I've been on the road a lot this summer, traveling for vacation, continuing education and service to the larger Presbyterian church. I spent time working with colleagues in the early years of their ministry, sight-seeing and visiting family and friends in my home state of Texas, doing energizers with 5,000 of my closest Presbyterian youth friends at Presbyterian Youth Triennium at Purdue University (including our eight youth and two adults who went), fishing, reminiscing and enjoying time with family and friends in Canada. Most recently, I spent a week at the Chautauqua Institution where I made new friends, learned about American jazz music from Wynton Marsalis and enjoyed amazing music, worship services and concerts. I will be reflecting for quite some time on all of these experiences.

During my time at Triennium, I attended a series of lectures on Young Adult Ministry, which turned out to be about youth ministry as well. The speaker started with youth ministry because the role of faith in our young adults is a reflection of how we are intentionally engaging our children and youth in the traditions of the Christian faith. It was an honest, sobering, and energizing series of lectures that didn't let me rest on my assumptions about youth and young adults. At the core of the lectures was the invitation to make Christian formation an intentional practice for people of all ages.

A massive study of the faith life of youth and young adults in this country made two key observations. First, the #I resource children and youth have for growing in their faith is their parents. As go parents, so go their youth. Interestingly, it wasn't simply or only important that parents go to church. What was most important was how parents model faith in their everyday lives, from daily devotions to discussions of faith practices (e.g., prayer, Bible reading, attending church) to how they speak of their own awareness of God's presence and God's call to serve God's purposes in the world, not simply their own. The more parents lived their faith openly, the more children

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and youth made it a priority in their lives.

In the book Five Practices of Fruitful Living, which will be guiding our fall theme Fruitful, Robert Schnase writes, "People who value Intentional Faith Development teach their children to learn about spiritual matters. They enroll them in children's choirs, Sunday school classes, or vacation Bible school. They talk with their children about what they learn. They cultivate a home atmosphere which encourages faith practices and rewards inquisitiveness, curiosity, and exploration of the spiritual life. They share wonder and honor the enchantment and mystery of life. They make their homes a place of affection where God's love is felt and God's grace is named. They teach faith."

The second finding was that young adults who had been part of an inter-generational faith community as children and youth were more likely to be involved in a faith community later in life.

Although this was a distant second to the role of parents, it's impact is important nonetheless. Children and youth need many role models of faith, and they need relationships with faithful folks of all ages. Participating in a vibrant faith community where other adults besides their parents and the youth director know the names of children and youth and care about them and where they are invited to participate fully in the life of the church is crucial to their faith involvement later in life.

In contrast, parents who drop their kids off for Sunday School or enroll them in confirmation class to expose them to religion or check off some box on the list of raising a wellrounded kid make faith a transaction (something for personal consumption and often self-blinded to God). This approach typically doesn't have a strong enough impact on the future faith life of their kids. More often, it creates a belief in a generic deity, if that, without the teeth or power of the grace and love of God in Jesus Christ to be transforming.

However, parental modeling and a church that welcomes and nurtures people of all ages is a dynamic combination which creates a rich environment for faith formation in children, youth and adults. A church that makes Christian formation an intentional priority for all ages plays a powerful role in helping children and youth see themselves as part of something bigger in this world. It models for them that the church takes seriously the commitment it makes at the baptism of each child or adult to live the story of God's love in Jesus Christ now and for the world.

So, here is my invitation. Make faith formation an intentional priority of your life. Make it a priority for your children and youth. If you don't have children or youth at home, make it a priority for the children, youth and adults you promised to nurture in faith at their baptism. Stop asking someone else to model faith and life together for them. Stop making faith a transaction. Invest in your own growth and in our life together so that you can share the gift of faith that brings true meaning and purpose to life with others. Our newsletter this month shares many ways for us to grow more deeply in the grace and love of God in Jesus Christ. The Disciple invites us to be disciples. I look forward to what we will discover together about the God who created us, the Son who saves us, and the Spirit who sustains us in the coming program year together and how we will model the depth of that good news for all people, young and old, in our life and ministry together.


