The Disciple

“The earth is the Lord’s, and everything in it” (Psalm 24:1). Please say that verse three times before you keep reading. Even if people stare at you because you are in a public place reading this, say that verse three times. Say it three times for breakfast, three times for lunch, and three times for dinner. Say it when you wake up and just before you fall asleep. Say it before you get in your car to drive to work and before you get on the train to ride home. Say it at the grocery store, at school, in the shower, at church. Say it to your children. Say it on social media. Say it to your neighbor and your boss (I dare you!). Say it until it’s like that song that gets stuck in your head and won’t stop repeating that one line or musical section. Well, not quite that far. That’s annoying!

However, at that point, when it becomes so familiar, start listening to it. What is it saying to you? What does it mean? What does it encompass? What parts of your life reflect it, and what parts don’t? What parts of your life do you freely believe belong to God, and which parts are you reluctant to turn over to God’s ownership? This is our exercise over the next month and really throughout our lives of faith. To listen to, wrestle with, understand, question, and integrate this basic profession of faith from the Bible into who we are and how we live.

That’s why it’s our stewardship theme this fall. It says so well what Christian stewardship is. The world and everything in it belongs to God. Not us. God. Our place in the created order is to take care of what belongs to God. That’s our calling, our mission and our sacred duty. How do we care for creation, for ourselves and our bodies, for our family and friends, for our communities, for our church, understanding that all of it belongs to God? There is something to explore here



for all of us that can make life richer and more meaningful. It raises our awareness of our real purpose in life and deepens our calling and mission as a church.

Over the next month, our Stewardship Commission will invite us to pledge ourselves to live by Psalm 24:1. What pledge of our time could we give each week to someone or something else so that they know that they belong to God? What talent do you have that could be shared for the benefit of others or the world? What pledge of your money could you make to demonstrate that your possessions belong to God? Stewardship is not only about supporting a church. It’s about becoming generous with our lives because the God we belong to has been generous with us. Join us as we explore this theme and the ways it opens up new possibilities for belonging to God and sharing that good news.

On a youth ministry note, I want to offer thanks to Margery Rossi for her year of work with us. She too has demonstrated that expanding our ministry to include youth is an

Our 2016 Pledge Campaign

The theme for this year's pledge campaign is taken from the first line of Psalm 24: "The earth is the Lord's and all that is in it, the world, and those who live in it." In October and early November our church services will explore this theme by specifically focusing on:

- The whole world belongs to God, and we are called to be its stewards (Oct 4)
- How our lives and bodies belong to God (Oct 11)
- How our material possessions are a means to an end and not an end in themselves (Oct 18)
- How the church helps us fulfill our stewardship commitments (Oct 25)
- The concluding call for commitment (November 1, All Saints' Day)

Last year we discussed the four major areas of growth for our church, and we are delighted to say that in all four areas (the co-pastor model, youth ministry, mission trips, and maintenance and improvement of our facilities) we have made great strides in 2015. The giving of time, talent, and treasure by our generous congregation has made all of these efforts possible and successful.

We want to continue the great work of our church in 2016. Therefore, **we are asking each member to consider giving an additional 1% of his or her income to the church during 2016.** To illustrate this level of commitment as a way of growing one's generosity: if a family has an annual income of \$100,000 and is already giving \$4,000 a year to the church, we are asking that family to increase their giving by 1% of \$100,000, or \$1,000. This addition to the previous year's pledge would give a total yearly pledge for 2016 of \$5,000 (about \$96 per week). If your annual income is \$50,000 and you give \$1,000, a 1% increase would be \$500 and would bring your annual pledge to \$1,500 (less than \$30 per week).

We ask all of us to consider prayerfully how God has made us stewards of all that is around us and how the church helps each of us on that journey. We can pledge online or fill out the pledge card (being mailed out at the beginning of October), and we ask, if you are able, to make your pledge commitment for 2016 by November 1 of this year, because the pledges will be dedicated during that service.

For gifts of time and talent, we thank everyone who is actively engaged in our church, and we ask those who are not yet engaged to consider the many activities of our church and to select one that inspires you the most. There is always room in our congregation for anyone who wants to give of him- or herself to the church and its mission.

