitate to bring them to the attention of anyone on the Operations Commission as we all now share in the facilities coordination role. One final note to be confirmed within the next few weeks is that the tentative date for the annual Fall Clean Up is November 14th. Please pencil this in on your calendars.

The summer quickly draws to a close and we find ourselves back in our "normal" routines – kids are back in school, there are buses to catch, lunches to make, meetings and choir rehearsal to attend, back to work and whether we realize it or not we are already starting to brace ourselves for fall and winter.

A quick look back to summer with all of its fun, family, barbecues and vacations will also give us a peek into all that our Deacons continued to do. The Food Pantry continued to operate every other Saturday and delivered upwards of 10,000 pounds of food each month. There were times the Pantry was short staffed because of vacations but they managed with the help of other volunteers and got the job done. We even need people to pick up Panera Bread the evening before Pantry days.



We are pleased to report that the Yorktown Lions Club made a check presentation to our church during the intermis-

sion of one of the summer concerts at Veterans Memorial Field last month. Carl Anderson has reported that the Lions Club contributed a total of \$2,800.00 over the last year to our church for the Food Pantry efforts and Diaper Ministries through cash donation and gift cards from stores in the area like Stop and Shop and

Walmart.

Chuck Radke reported that "Beanie Babies" and sports cards were given away to the delight of the children of Food Pantry clients during August. You should have seen the children's faces light up when they were told they could choose these items to take home.

for someone to help out and take over-interested?



Welcome back! It was a busy, full summer, and now it's time to get our new year of activities underway.

Mark your Calendars!

The Middle School Youth Group will kick off with our Mission Trip to Stony Point Center Farm, September 13-15, 2015. And then we will meet (generally) on the 2nd & 4th Sunday of each month 4:30-6 PM.

This year, instead of choosing a new theme each month, we will explore a few topics in greater depth over the course of 4 meetings. Since we will have food justice matters fresh in our minds after our mission trip, we'll start there! September through November, we will explore what the Bible and the church have to say about food justice; we will pray about food justice; we will spend some time thinking about what we do as individuals and as a church to show that this matters to us; and then, we will find ways to serve God and our neighbors to bring about more justice! We will close this unit by attending the Yorktown Community Thanksgiving Celebration together on November 22. Join us!

There is an ongoing conversation taking place at this time about what kind of youth ministry is appropriate to offer for High School Youth here at FPCY. To that end, session and our commissions were asked to think about youth as they would visitors; how we might develop more intentional programs that seek to integrate youth into the life of the church. Because the conversation is still taking place, we do not yet have a schedule of activities. Please be patient as we discern the will of the Holy Spirit in this very important conversation. Adult Education and Faith Formation


Engaging our Heads, Hearts and Hands

Bible "Study" is, perhaps, a misnomer in our church. Our Adult Education programs are about:

- Sharing our individual faith journeys with one another.
- Wrestling with life's tough questions e.g. "If God is a loving God, why do the innocent suffer?"
- Exploring what God is calling me as a Christian to be and do in the world
- And, oh yes we study the Bible and other challenging writings by great people of faith.

We offer two kinds of programs:

- I. Programs open to all, requiring little or no advance preparation. These include -
 - One-time presentations by a guest speaker or screening of a film with spiritual themes, or, perhaps, a mini-retreat on a Saturday morning or Sunday evening.
 - "Sermons for Lunch" when we gather in the lounge after the 10:45 worship service for lunch and conversation about that day's sermon and other faith-related issues.
 - Short-term studies usually meeting once a week for four to eight weeks.
- 2. In-depth Bible and topical studies which often require daily or weekly readings and committed participation in a weekly discussion group. This year we're offering two options: Covenant and Disciple.






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Adult Education and Faith Formation (continued)

Sunday Morning Study — The Call: the Life and Message of the Apostle Paul

This study was created by Adam Hamilton, a perennial favorite of our community. Hamilton invites us to experience faith through Christ's greatest teacher and missionary. In this study we will follow the journeys of Paul, beginning with his dramatic conversion, as he spread the Gospel through modern-day Greece and Turkey. We will explore Paul's conversations with the Romans, Corinthians, Galatians, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, and Thessalonians.

Come join us at the Table - give Covenant or Disciple a try!


Have you always wanted to read the Bible but didn't know where to start? Would you like Scripture to come alive for you? Would you like to get together with other folks for great discussion and fellowship?

This year we are pleased to offer two in-depth group Bible Study options – Covenant and Disciple. Both studies involve personal daily Bible reading and a weekly group meeting which will include lively discussion, prayer and fellowship.

Covenant Bible Study centers around our relationships with God, with each other, and with the world, and it underscores the unique relationship that God chooses with us as God's people. The 24-week study, divided into three 8-week sessions covers the whole Bible by moving between the Old and New Testaments and discussing books from each in a way that shows the interconnectedness of scripture as a whole. Covenant aims to deepen your relationship with God, one another and the world.

Disciple Bible Study has been changing lives and growing faith for over 30 years. Our church is participating in testing out a revised curriculum called Disciple Fast Track. Also 24 weeks, Disciple Fast Track spends 12 weeks in both the Old and New Testaments, so that participants experience the whole Biblical story from start to finish. Disciple calls on people to dig deeply into the Bible, to put themselves under the power of God's Word, and to be transformed into more faithful disciples.

Possible group times include: Sunday evenings, Tuesday mornings, Wednesday evenings, Thursday mornings and evenings, and Friday mornings. 
Check it Out! New in the Church Library:

A review in the New York Times prompted me to read the bestseller **Being Mortal; Medicine and What Matters in the End** by Dr. Atul Gawande (362 G). I was so impressed with his critique of our medical system's treatment of aging and death that I ordered a copy for the church library. I urge everyone to read it! Beginning with the physiology of the aging body, the author describes the inhumane aspects of many nursing homes and how they could be improved, his personal experience helping his dying father decide on appropriate medical treatment, and many stories from his medical practice.

Just one example: he convinced the staff of a nursing home to obtain a number of animals (birds, cats, dogs) and urge the residents to help care for them. Many residents greatly improved, both physically and mentally, as a result. My mother loved cats, and I'm sure she would have benefitted from such an experience.

Dr. Gawande demonstrates that "the ultimate goal is not a good death but a good life - all the way to the end."