School age children and a caregiver are invited to join us for YPP's 5th Annual Welcome Back to School Concert featuring Beth and Scott and Friends!

# **Stewardship Commission**

New Ways to Participate in the Offering

As we shared with you during our mid-year update, a growing number of people in our congregation are taking advantage of online giving through myFPCY. We welcome this development, which has a positive impact on the church's finances by making it easier and more convenient for people to give.

However, the prevalence of online giving has changed the character of the offering during our worship services. You may have noticed that the offering plate looks emptier, and that many people no longer have a way to participate, which presents a couple of concerns. **First, the offering is meant to be an act of worship**, in which we respond to God's grace by generously sharing the resources that have been entrusted to us. This act of worship should be open to all, regardless of how they give (online or by mail, weekly or monthly). **Second, the increasing level of non-participation in the offering paints a misleading picture of our congregation.** We are a community of faithful stewards, and the offering is an important way of fulfilling that commitment. It is also a teaching moment -- visible participation sets an example of generosity, particularly for our children.

In response to these changes, we are excited to introduce two new options that we hope will expand participation in the offering. One is a re-usable, laminated card that online givers can place in the offering plate, signifying that a donation has been made online. The cards also will contain a QR code that may be used to donate electronically by using a smartphone. The second option involves offering notepads, which we will make available in each pew for writing down brief descriptions of ways in which you intend to offer your time and talents to God, the church, or in service to others. We recognize that Christian stewardship entails more than just financial gifts, and so we invite you to place completed sheets from the notepads in the offering plate.

We hope that these options will increase participation during the offering, and open up new ways of thinking about this act of worship. (And of course, we always welcome offering envelopes, loose plate offering, and all the "old" ways of giving, as well!). Let us all be cheerful givers during the offering, with gratitude and joy for God's abundance in our lives!

### **Eco-Theological Reflection**

How is caring for the planet caring for my neighbor?

As a Session member one of our yearly "tasks" is to speak with the confirmation class about our own faith as they "interview" us. Answering questions about what my commission (Communications) does, and how I see it helping our congregation is always easy for me. Harder are those personal questions about "what I believe." I tend to fall back on two selections from the New Testament that are the simple center of my faith.

One day an expert in the Law stood up to test Him. "Teacher," he asked, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" "What is written in the Law?" Jesus replied. "How do you read it?" He answered, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind' and 'Love your neighbor as yourself." You have answered correctly," Jesus said. "Do this and you will live." Luke 10:25-28

Then the King will say to those on His right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave Me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave Me something to drink, I was a stranger and you took Me in, I was naked and you clothed Me, I was sick and you looked after Me, I was in prison and you visited Me.'

Then the righteous will answer Him, 'Lord, when did we see You hungry and feed You, or thirsty and give You something to drink? When did we see You a stranger and take You in, or naked and cloth You? When did we see You sick or in prison and visit You?'

And the King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of Mine, you did for Me.' Matthew 25: 34-40

I will never claim to be a biblical scholar, and these are likely among the most familiar lessons to most Christians. But these directly support the reason why I feel that our GreenFaith effort is an important part of how we live out our faith.

Both of these passages speak to loving our neighbor, and as Matthew makes clear, loving those who are suffering, poor, hungry, or homeless. And there can be no argument that issues of pollution, environmental degradation, and global climate change hit marginalized and poor people hardest, whether here in the United States or across the world. This is partly because they tend to live in coastal or marginally fertile regions, but also because they do not have the resources to mitigate their situation, or move away from it. Participants from our church on the Hurricane Sandy mission trip last summer noted that "We learned about the economic impact to poorer families who often bought summer bungalows at low prices and needed to live in them year round. They are stuck in an area that is prone to flooding in light storms and are sitting ducks for very serious storms. They were the hardest

hit economically, had the most homeless years afterwards, and were psychologically traumatized. Many were struggling with PTSD."

