Come to Bethlehem and see
Him whose birth the angels sing;
Come adore on bended knee
Christ, the Lord, the new born King!

Welcome to the season of Advent, the four weeks of preparation for the second biggest celebration of the Christian year, the nativity of the Christ child. (Bonus points: do you know what the biggest one is?)

One of my favorite parts of decorating for Christmas is putting up the nativity scene in our house. Actually, I like to collect nativities, so we have quite a few to



unpack and arrange each year. Some of them are very small – just the three figures Mary, Joseph and baby Jesus. Others include a whole cast of angels, shepherd, magi and animals. We have nativity scenes from Israel, Kenya, Peru and several other countries. Some are tiny, some are ornaments to hang on the tree, and some take up a whole bookshelf. It's amazing how many different ways people have envisioned this holy scene!

This year our theme for Advent is *Living the Nativity*. Most of us are familiar with a living nativity, a reenactment of the Christmas story using live people and animals. Our children put on a live nativity every year during the Christmas Pageant. If you've ever seen the Radio City Christmas show, you've seen one of the most extensive living nativities complete with townspeople and camels.

The very first nativity scene was a living nativity created by Saint Francis of Assisi in 1223 in Greccio, Italy. As Larry Peacock explains in his Advent devotional book *The Living Nativity*, "Francis wanted everyone to see, in their own time and place, what the love of God looks like and the extent to which God would bend to restore human dignity."

Isn't that what we're supposed to be about here too, as people of faith, as a church, especially during this season of Advent? To help everyone see, in their own time or place, what the love of God looks like and the extent to which God will bend down toward us to restore to us, not just our dignity, but our healing, wholeness and hope for the world and the future? What might it mean for us to "live the nativity," make the nativity come to life in our own lives? How can we show the world what God's love looks like? How do we bring the good news of Christ's coming to life today, in our lives and in our world? This is our hope and challenge this Advent season.

As we begin our Advent journey and travel towards Bethlehem, as we gather at the manger on Christmas Eve, as we follow the star to Epiphany, let's not just put up the nativity. Let's live the nativity and share the Good News of Christ's coming with the whole world.

Recent Mission Commission Activities

On Saturday October 26th, an Interfaith Celebration was held at the Garden of Hope. Tami Seidel was among the Christian, Jewish, Muslim, and Buddhist religious leaders who led the service. The event also featured a speech from Heidi Haring and musical accompaniment by members of our bell choir. Working together with several other organizations in our community, garden workers raised over 3000 pounds of

vegetables and distributed them to our Food Pantry and others in our area. Please contact Heidi Haring if you'd like to be involved in our garden effort next year.

On November 9th and 10th, the Mission Commission and the Faith Formation Commission co-sponsored a special

Peace & Justice weekend visit from Rev. Donald Gaffney, a Sandy Hook alumnus and author of the book Common Ground: Talking about Gun Violence in America. On Saturday evening, Rev. Gaffney led a community discussion entitled "Searching for Common Ground: Christian Perspectives on Gun Violence". The 90-minute event offered a respectful, balanced treatment of gun control and gun rights perspectives. After Rev. Gaffney's presentation, he engaged the audience in a guided, active and constructive discussion that encouraged participants to share and listen to one another's diverse perspectives. The audience included members of our church and other Presbyterian churches in the area, as well as members of Temple Beth Am. On Sunday, Rev. Gaffney preached at both services, led an adult education discussion, and led a sermon for lunch that was attended by over 30 of our congregants. The Mission Commission is now working with the Gun Violence Prevention team to discuss further steps. Please contact Jeff Kephart or Abby Cross for more information.



On November 17th, the Mission Commission sponsored a **Mental Health Awareness Day**. We plan to continue our work in this important area and are planning a Faith4Life study in the spring. 




As 2019 comes to a close, we wish all of our Sunday School families a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year!

Hey Sports fans, I know it's December, but I wanted to share some thoughts about what I witnessed this year in baseball, other than one of the best seasons for Houston I've ever seen in my life.

