The Disciple



The theme for this year's Advent came to me back in March, and it was one word. "Awaken." What does it mean to awaken? The dictionary defines "awaken" as to "rouse from sleep; cause to stop sleeping." I love sleep, and I love waking up feeling rested. However, I can certainly name many times when I was reluctantly roused from sleep by crying babies, stormy weather, phone calls in the middle of the night. I didn't want to wake up! Whether welcomed or not, awakening has an element of being awakened to a new day or to a new reality around us.

Awakening is also a central theme of the Advent season. "Keep awake, therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming" (Matthew 24:42). "It is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers" (Romans 11:11). These passages and others invite us to consider how we have fallen asleep in our faith and so are not prepared to meet the Lord when he shows up in our lives.

How have our routines of life and faith, our expectations of God and others, put us to sleep? Where have we fallen asleep in our lives, in our ministry, in our beliefs about God so that we no longer see what God is doing in the world? How do we need to be roused from sleep, woken up, so that we are aware of the presence of God in new ways? Advent is a time to wake up!

And then, the unexpected happened. The next Star Wars movie was announced. **Star Wars: The Force Awakens**. I'm a long-time

fan of the series, so my excitement for the theme only grew stronger when I heard the title and watched the trailers. What comes next after defeating the Evil Empire? The Force awakens, of course! Could there be anything truer of our faith as well? The evil forces of sin and death are destroyed in the life, ministry, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Advent and Christmas awaken us, rouse us from sleep, to a new day, a new world, a new life around us. We tell the story of a baby born long ago to awaken to our longing for a savior. We remember the life, death and resurrection of Jesus to awaken hope for new life in and through us. Awaken reminds us that we don't just look to the past as if that is the story of our faith. We ask, when will Jesus come again? When will Jesus finally finish the work he started at the resurrection, the work God has been doing since the beginning of time – the creation of a world in which love and peace and justice reign forever?

So this Advent, let's wake up together! How have we fallen asleep to God's presence in our lives? How do we need to be roused from sleep to be renewed in our faith, to be opened up to something more in life and faith, to discover new possibilities for grace, generosity, peace, forgiveness, action? Asking these questions is like an alarm clock going off that rouses us from sleep. Awakening to the answers is the life we seek this season as we wait and pray for the coming of our Savior and Lord. Wake up! Keep awake! God is coming!

Our GreenFaith Waste Audit

Did you know that a waste audit was completed as one part of the process of learning more about our stewardship of our resources within this church and its buildings? We owe many thanks to our middle school youth and their adult leaders who, on October 11th, donned rubber gloves and brave spirits (and strong stomachs!) to take on this dirty task of sorting through the contents of four large bags of trash collected from several different locations in the Christian Education building.

After dumping all of the trash contents onto tarps, our auditors began a process of sorting through and then classifying each piece of trash according to the type of trash (some of these categories were mixed paper, cardboard, plastic bottles, glass bottles & jars, aluminum cans, newspaper, and organic material). Next, they began estimating the amount of trash found in each category and finally, they began the process of making decisions about whether the contents of each of these trash categories should be considered true garbage correctly destined for the dumpster, or whether it should be reduced, recycled, re-purposed/reused, or composted.

As you might have already guessed, our auditors found that we need to improve our trash reduction, recycling, re-purposing, and composting practices. As an example, they found recyclable cans, bottles, cardboard, and art paper in the trash. They also found that a significant amount of the trash was contaminated paper plates (therefore no longer recyclable) and plastic cups, as well as significant amounts of plastic flatware. The GreenFaith team will be looking at ways to reduce, reuse, and recycle, and remember that reduce is usually the best option! More about this later!

From his letter:

Our nation, for decades, has chosen hope and welcome for those fleeing war and persecution. Since 1975, more than three million refugees have found safety and security within our nation's borders. Right now 11 million Syrians cannot go to school, tend to their land, or raise their children in the place they know as home. They cannot do these things because they, themselves, have been terrorized for far too long by numerous factions, including their own government.

Diaper Ministry Update



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O star of wonder, star of night, star of royal beauty bright, westward leading, still proceeding, guide us to thy perfect Light.

Have you seen the gorgeous star hanging on the portico of the Sanctuary?

This is a 26-point Moravian star. As a young girl, whenever my family drove from Lancaster to Annville, PA for the Seidel Family Christmas party, my brother and I liked to play a game – to see how many Moravian stars we could spot along the way. We always hit the jackpot in the town of Lititz, which was founded by Moravians in 1742. There were Moravian stars hanging on almost every porch and in eve-

ry doorway. The local bank hosted a gigantic 6-foot star with over 110 points. In the midst of all the flashy holiday decorations, I loved these stars for their simple beauty and aura of peacefulness. But I always wondered where they came from...

Did you know that the Moravian church is the earliest organized Protestant denomination in the world whose roots predate Martin Luther's kick-off of the Protestant Reformation by a good 100 years? The Moravians were followers of Jan Hus, a Roman Catholic priest who tried to reform the Roman Church but was burned at the stake for heresy in 1415. His followers organized themselves into the "Unity of Brethren" in 1457, but they called themselves Moravians since many of their founders were from the provinces of Moravia and Bohemia in what is now the Czech Republic. The Moravians were persecuted for centuries until they were offered refuge by Count Nicholas Ludwig von Zinzendorf on his estate in Saxony, Germany in 1722. From there, they sent out missionaries all over the world, including America where Moravian communities flourished in PA and NC.

The first Moravian star was constructed by a student at a Moravian boarding school in Niesky, Germany in 1820 and used as a Christmas decoration. Because of their distinctive shape, the stars were used in teaching geometry lessons. The most common Moravian star has 26 points (like ours) and is made from 18 square-based pyramids and 8 triangular pyramids. This shape is technically known as an augmented rhombicuboctahedron, which is a mouthful! The stars were quickly adopted by Moravian communities around the world as Advent decorations and became a source of commercial enterprise for many of them.

Moravian stars are lit and hung at the beginning of Advent as a prophetic symbol of the Light coming into the world. Like the Star of Bethlehem, it leads us to the manger. On Christmas Eve, the star takes on even greater meaning as God's promises are fulfilled in the birth of Christ, the Word made flesh, the Bright Morning Star as Jesus calls himself in Revelation 22:16. The star remains lit throughout the Christmas season and Epiphany, the darkest time of the year, to remind us all that the Light shines in the darkness and the darkness will not overcome it. According to the Moravian Church in North America website, "It is a star of promise, a star of fulfillment, a star of hope."

As you pass by our Moravian star, may it guide you to trust in God's promises, to rejoice in the wondrous news of Christ's birth, and to live in hope that God's Light will shine in your heart this season and radiate throughout all the world.





Longest Night Service

Join us on Monday evening, December 21st at 7:30 p.m. for the Longest Night Service in preparation for the Light coming into the world on Christmas morning. Sometimes known as "Blue Christmas" and traditionally held on the longest night of the year, this beautiful candle-lit worship service offers hope, support, prayer and quiet reflection to those for whom the Advent season may also bring sadness, grief, and worry. Please join us for this peaceful and comforting worship which provides solace and hope for the Light which is coming.

Why Blue for Advent?

As we move through the church year, there are many symbols which the church uses to remind us of the significance of seasons and days. The liturgical colors orient us to the season of the church year and engage the sense of sight in worship. Red symbolizes the work of the Holy Spirit. White and gold symbolize the days and seasons of joy, and mark pivotal events in the life of Christ (e.g., Christmas, Easter). Green symbolizes growth and marks Ordinary Time, the seasons after Epiphany and Pentecost, when we focus on the mission of the church. Purple and blue have been the traditional colors of Lent and Advent, seasons of penitence and preparation.

In more recent times, a number of churches have adopted blue as the color for Advent and purple for Lent. Blue represents hope and expectation, while the purple represents preparation and penitence. Deep blue is the color of the predawn sky, the color that covers the world in the dark, cold hours before the dawn. It is meant to inspire us in the hope of faith, and to encourage us to keep watch for the promised light of Christ, changing night into day, and darkness into light. As the color associated with Mary, blue reminds us that during Advent the church waits with Mary for the birth of Jesus.



For the Adults:





Church School "Chalkboard"

Merry Christmas and a Happy Holiday Season to all! Here is a little bit about what's happening in Church School.

We had a Special Event in Fellowship Hall — Our church school children did a fabulous job decorating our Christmas Tree! They made Cardinal birds, peaceful doves and fun cute owls (all birds from God's Creation), along with wreaths, Joy for the World ornaments and paper prayer chains. The children made seasonal cards to give to family and friends at the card making station. They baked sugar cookies in the kitchen and decorated them with frosting and sprinkles. Yum! The children also sang festive Christmas Carols with joyful voices to the wonderful guitar accompaniment of John Winget.



In our Re:form class (7th Grade and up) our youth continue with imaginative biblical experiences, discussion and honest answers to faith questions.



In our Connect class (5th/6th Grades) they have reviewed annunciation, nativity, consecration, Herod, and Authority. They are also studying baptism (Mark 1:9-11). Jesus is introduced as the "Son of God" and his ministry begins.



In the Spark classroom (Pre-K through 4th Grade) we have completed the "Fruit of the Spirit" unit. Some of the children have all nine Fruits of the Spirit memorized! How cool is that?! They have learned two songs, "Into my Heart" and "He has made me glad".

We have begun our "Jesus is Born" unit. Conversation "sparks" include:

- I. What do you think angels look like?
- 2. How has Jesus been a gift in your life?
- 3. The Angels told the shepherds of Jesus' birth. Who can you tell about Jesus?
- 4. Get out your nativity set and retell the story of Jesus' birth using the characters.

Family activity:

Start a family Christmas tradition, sing carols or read Christmas stories together in your pajamas

The children are learning Christmas Carols during gathering time in preparation for our upcoming Christmas Pageant on Christmas Eve. We are in the midst of pageant rehearsals. If your child is interested in participating, please let us know. It's never too late to join in; all children are welcome!