Around the world rising sea levels severely threaten the poorest among us. A recent UN report writes: "Evidence suggests that climate change and climate variability and sealevel rise will exacerbate multi-dimensional poverty in most developing countries." A report from The Nature News about Pakistan writes: "Residents say during monsoon, sea level increases and water enters their houses, making their already difficult lives miserable. They move into school buildings, which also affects education of their children. Due to stagnant sea water, several diseases also surface. Children and the elderly, particularly suffer from diarrhea, itching and other types of skin ailments."

If we take seriously the command to "Love Our Neighbor," then doing what we can to consider the effect of our energy use, pollutants, and land use needs to be part of that effort. In fact, it may be the most important way that we can show that in fact, we do "Love."

### Fall is a Great Time to Plant a Butterfly Garden

Some of you may have enjoyed the discussion and tour of the church's gardens, including the butterfly garden, tended by our "Gardeners of Eden" on July 10. Have you considered planting your own garden to nur-

ture butterflies and other insects? Fall can be a great time to do some planting. No mud or frozen soil, and your plants can get established before winter arrives, letting you reap the benefits of your butterfly-attracting nectar the very next season.

Why plant a butterfly garden? Butterflies are attracted to brightly colored, fragrant flowers, and they feed on nectar produced by the flowers. As the butterflies travel from one flower to another, they pollinate the plants, resulting in further development of plant species. Many plants rely on pollinators, such as butterflies, for reproduction. Butterflies tend to prefer native plants, and land-scaping with native plants is a more sustainable practice since they are naturally adapted to the climate. The adult butterfly and the larval caterpillar are also good food sources for wildlife, such as birds and lizards.

Some things to consider: Try to grow both plants that caterpillars like to eat and plants that produce nectar for the adult butterflies. Some examples of "caterpillar food" are: parsley, dill, milkweed, and even many common weeds! Some examples of "butterfly food" (nectar) are: butterfly bush, giant hyssop, coneflower, bee balm, black-eyed susan, phlox, and coreopsis. You can find many of these plants in the church's butterfly garden.







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# **Adult Education and Faith Formation**

Why should the kids have all the fun, and get to go back to school? Have you ever wanted to engage in stimulating conversation, faithful fellowship and serious Bible study with a group of like-minded souls (who laugh often and heartily)? Here's your

chance! We have several great opportunities for faith formation for adults too

Sunday Mornings @ 9:30 am — Beginning September 18, we will focus on the book Five Practices of Fruitful Living by Robert Schnase. Join us as we discuss and put into practice these five keys to living and growing in faith. Books will be available for \$12.

Women's Circle Bible Study - Ist Wednesday of the month @ 10:30 am — Starting September 7, the Women's Circle will follow this year's Horizons Bible study, Who Is Jesus? What a Difference a Lens Makes. All women are welcome to attend one or more of these meetings. You don't have to attend every session to get a lot out of the study!

Thursday Mornings @ 10:00 am — Our Thursday morning faith reflection group will be meet on September 8 to discuss possibilities and topics for this year's study. All are welcome!

Almost Christian Conversation Group — This group will focus on Kenda Creasy Dean's book Almost Christian: What the Faith of our Teenagers is Telling the American Church. All parents, grandparents and any interested adults are welcome to join this conversation with our Chip Low and our youth director Stephanie Hare. (see page 9 for more details)

Disciple Bible Studies — This year, we offer 2 opportunities for in-depth Bible study:

**Disciple Fast Track** — Disciple Fast Track is a 24-week study that is described as "Bible study for Busy Lives." The group meets each week, for about 75 minutes. Twelve weeks are devoted to the Hebrew Bible, and 12 weeks to the New Testament. Participants will be asked to read each day,

complete exercises in a workbook, and attend as many of the 24 sessions as you can. Each session includes a short video recap of the previous weeks' work and a brief discussion of the current week's readings.

Disciple 4: Under the Tree of Life — This Bible study is designed for those who have completed Disciple Fast Track and are looking for an in-depth study of specific books. 
focus on the Psalms leads naturally to an emphasis on worship in this study. "




