- Transformational Mission

These pillars frame the way we view our ministry and mission, as well as we understand our building as a gift to us and the community. They invite us to stay focused on impacting lives with the good news of Jesus Christ and joining God's work in the world. I look forward to the ways we can live into these priorities as our building goes through its changes, and as we do the same.

Thank you for your faithfulness through the construction and the transition it represents. You are giving faithfully to the ministry we share, and lives are being changed. You are being flexible as we have to adjust to blocked-off entrances, maintenance vehicles, room changes, and so much more. The construction itself is a spiritual practice.

And, thank you to our Campaign Project Management Team for their leadership of our campaign goals. Their help has empowered our commissions to take action on the many new things we said we would do as a church.

- 33 units (including POWER RED donations) were collected
- 99 lives potentially impacted

Thanks to all the donors and to all involved in this life-saving mission. According to the Red Cross, Since the FPCY began hosting drives in 2016 we've collected 138 units of blood which means up to 414 lives have been saved!

Midnight Run—November 8

One of our commission projects for many years has been the Midnight Run in New York City. This is an organization that was started by people who once lived on the streets to address the needs of those currently living on the streets for whatever reason; often because shelters are dangerous and housing expensive. Midnight Run participants include churches, colleges, and other civic or business groups who carry out weekly Runs. The Midnight Run organization provides some large vans and they communicate with those living on the streets to provide the list of stops made by each Run.

We are told by Jesus to reach out to those on the fringes, to feed and clothe them and to let them know they are cared for; that they are also God's beloved — a great reason to get involved in the Midnight Run project. This also helps us grow in our faith and humanity. The people we serve have physical needs for clothing, food, etc., but often a greater need to be treated as fellow human beings. We strive to share God's love with whomever needs it and we learn from those who can teach us about life from their point of view.

There are many tasks that need to be done. So that you can think about which task would fit into your schedule, here are some ideas of what is available to do:

- driving the vans
- going on the actual Run
- buying underwear, socks, toiletries, etc.
- putting together lunches,
- sorting clothing donations for the Run,
- helping to make soup before the Run
- kitchen clean-up the day after the Run

If you want someone to partner with to make lunches or to cook soup to make it more fun or to get to know your fellow members better, just let us know. We hope that you will consider helping to support this valuable ministry that your Mission team provides for you. THANKS!

For now: start saving clean used warm jackets, sweaters, jeans, sweat pants, clean shoes— sneakers, long sleeved knit tops, t-shirts (no dress pants or dress shirts, please). We can also use a few women's coats, pants and sweaters. Look for sales on new socks, men's underwear sizes med, Ig and x-large, and long underwear in the same sizes. We will need lots of these.

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Pictures from the Dominican Republic Mission Trip





"Let us practice the fine art of making every work a priestly ministration. Let us believe that God is in all our simple deeds and learn to find Him there."

~ A. W. Tozer, "The Pursuit of God"

The past few months have been a huge change for me. The strongest physical manifestation of change has been moving from one house to another. You're all aware of the trials, tribulations, and intoxicating smell of all-purpose cleaner with lots of dust. I've moved 3 times in the past 4 years and I always bring the same boxes I never open, the same knick knacks that never see the light of day, and even end up accumulating more as I go through life. This year I finally cleaned up my act and went through my library of books as I moved

and I came across two old, still bookmarked gifts from former churches: The Pursuit of God by A.W. Tozer and Discipling Music Ministry: Twenty-first Century Directions by Calvin M. Johansson.

I wanted to reflect on the latter for a moment; Johansson deals with many of the core issues of music and worship we face and leads readers to examine our assumptions about the role of music in worship. The basic premise is that a primary function of music in worship should be that it helps to form us into ever more mature, spiritual disciples.

There are so many things music can offer in our lives, unfortunately I find a substantial amount of gatekeeping in this musical world I surround myself in. What would it look like if our discipling of others was less an act of technique-teaching, and more an act of "turning up the music"? What if it were less about mastering, and more about being mastered? What if our focus was on captivating and enthralling would-be disciples with the music of God's surpassing love for us in Christ? My father is a sailor and a good musician in his own right. He often equated life or playing music to sailing, and there are plenty of things needing to be done when sailing. You have to stay attentive, you can't just sit back and do nothing, and even the most relaxing parts consist of measured rests. Despite your knowledge and organization, there are two things you cannot control on a sailboat, and they make all the difference in the world: the tide and the wind. Why is it, then, that so much of our discipling amounts to sitting people down in a boat and telling them to make it move by blowing into the sail? It shouldn't be a surprise to us if many budding followers of music and Christ bail out, get burned out, or never make it out of the shallows.

