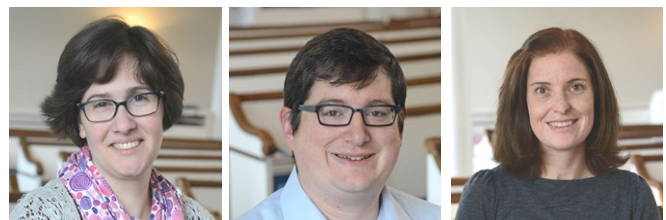

He has experience in bridging and connecting church and community, he feels a true calling to worship music, and is passionate about working with youth and children. In addition to his past church job, he was also the Choral Director at Old Saybrook Middle School.

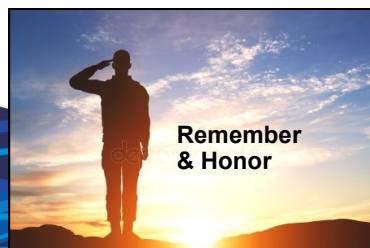

**Easter Offering** - Did you know that Easter is a season that continues through Pentecost? For that reason, we decided that our Easter Offering will be collected through the entire Easter Season. This special collection is in support of our Mission Trip this summer to send a team of volunteers to build a house alongside a family in La Guama, Dominican Republic. We are so close to reaching our fundraising goal that will support our Mission Trip team on their journey to provide a family with safe, secure, healthy housing. Thank you to everyone who has joined in this effort together already!

La Guama is a community of roughly 1,500 people; more than 60% of the community members live in poverty. 40 families in the community live in homes that are extremely unsafe: most have dirt floors, rotting wood walls and collapsing roofs. A solid new house will drastically improve the health, safety, and dignity of a family as well as boosting morale and pride for the community.

## The Plastic Bag Ban

New York's ban, which begins next March, will forbid stores to provide customers with single-use plastic bags, which are non-biodegradable and have been blamed for everything from causing gruesome wildlife deaths to thwarting recycling efforts.

The biggest problem of the single use plastic bags is TRASH. American shoppers use more than 100 billion lightweight polyethylene plastic bags each year, and only a small portion are ever recycled. Most recycling centers can't deal with them — they just clog up the machinery — and so the majority of plastic bags end up in landfills, where they can take up to 1,000 years to degrade.

The bigger problem arises when people don't dispose of their bags properly, and the plastic ends up fluttering around in the wild, clogging up waterways and threatening wildlife.

But paper bags aren't a perfect solution either. (The new law allows, but does not require, municipalities to charge a fee for each use of a paper bag, with the fee going to environmental efforts. This is why many environmentalists were unhappy with the law as written). It takes A LOT of energy to create a paper bag-- much more than to create a thin plastic bag. Unless you're reusing your paper bags a lot, they look like a poorer option from a global warming standpoint.

Reusable bags are an obvious improvement, but if you're going to opt for a reusable bag for environmental reasons, make sure you actually reuse it — often. It takes energy, and there is environmental impact from creating, reusable bags-- ironically, particularly cotton ones because of the water, pesticides, and fertilizers used.

What you PUT in your bag matters even more. A pound of beef bought at the supermarket will have roughly 25 times the global warming impact as the disposable plastic bag it's carried in. So if you're looking for ways to slim down your personal carbon footprint, taking a closer look at your dietary choices isn't a bad place to start.

By the way, the town of New Castle (which includes Chappaqua and Millwood) here in Westchester County banned plastic bags in 2017, and requires a fee for paper bags. Connie Knapp, who shops in Millwood reports that "It's been working really well. When DeCicco's opened in Millwood they gave out reusable bags on their first day. They also have a big sign reminding people to bring their reusable bags. Most folks seem to remember. Anne and I keep bags in each of our cars. I also know that Chip and Tami, and Stephanie, have shopped at that DeCicco's without reusable bags and have paid (I think happily) the dime that is charged for a paper bag."



Let us return your bottles & cans and all monies collected will be given to support FPCY Mission Trips. Drop empty/clean bottles and cans in the bin at the front entrance or give them to Pat Prauda.

## Adult Education Commission

Did you know that Jesus wrote short stories? Okay, maybe not exactly short stories, but the parables are certainly like short stories. Come join us on Sunday morning as we explore **Short Stories by Jesus**, by Amy-Jill Levine. Each week we'll watch a ten to fifteen minute video of Amy-Jill Levine talking about a specific parable or set of parables. We'll discuss the lost sheep, the lost coin, the lost son; the Good Samaritan; the pearl of great price; the mustard seed; the laborers in the vineyard, and the widow and the judge.

Levine tells us that parables are like poetry—they are challenging, and they need to be interpreted. Join us as we listen to the parables as those first Jewish Christians heard them. The sessions will be led by members of the Adult Ed Planning Team.

On Thursday mornings at 10 we're exploring the Apostles' Creed using Adam Hamilton's book, **Creed: What Christians Believe and Why**. This is a repeat of our Sunday morning Lenten series, and a great chance to either study with a different group of people or study it for the first time. This series is being led by Connie Knapp.

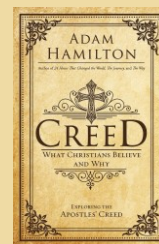
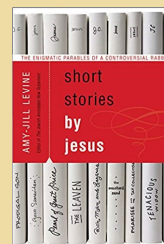
Tuesday morning at 10 Tami Seidel is leading a discussion of **Race in a Post-Obama America: The Church Responds** edited by David Maxwell. This is a great follow up to **Waking Up White**, by Debby Irving, that many of us read.

And a study of The Book of Confessions helps us really understand what “once reformed, always reforming” really means. Let Connie know if this is a topic that interests you (it sure interests her!)

Do you have an idea for a study? Is there something you always wanted to know more about but didn't know who to ask? We'd love to hear from you!

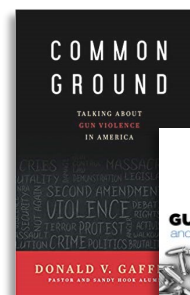

## New in the Church Library:

Two new books in the Church Library examine the urgent topic of gun violence. *Common Ground; Talking About Gun Violence in America* (261.8 G) by pastor Donald V. Gaffney, takes a Biblical perspective. In addition to discussing our current culture of gun ownership, he has an illuminating chapter on violence in the Bible, and how we as Christians we can reflect on and discuss guns and gun violence. The title of the second book will get your attention: *Gundamentalism and Where it is Taking America* (261.8 A). The author, retired Presbyterian minister James E. Atwood, reviews research about the proliferation of gun ownership and the increasing power of the gun lobby, as opposed to our right to live in “domestic tranquility.” To move beyond the talking points and rhetoric that dominate gun violence discussions, both books include questions to encourage self-examination, exploration, and evaluation of potential solutions to this pressing issue.

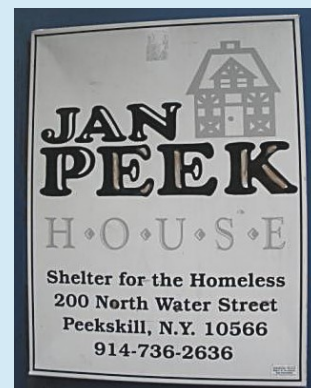
