Easter – Celebrating the Cosmic Sabbath

'Tis the spring of souls today: Christ has burst his prison, and from three days' sleep in death as a sun has risen·

~ from the Easter hymn "Come, Ye Faithful, Raise the Strain"

Finally – spring is here! The ice and snow have melted, the sun is shining and the air is warmer, the birds are singing. It feels like the whole earth is taking a deep breath and re-emerging from its winter slumber. In a similar way, our Lenten Sabbath journey also finally brings us to the joyful celebration of Easter. But what does Easter have to do with Sabbath-keeping?

A little history might be helpful here. In the first centuries of Christianity, many of the earliest believers were Jewish Christians. Since Jesus said that "he came not to abolish the law, but to fulfill it" and most certainly kept the Sabbath himself, these faithful Jews continued to follow the Fourth Commandment and keep the Sabbath on Saturdays. Thanks to Jesus' resurrection from the dead, however, Sunday also became an important day in the week. Early Christians gathered together after work on the first day of the week as well, to worship God, celebrate the Lord's Supper and share a meal and fellowship with one another. Then in 321 C.E., Emperor Constantine declared Christianity the state religion of the Roman Empire and established Sundays as the official day for both rest and worship. Ever since, Christians have both kept Sabbath and celebrated the good news of our faith on Sundays.

However, the connection between Easter and Sabbath is much more than a scheduling issue. For the Jews, Sabbath is the culmination of their week, the day to be renewed in their faith and identity as God's children. Sabbath is a weekly reminder of how God provides for all their needs and gives them strength for the coming week. Sabbath is a preview of life in right relationship with God, one another and all the earth, the culmination of all our hopes and God's plans.

For Christians, the good news of Easter morning takes our Sabbath celebration to the cosmic level. In his death and resurrection, Christ has conquered sin and death and offers new life to us and the whole world. When we gather for worship, when we celebrate the Lord's Supper, when we rest in

God's grace and goodness, we also are renewed in our faith and our identity as God's resurrection people called to proclaim the good news of new life to all the world. Our Easter Sabbath celebration is a foretaste of God's kingdom on earth. As we keep the Sabbath, we look forward to the promise of God's endless Sabbath day and eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

The point of any Lenten discipline is not just to do something different for six weeks and go back to life as usual. It is to deepen our faith and grow closer to God. As you have thought more intentionally about the Sabbath, as you have stopped, rested, embraced and feasted during Lent, how might you continue this life-giving practice beyond Easter? We have gathered a wonderful collection of Sabbath resources in our Church Library – please check them out and use them to continue your Sabbath-keeping and growing in faith. Keeping the Sabbath leads us to be Easter people, people of resurrection and new life.

We hope you will join us for all of our services during Holy Week – Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter – that we can join together in proclaiming the good news: 'Tis the spring of souls today! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!



Ecological Reflection—Celebrate God's Creation! by Connie Knapp



God created humanity in God's own image...and said to them, "Be fertile and multiply; fill the earth and master it. Take care of the fish of the sea, the birds in the sky, and everything crawling on the ground." Then God said, "I now give to you all the plants on the earth that yield seeds and all the trees whose fruit produces its seeds within it. These will be your food. To all wildlife, to all the birds in the sky, and to everything crawling on the ground to everything that breathes—I give all the green grasses for food." And that's what happened. God saw everything he had made: it was supremely good. **Genesis 1:27-31 CEB**

This Lenten season I have been acutely aware of nature, particularly the plants of the earth. Our daffodils are very confused; they started to form buds and now they are under over a foot of snow! And I wonder how our farmers are handling all of this. God said "I now give you all the plants on the earth...and the trees..." and God could have added, "and I give you warm weather in February and snow in March...deal with it!" The farmers at my CSA, Roxbury Farm, let us know that "It is spring in the greenhouse! Onions and kale are up. More seeds going into trays. Just a few more months until we get to eat from our fields again."

I don't have a greenhouse, and during the winter I can forget my connection to God's creation. I'm not in the garden the way I am in the other three seasons; we're not eating the vegetables that come from our CSA. We're mostly eating food from the freezer, vegetables from last year's bounty, as we wait for the growing season to start.

And so we have our own "death and resurrection" going on. Our garden is basically "dead." Oh I know that there are micro-organisms in the soil, working their "magic" as they prepare for spring. But when I look out all I see is white—our raised beds are covered. Just as in Lent, I look for signs of hope and resurrection. I see the beginnings of crocuses, and my spirit lifts. Winter might soon be over.

According to the Catholic Encyclopedia, the Teutonic word Lent originally meant no more than the spring season. The word also has connections to Old German, and might even refer to the lengthening of days as the vernal equinox approaches. The Latin name for the fast is Quadragesima, derived from the Sunday which was the fortieth day before Easter.

Lent will soon be over. Even as we look at the snow blanketing our gardens, we know that the promise of spring is around the corner, the hope of Easter awaits. Make time to notice the miracle of God's creation. The Common English Bible tells us that "God saw everything that he had made; it was supremely good." Not just good, supremely good.

This Lent let us all find new ways to "take care of the fish of the sea, the birds in the sky, and everything crawling on the ground."

Saint Francis of Assisi said it so well at the end of his famous prayer - "As much as we give - that much we are given.....I die to myself...at last I am living!"



New in the Church Library

Forget the blizzard of March, think spring! Two new books in the church library can help.

On April 23 we will dedicate our labyrinth. Get a head start with **Walking the Labyrinth;** *a Spiritual and Practical Guide* by Sally Welch (254 W). In addition to general background information on labyrinths their construction, chapter 5 "Using a Labyrinth" has suggestions for both individual and group experiences, and there are several sample liturgies for Advent and Lent at the end of the volume.

Ways to Help Save the Earth; How You and Your Church can Make a Difference (261.8 B). Author Rebecca Barnes outlines fifty ways in which we can help fight global warming, making the connection between stewardship of the earth and living one's faith. Each idea includes specific suggestions (sun-baked brownies anyone?) for us as both individuals and members of a faith community. (A related title, already in the library, is *Green Faith; Mobilizing God's People to Save the Earth*, by Fletcher Harper [261.8 F].)

Beth Herrinton-Hodge reminds us that:

We can tell our children that even Jesus experienced death and burial, but death was not the end for Jesus. Neither is death the end for us, for Jesus promises to welcome us to a life beyond any wonderful thing we can know. This is our hope forever and ever. ...

The brightness and joy of Easter morning stand as an antidote to the solemn passion of Holy Week. The reality of life is that sadness, pain, and disappointment exist. All children, as well as adults, have experienced these emotions on some level in their lives. Easter morning and Jesus' resurrection stand in our faith tradition as ringing affirmations that there is good. God is good. Light shines and darkness cannot overcome it (John 1:5)!*




Adult Education Commission