When baseball season begins, so does the singing season for Americans. People will stand during the seventh-inning stretch and belt "Take Me Out to the Ballgame." They will feel the pleasure of singing a bouncy, easy song with thousands of other fans while holding a hot dog and a beverage that costs somewhere between \$80-\$100. Despite the financial investment, they will be cheered by the sunny lyrics, even if their team is down (look at Detroit). They will lose themselves in a bond stretching around the stadium, a few minutes of carefree unity.

And when the season's over, that's it until next spring.

It's no secret in this church, but adults need the outlet of singing (check out a karaoke bar sometime), but as civic engagement declined, our store of true folk songs evaporated. You can blame all the usual causes for withering "social capital," from dependence on electronic entertainment, to reduced free time. Personally, I feel the elevation of American Idol, The Voice, and America's Got Talent have really stabbed into our outlook of singing – emphasizing talent, unique stories, and the choice of famous people over others.


Let's say a dozen people gather in a park and they all know the words to classics like "The Battle Hymn of the Republic," "This Land is Your Land," and "Down By the Riverside". Would they want to sing? Or would a combination of self-consciousness on the one hand, and diverging ethnic, political and religious backgrounds on the other, prevent them from sharing in all three tunes? Stadium singing succeeds because of numbers, because the songs are fun and uncontroversial, but also because those participating aren't shackled by their own worries of self-doubt. Belting at baseball games is an

example of something essential and no one there is worried about whether they're good enough.

That's a wonderful feeling—that's what I think we need to restore in our community—not necessarily this church. The sense that: I'm good enough. I'm a happy amateur singer. I'm just going to let it out."

If you know someone in your life that needs the outlet, please invite them to be a part of our huge music ministry. It's a great way for those who aren't sure of where God is in their life to be involved, feel welcomed, and build our community. Let's take them out to the ballgame.



Actually, do we say Happy Advent? December I is the first Sunday in Advent, so get those Advent calendars out! We'd love to have you join us for one (or more!) of these studies. And if you are interested in the materials but not able to join us you can purchase any of these books in the office. They are on a display cart with the price list-you can pay online or see Lisa in the office.









Starting Sunday December 1 at 9:30 AM, Tuesday December 3 and Thursday December 5 at 10:00 AM we'll be reading Light of the World: A Beginner's Guide to Advent, by Amy-Jill Levine. This four week study by University Professor of New Testament and Jewish Studies at Vanderbilt Divinity School (yes, you read that correctly!) includes a DVD. The four weeks are: 1) The Meaning of Memory, 2) The

Promise of Potential, 3) The Journey to Joy, and 4) The Gifts of the Gentiles. Each session will be led by a member of the Faith4Life Planning team. Join us for one, two, three or all four sessions (even if you have to come late, or leave early, or can only "drop in," we'd love to see you!)

We will be revisiting **Painting the Stars** Sunday evenings from 6 to 7:30 PM in January and February. This seven-session thought provoking study looks at "evolutionary Christian spirituality." Plan to join us even if you have discussed these videos before. We will have a full 90 minute session that will give us room for rich discussion.

The first Wednesday of each month the Women's Circle meets from 10:30 until noon, following the Presbyterian Women's curriculum, Love Carved in Stone: A Fresh Look at the Ten Commandments.

The Men's Breakfast with Chip Low will be held at 7:30 on Saturday December 21, 2019 and Saturday January 18, 2020.

New in the Church Library

In Tokens of Trust (230 W) Rowan Williams, Archbishop of Canterbury, uses the Apostles and Nicene Creeds as the scaffold for reintroducing us to our Christian faith. He reminds us that the word "belief" has nothing to do with mental assent to a proposition or emotional agreement with a cause. The root of the word means "to have faith in." This means that "Christianity depends on trusting the God it talks about before it asks you to sign up for a complete system." Williams helps us understand that in the resurrected Christ the universe is recreated and we now have something we can depend on.


