# Celebrating the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation and What It Means for Us Today

As I mentioned in my sermon on Sunday (10/1), there is no doubt in my mind that FPCY enjoys a good party, and we have much to celebrate this fall!

During the month of October, we will celebrate the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation. On October 31, 1517, Roman Catholic monk Martin Luther nailed his 95 theses (or topics for conversation and critique) to the castle church door in Wittenberg, Germany. This watershed moment ushered in an era of social and political change that resulted in the creation of many new Christian church traditions, including the Reformed Tradition from which we Presbyterians are descended.

The motto of our Reformed branch of the Christian family tree is *Once Reformed, Always Reforming*, which points to our commitment to following God's vision and call for our lives. This means that we are continually open to how God wants to form and re-form us, both as individuals and as a faith community. Our Reformation celebration invites us not only to look back, but to look to our present and future and ask, "What is God doing in our midst today? How is God continually re-forming us into more faithful disciples of Jesus Christ and a more faithful church community dedicated to following God's vision for us and the world?"

## There are many opportunities to join in our Reformation party:

- Join us for worship each Sunday as we reflect on essential beliefs of our Reformed Christian faith – the Five Solas in the graphic above.
- Join the Sunday morning (9:30 am) or Sunday evening (6:00 pm) adult education discussion groups where we will be looking at the Protestant Reformation(s) and what it all means for us today.
- Participate in a conversation with our Ministry Development team. The MDT has been tasked by the Session to lead a discernment



process at FPCY to determine future directions and next steps for our ministry and mission together (see letter on next page). In addition to meeting with specific groups within the congregation, two congregation-wide opportunities for discussion will take place on Sunday, October 29 and November 5 after the 10:45 worship service. Lunch and child care will be provided. Please RSVP to Lisa Flanagan in the Office (lisa@fpcyorktown.org) if you would like to attend.

Throughout the fall, we will also be celebrating our congregation's generosity as we consider what it means to be faithful stewards of God's gifts and blessings to us. Our stewardship theme this fall is **Grace & Gratitude**, and we will be highlighting the many ways in which we have experienced God's grace through our ministry and mission together. We will also be invited to respond in gratitude through the giving of our time, talent and treasure.

All of this celebration will lead us right up to Advent and Christmas, when we celebrate God's greatest gift of all, God's love and grace in human form, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Friend. As a faith community, this is what all of our ministry and mission point to – the good news of God's redeeming love and grace poured out for us and for this world God loves.

Come and join the celebration! It's time to party! See you in church,

Dear Congregation,

This fall marks the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation, which we will celebrate in numerous ways in our life and worship together as a church. The motto of our Reformed branch of the Christian family tree is "once reformed, always reforming." This means that we are continually open to how God wants to form and re-form us, both as individuals and as a faith community, and we are committed to following God's vision and call to faithful discipleship.

With this Reformation theme in mind, what does God want to do next in and through us? What is waiting to be born in our life and ministry together? These questions have been guiding the Ministry Development Team since January when it was created by the Session. The purpose of the team is to lead a discernment process at FPCY to determine the next steps for our ministry as we listen to the many ways God has touched our lives already and worked through us to connect with the world.

A bit of history: Our church and its ministry have been growing. Three years ago, we began running out of space on Sunday mornings for our Sunday school classes and study groups. At the same time, the number of Bible studies and discussion groups has grown during the week. Over the past four years, our youth ministry has been re-visioned and is well underway with a new plan to build a sustainable program that more fully integrates youth and their families into the life of the church. Our Food Pantry has shifted to a full-choice model of food distribution as a way to more fully recognize and honor the dignity of the people who receive food. Our mission and service opportunities continue to grow through Noontime Meal, Midnight Run, and both local and international mission trips. Our love of food and our work on food-related ministries has developed in new ways in concert with our Green Faith certification process.

All of this energy, activity and growth has challenged us to re-evaluate our ministry, our space and our resources. In 2016, a Building Space Audit Team ("the space cadets") reviewed, recommended and realigned our space. However, this audit also led to bigger questions and concerns about not only our facility, but more importantly, our vision for the future of our church and where God may be leading us next.

From all of this, two priorities have emerged as the focus of the discernment for the Ministry Development Team: Faith Formation and Food Justice. There could certainly be more, but these two capture the energy we see in the church right now. The Ministry Development Team is meeting with commissions, committees, and gatherings of people to reflect on the breadth of our ministry around these two priorities and what could be next. The MDT will offer two congregation-wide opportunities to join in this conversation on Sunday, October 29 and November 5 at 12:15 pm right after the second service. Lunch and child care will be provided. Our belief is that together we can discern what God is saying and what is waiting to be born in our ministry.

We are in a great place as a church. God has been generous, and we have been faithful. We have a wonderful and important opportunity to build on the gifts and blessings of God in our life together. We hope you will join in both small group and all-church conversations to help us discern how to move forward into God's vision for our church.




Future units for grades Pre-school through 4th include the Burning Bush, the Good Samaritan, and Doubting Thomas – we are looking forward to making music that goes with



### **History Corner**



PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, YORKTOWN, WESTCHESTER COUNTY, N. Y SOCIETY FOUNDED 1730.

REVOLUTIONARY MONUMENT ERECTED 1900 BY STATE OF NEW YORK.

Historical Perspective from 1876 (From a Historical Sermon by Rev. William J. Cumming, August 6, 1876)

The church antedates the Declaration of Independence by nearly half a century. When it was organized no one then thought of a separation from the mother-country, nor had it then entered into the minds even of the most visionary the astounding changes a century would make. At this time the population of this entire county, outside of a few of the large towns in the southeast corner, was not more than one-fourth of that of Peekskill today. The country was sparsely settled. Many, perhaps most, of these hills were covered with forests. These roads were but bridle-paths. The saddle, which has since been superseded by the wagon, was then in vogue. The main road was called King's Highway" and what is now known as Crompond Street was styled "Kingston Street".


Then there was but one Synod in the entire American Presbyterian Church, while now they number 37; and four Presbyteries, while now there are 175 in the northern church alone. The General Assembly, with which we have become familiar by its annual sessions, did not exist until sixty years later.

In 2017, there are 16 synods and 170 Presbyteries in the Presbyterian Church (USA)

The Yorktown Church has passed through all the periods of both church and state. It was born in colonial times, it passed through the fiery trial of the Revolution, and has remained to witness and rejoice in the 100th anniversary of our national birth. It lived under royal governors and it has enjoyed the beneficent rule of the republic. It began its existence when the divine right of kings was an established dogma, and it has lived to see accepted in profession, even by the tyrannical Sultan of Turkey, the fundamental principal of our national government, that rulers derive their authority from the consent of the people.


It was born in the slow-coach days of the sailing vessel and the saddle, and it has seen these give way to the wagon, the steamer and the railroad. At its birth there was going on in the American Presbyterian Church a conflict between the Old and New sides, which culminated in the Division of 1741....

The Church was the pioneer church in this region. There was no church of any denomination to the Hudson River on the west. The Bedford Church was the nearest neighbor on the east. The parish embraced Cortlandt, Yorktown, Somers and the lower portion of Putnam County.... A number of residents of Peekskill were members of this church. The Van Corltands who lived at the manor house north of this village attended service here. The people who resided near Red Mills made this their church home. Yorktown has, we may say, two children—The First Church of Peekskill and that of Red Mills.




