Hear ye! Hear ye! It's time to get excited about Summer Mission trips!

The Mission Commission has two very exciting opportunities that we want to tell you about, so come to an informational meeting at noon on January 22nd!

July 15 - 22, we'll be sending a group to Maryland for a week to work with The Center, a ministry of the Presbytery of Baltimore. We will be partnered with the First Presbyterian Church of Annapolis to work on a summer literacy program for 2nd graders from under-served communities. We will also spend time with staff of the Center to reflect on shared experiences through the lenses of Christian faith and social change. This trip is open to adults and youth who are entering 10th grade and up (rising 9th graders may also participate if a parent or guardian is also going on the trip).


And July 29 - August 6 marks our return to the Dominican Republic with Bridges to Community. This year, we'll travel to the village of Caimonial to work in partnership with the community to repair houses. Bridges works to empower communities adversely affected by poverty, deforestation, and high emigration rates on agricultural, health, education and youth programs, helping residents to make their communities better places to live and thrive. This trip is open to adults and youth who are entering 11th grade and up.

**If you're thinking about the DR trip, be sure to check your passport and make sure that it is valid through the end of 2017!



Adult Education Commission





New in the Church Library:



David Brooks, a columnist for the New York Times Op Ed page, has recently mused as much about philosophy as politics. In his latest book, *The Road to Character* (170 B), he asserts that our market-driven society rewards outer success at the expense of the inner soul. He challenges us to rebalance the scales between our "resume virtues" – achieving wealth, fame, and stature – and our "eulogy virtues" that exist at the core of our being: kindness, bravery, honesty, and especially humility. The central chapters are profiles of exemplary figures from history, such as Dorothy Day, George Eliot, and Saint Augustine. The book ends with his "humility code," specific guidelines for gaining maturity and wisdom – surely something we can all benefit from!

The song above was specifically written for a children's choir and is based on Scripture from Luke 15:3-7 in which Jesus illustrates God's love for each one of us with a story about a shepherd who has lost one small sheep out of his herd of ninety-nine sheep. Interestingly, it comes from a time when Jesus was talking with tax collectors and other notorious sinners! This particular group of people were outcasts in their society and were therefore often drawn to Jesus, the teacher and healer, to listen to him teach about God's Kingdom. Funny, isn't it?! There were probably no children there at all at the time!!

We all know Jesus used parables regularly and often when he taught. He used this method to encourage and

And, as we all know, the greatest truths are really very simple actually. Simple enough for chil-

dren to understand. And funny enough, children often understand these truths more quickly and easily than we adults.

What Jesus taught – over and over- are two simple truths: The fatherhood of God as the Creator of all AND the brotherhood of all mankind. That means each and everyone of us! We are all part of this brotherhood and sisterhood – not just the special people, not just the rich and famous ones, not just the popular or attractive ones – EVERYBODY! In God's eyes we each count – we each have equal worth – we are each loved and cherished by God. What follows then, no matter what we call ourselves

or what religious or political, racial, financial or other orientation you come from, ... what follows then is to obey Jesus' command that we love one another as He has loved each one of us.

Naturally, loving everybody is not easy to do. It takes a decision, a change in perspective, a radical paradigm shift, a bolt of lightning or a dream like our friend "Scrooge" had on Christmas Eve. Whatever it takes, it is something we are each invited by God to do, asked by God to do and commanded by God to do. The only choice we have is to decide WHEN we do it.

The Deacons at our Church have been overwhelmed this past December with the outpouring of support for their ministries – we had the most wonderful events this past month in which we demonstrated our genuine love for each one of God's children through our many activities. We had the early December giving Sunday in which you gave gifts and offerings for distribution throughout our church community and nearby areas.

Carl Anderson reported that 860 toys were distributed to 122 client families including 400 children. Many stores and organizations in the area chipped in donuts, bagels and cookies which were served during the celebration and distribution.

Heidi Haring brought dozens of age appropriate gifts and toys to the Bedford Prison so the mothers incarcerated there could have something to give to their children when they came to see them for their holiday visits. The donations were greatly appreciated by these Moms who would otherwise not have anything to give their children for Christmas.

Our lovely "Knit Together" ladies knitted beautiful hats and mittens all year for the "Hat & Mitten Tree." Several hundred more hats, scarves and mittens were made and donated by other church members AND also some very



special non-member friends who live in the area and support our church pantry each year. These items were to be joyfully given to and accepted by our food pantry clients. This year, however, a snowfall of many inches greatly affected attendance at the Food Pantry right before Christmas. Attendance by clients and volunteers was much lower than usual. Bud Coccodrilli and his team had to scramble to find storage for dozens and dozens of fresh hams that will now be given away early in January instead along with all the beautiful hats, scarves and mittens.

Our scribe, Terri Froehlich, sends out dozens and dozens of greeting cards to the sick, the shut- ins and otherwise hurting members and friends of our congregation. Terri does this not only for Christmas but throughout the year.

We are thankful for all of the loving work of our Deacons. We are also thank you all for caring. We ask you to keep caring and demonstrating your love by making donations to our Deacons' Fund. We count on your money. We need your support. Our community needs your support. We can't do it without you. Please use the offering envelope in your offering box, our on-line giving, or just a plain envelope marked "Deacons Fund" to make your gift and help us out. Our church is a beacon of light in a sometimes dark and confused world. Our Love for God and all of his Children shines brightly and is like an enormous lighthouse shining and lighting the way for others to come and find that they, too, are part of God's family and worthy of His love. We are always looking and longing to find lost sheep. Help us show them that "The God who made all things, it's true, loves each one including YOU."