Well...Ahoy, Mateys, this is your captain speaking, and I can't run this ship alone. I'm so glad to be a part of this church and have really high hopes about what we can achieve together. The music room is coming together, and I've brought all of my musical instruments for a variety of music making.

Our Choir and Bell Choir starts rehearsing September 5th and now's the time to come sing. We're starting a "Come and See, Come and Sing, Let your Spirits Ring" initiative for those who are brand new to bells and choir, or are looking to get back into it; where you can come and observe our rehearsal to see what it is we do, and then participate if the spirit moves you.

If you have any questions, you can come to my office and sign-up for a one on one meeting with me. Attached to the music room door is a weekly schedule of my availability – I really encourage everyone to do this, regardless if you're interested in being a part of these groups regularly or not.

Let music entice you to become a more well-rounded disciple. Let it show you how to fail and guide you to success. Let it connect you with others and open doors of opportunity you didn't know were there. The tide is coming in, the wind is changing, and it's time for you to sail.

The Men's Breakfast group will meet on the third Saturday of each month beginning September 21 at 7:30am.







New in the Church Library

In Chosen? Reading the Bible amid the Israeli-Palestinian Conflict (221.6 B), prolific Biblical scholar Walter Brueggemann explores the questions many Christians raise about this timely topic. Are modern Israeli citizens the descendants of the Israelites in the Bible whom God called chosen? Was the promise of land to Moses permanent and irrevocable? What about others living in the promised land? How should we read the Bible in light of the modern situation? Who are the Zionists, and what do they say? In four brief chapters, Brueggemann explores what the Bible says that can contribute to the discussion. A question-and-answer section, glossary of terms, study guide, and guidelines for respectful dialogue are also included.

Although complex and difficult, Brueggemann asserts that "the conflict is only 'seemingly' beyond solution, because all historical-political problems have solutions if there is enough courage, honesty, and steadfastness."

Peace for the Earth: From the Bible to the Front Lines: A Report from the Presbyterians for Earth Care Conference

I attended the Presbyterians for Earth Care (PEC) conference at Stony Point from August 6-9, along with other members of the HRP Green Partnership of our Presbytery.

What a wonderful conference it was! And I say that proudly, as I was our representative on the planning committee, working with Dennis Testerman and Bruce Gillete, the moderator and vice moderator of PEC.

Over 140 of us met over the three days to hear talks, participate in workshops, and, for the early risers, kayak on the Hudson or join the farmers at the Stony Point farm.

The plenary sessions each morning by William Brown of Columbia Seminary were nothing short of spectacular. Using the Psalms and the book of Job, Bill took us from lamenting the species that have gone extinct to celebrating the diversity of life in the deep. I'll never look at the book of Job the same way again.

Sarah Henkel, Erin Moore, Margery Rossi and I led a "Healing Our Sacred Sites" walk from Stony Point to the Hudson River, celebrating the transformation of the Stony Point Presbyterian Church into the Sweet Water Cultural Center, a place of worship for the Ramapough-Lenape on whose land it rests and at the same time remembering the devastation wrought by Hurricane Sandy to the Ba-Mar Mobile Home community.

I moderated a panel that included Kathy Dean, the chair of HRP Green. The panel was entitled "Cultivating Congregational and Presbytery Teams Committed to Earth Care Action" and included Rick Person, the Midwest Regional Representative for PEC and Jessica Maudlin, the PC(USA) support for Earth Care congregations. Rick discussed teams at the congregational level, Kathy discussed Presbytery-wide activities and Jessica outlined support available at the denominational level.


Margery Rossi and her son Luke Rossi-Torres attended three sessions that certified them as Blessed Tomorrow Ambassadors. Blessed Tomorrow is an interfaith coalition working on stewardship of the earth, and a partner with PEC.

I attended a discussion led by Jessica Maudlin, wearing her "hat" as the Presbyterian Hunger Program Associate for Sustainable Living and Earth Care, on "Embracing God's Economy," and a session led by Andrew Kang-Bartlett, the national associate for the Presbyterian Hunger Program, on "Movement Building and Consciousness as if We Were Part of Nature."