As always, thanks to all for making this church so vibrant and inspiring. What the Lord has made and given to us is astounding. We have not always been the ideal stewards of these gifts, but God has given us the capacity to change and improve. With that hope, reinforced by our faith that nothing can separate us from God's love, we will continue to accomplish so much together.

FOOD PANTRY MATCHING GRANT UPDATE

Give to the food pantry that our gifts may be matched.

So far this year, nearly \$4,000 has been given to the food pantry match. Our goal each year is at least \$10,000.

We're saving energy through lighting changes! NYSEG is the church's energy supplier, and they have a program for businesses (and churches with sufficient electric energy costs) to convert lighting from incandescent lighting to energy efficient LED or CFL lighting. The Operations Commission, led by Dick Seymour, asked to have an audit done in 2014 to see what the estimated savings would be if we converted to LED/CFL technology and what our out-of-pocket costs would be for such conversion.

The original audit estimated the total cost of the project would be \$20,818 of which NYSEG would pay \$12,818 (approximately 62% of the total project cost) and the Church would pay \$6,997 (this sum included \$1,000 incentive of gift cards which we could use for any purpose). A 65% reduction in lighting energy was estimated based upon the difference in wattage of the existing lighting fixtures and the new. (This does not mean our electric bill will see that estimated reduction as no estimate could be made on the number of hours lighting was and will actually be used and the proportion of energy that goes to lighting versus motors.)

Under the energy savings program, all incandescent bulbs were swapped out for LED's, all high energy ballasts and fluorescent bulbs were swapped out for low energy ballasts and LED fluorescent bulbs and all dimmer switches were swapped out for LED compatible dimmer switches. We had previously made the switch ourselves in the Board Room to CFL lighting.

Another saving under this program will be replacement costs for ballasts and bulbs (due to longer projected life of each). Later this year we hope to have an analysis of the savings due to this program. **Many thanks to Dick Seymour for his leadership on this project!**

Note that residents also have access to rebates for making energy-saving changes at their home. For example, ConEd will pay you to come and pick up your extra freezer or refrigerator, and you can get a rebate of up to \$1000 to replace your old heating or cooling system. NYSEG has its own set of programs. Check them out!



10 seconds of idling uses more fuel than turning the engine on and off (NJDEP). Turn your engine off when you are sitting for more than 10 seconds, especially near children and in urban areas where pollution levels are already high.

FPCY YOUTH

Youth Ministry at FPCY got off to a fantastic start this

year with our Mission Trips over the summer. Did you know that of the 42 people who went on these three trips, 25 were kids? That means there's a LOT to think and talk about from these trips – youth group is a great place to keep the conversation going about what we experienced, what we learned, ask our big questions and practice being the disciples Jesus has called us to be. Join us – and bring your questions, your stories and your pictures to share! (And remember to thank all the adults who planned and chaperoned, as well!)

On our Mission Trips to both Derumbadero, Dominican Republic and to the Stony Point Center Farm, we learned about some of the injustice and problems involved in producing food: environmental damage from pesticides, poor wages and working conditions for farmers, unhealthy methods for growing crops. In both the Middle

and High School Youth Groups, we will continue our focus on food justice through November, but will turn our attention to the unjust distribution of food – who has access to healthy, high quality food and who doesn't? Why?

Lori Hylton, Hudson River Presbytery's own expert on food justice matters, will lead these meetings along with adult volunteers from FPCY. Join us as we explore what the Bible and the church have to say about food justice; pray about food justice; spend some time thinking about what we do as individuals and as a church to show that this matters to us; and then, find ways to serve God and our neighbors to bring about more justice! We will close this unit by attending the Yorktown Community Thanksgiving Celebration together on November 22.

On a personal note, I want to thank you for your warm welcome and partnership in my time as Youth Coordinator this year. I am stepping down from this position as of October 17 to begin a new ministry as pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Wappingers Falls. As I go, I am grateful for the time and experiences I had here in Yorktown, and I pray that the good work we did together will continue to grow, deepen and flourish.

Check it Out! New in the Church Library:
