

Would you like to learn more about the farmworkers about whom Richard Witt spoke on Sunday, November 11?

Rural and Migrant Ministries has published their stories (http://ruralmigrantministry.org/en/justice-farmworkers-campaign). These are the testimonies of several men and women who labor on the farms in our state, yet are excluded from the protection of our laws. New York State farmworkers still lack the rights to a day of rest, overtime pay and the right to bargain collectively – which means they are powerless to ask their employers for what they deserve – equal rights and dignity.

Here are a few excerpts from their stories.

From "Anonymous":

"I am a worker and I want to omit my name. I am 62 years old and I work in an ornamental plant farm. My job is to plant and prepare the delivery orders. Normally my work starts at 7 in the morning. I have to leave my house at 6:15 in the morning to arrive at my work. They give me half an hour to eat for my lunch. Regularly in the season I leave at 6 and I arrive at my house at 6:45. I do not receive any overtime pay. I work regularly 60 hours per week. I do not receive any insurance nor compensation, the only thing the farm has is a doctor in case of emergency."

From Olivia:

In the summer I start at 7am seven days a week. I don't rest, not even on holidays. Not one day of rest when my kids were on vacation. I don't receive overtime pay for working more than 40 hours. I do not receive medical insurance and if I get hurt at work I have to take care of myself.

There are many more stories, including ones of sexual harassment, refusal to treat serious injuries from accidents, and extreme working conditions. There is also information on how, if you wish, you can contact your state representatives to ask them to support the Farmworker Fair Labor Practices Act.

Deck the halls..... with mounds of discarded wrapping paper..... NO, NO, NO! Let's not!

How about this year we make a sincere effort to "go green"? Let's recycle. Here are some ideas.

- I'll start off with an oldie but a goodie. Separately wrap the bottom and top of a box. It may use more paper initially but the box can be used over and over.
- The easiest and most popular alternative to wrapping paper is purchased gift bags. These can be reused many times.
- Often my take out orders from restaurants are placed in little plain brown shopping bags. They almost always remain clean. These can be used as gift bags. If one wants to get fancy, cut up one or more old Christmas cards and attach them to the bag with tape, glue or a staple.
- Ever done on-line shopping and find that your order of three items comes in three separate boxes? Ever ask yourself -"What will I do with all these boxes?" I KNOW. Use them as gift boxes. Decorate them with old greeting cards or colorful pages from magazines or draw on them.
- Fabric can also make a nice gift wrap. Buy some material with a holiday motif, (or use what you may already have), gather it around the gift and then tie it off with ribbon or yarn. Like the gift bags, the cloth can be used over and over.
- Instead of throwing away old calendars, reuse pages as gift wrap.
- Want to be ultra-conservative? Don't wrap the gift but cover the eyes of the recipient, place gift in hand, then uncover eyes.

Hoping some or all of these will become useful and perhaps inspire you on to your own creative wrapping ideas.

Let's Talk About Aluminum

Have you ever wondered about the life of a soda can? More than likely you have not. For some time now, Fellowship Hall has been home to recycle bins in an effort for our church to become more "green."



The benefits of recycling aluminum cans, (besides receiving spare change from the machine at your local supermarket) include helping the environment by saving energy, time and natural resources. Producing an entirely new can from virgin material is a heavy burden on all of the above.

More than 100 billion aluminum cans are sold in the United States each year, but less than half are recycled. A similar number of aluminum cans in other countries are also incinerated or sent to landfills.

Fun Facts:

- There is no limit to how many times aluminum can be recycled
- Aluminum cans are 100 percent recyclable.
- The energy saved by recycling one aluminum can is enough to power a television set for three hours. Recycling one pound of aluminum (33 cans) saves about 7 kilowatt-hours of electricity. With the energy it takes to make just one new aluminum can, you can make 20 recycled aluminum cans.

Not So Fun Facts:

- Globally, the aluminum industry annually emits millions of tons of greenhouse gases such as carbon dioxide, which contributes to global warming.
- Aluminum smelting also produces sulfur oxide and nitrogen oxide, two toxic gases that are key elements in smog and acid rain.
- The energy to replace one can, which has been tossed into the trash, is enough to keep a 100-watt incandescent light bulb burning for five hours or to power the average laptop computer for 11 hours, according to the Container Recycling Institute
- In the US alone, if all of the trashed aluminum cans were recycled instead, the electricity saved could power 1.3 million American homes.

This is just aluminum (aluminum foil and pans can be recycled as well; they just need to be rinsed thoroughly)! Plastic is a whole other issue, which we can save for another article.

Let's all make a difference, not only in our church, but also in our homes and the community!

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Deacons' Corner

Loaves & Fishes

The Deacons operate a "Loaves & Fishes" ministry, which brings home-made meals to folks who have just returned home after a hospitalization or a rehab stay, for instance, and who would have difficulty buying food and preparing meals on their own. We have a list of people who are willing to do this, and the Deacons always welcome additional people willing to participate. This way the church has a broader base of volunteers to work from. Members of our congregation come from Yorktown and other communities, and it is helpful to coordinate the meal providers with persons who live nearby. If you'd like to add your name to the list, contact any Deacon, send a note to the office, or sign-up on our website.



Deacon Sue Nelson, who leads our "Loaves & Fishes" program, has answered a few questions you may have about how it works.

Who is eligible to receive this service? Members and friends of our congregation.

Does "Loaves & Fishes" provide a whole meal? Yes, entree, side/salad, dessert; cooked and delivered.

Can a family receive meals more than once a day? No, only dinner is provided.

How long can a family continue to receive meals? Some people need meals for a day or two, while others appreciate a meal for a longer period of time.

What do you find most rewarding about this program? Since this is a "hands-on" ministry, we find that those who provide a meal to others in their time of need feel blessed that they had the opportunity to help.

The gifts given and the matching funds cover about 50% of the Food Pantry Operating Budget each year.

DID YOU KNOW? So far in 2018 the Deacons Ministry has only received \$5,000.00 in Individual contributions, putting our 2019 Operating Budget in jeopardy. At this rate we will lose out on \$5,000.00 of the matching funds.


Sunday School "Chalkboard"




Hello Sunday School families! Well, we blinked our eyes and it's been more than three months since the school year began. Our theme is "We Are All God's a Part of Family."


