The Disciple



On Father's Day, I shared some of my experiences from my pilgrimage on the Camino Frances, the Way of St. James. I had a powerful experience walking a portion of the Camino, mainly because I walked it as a pilgrim rather than a tourist. Pilgrimage is an ancient spiritual practice. As Arthur Paul Boers writes, "Pilgrimage 'unites belief with action, thinking with doing' and requires that 'the body and its actions express the desires and beliefs of the soul.' Pilgrimage is about integration, body and soul, feet and faith." That's why I walked. My soul needed healing. My faith needed a walk. My feet and my body needed movement. I wanted something more than just getting away. I wanted unity and integration, healing and wholeness, faith and action. So, I went for a walk along the way that tradition says James, one of the twelve disciples, walked to Europe to share the good news of Jesus Christ.

I'm so grateful for the experience of walking this ancient path that people of faith have walked since the tenth century. It slowed me down. It kept me from thinking too far ahead. It opened up my awareness to the beauty of creation. It allowed me to meet other pilgrims, hear their stories and share my own. And, it gave me the space to reflect on my own faith and God's presence in my life. All of that was the integration I wanted to experience in this spiritual practice, something that that daily grind of life doesn't often encourage.

Ultimately, the pilgrimage helped me see something really important again. Outside the town of Pamplona (yes, where the bulls run) on the Camino, I came upon a sign in both Spanish and English that offers an insight that I, and perhaps all of us, need to hear and reflect on

over and over again. "No olvides: siempre estás en camino." Don't forget: You are always on the way. This is a message of hope – that more often than we know or realized, we are all pilgrims traveling through this life with an opportunity to become more and more aware of this life we have, the beauty of creation, our traveling companions and ultimately, that God is our companion on the way of life in Christ.

Where are you going or what are you doing that invites you to be a pilgrim in this life rather than a tourist, to raise your awareness of the path you are on with family and friends, with your faith and God? Traveling to worship on Sundays is an important part of our pilgrimage to meet God and build relationships with people. Walking the labyrinth at our church helps making walking a prayer practice. Setting aside the schedule on the calendar and taking a hike. Doing some yoga or other movement that is intentional. Becoming aware of neighbors and strangers around us and how God is present in them as we travel. Summer opens up some space to try different things that will unite belief with action, thinking with doing so that we aren't just tourists of this life, but pilgrims on a journey.

My hope and prayer for you and for all of us this summer is that you will add the spiritual practice of being a pilgrim to your everyday life as well as any traveling you may do. May life and faith, healing and wholeness, faith and action, be united in you as you move. No olvides: siempre estás en camino.

From July 15 through 21, nineteen FPCY Youth and chaperones will join other youth from the Hudson River Presbytery and head to the campus of Purdue University in West Lafayette, Indiana for the 2019 Presbyterian Youth Triennium. This is a once every three years gathering for high school age youth from the Presbyterian Church (USA) and Cumberland Presbyterian Churches. Keep them in prayer as they travel and enjoy five days of conversation, recreation, learning, worship, and fun!



Then from July 27 through Aug 4, we will send a team of fourteen to build a house for a family in La Guama, a community where 60% of the residents live below the poverty line. We are partnering with Bridges to Community, who builds service learning trips around community-led programming that gives volunteers a chance to live and work side-by-side with the local population through projects that focus on housing, health, and education.

Interested in Local Food Justice? Become a Community Gardener



In mid-April of this year, our Mission Commission started a new initiative whereby we are raising organic produce at the Garden of Hope, located on the property of the Westchester Korean Seventh Day Adventist Church on White Hill Rd., one driveway to the east of the Wilkens farm. We are working two 2×80 foot plots: rows #26 and #8. So far, we have delivered to the First Presbyterian Church of Yorktown Pantry 60 heads of lettuce along with some kale and swiss chard. Later this summer, we expect to harvest beans, peppers, squash, and tomatoes, and other vegetables. Other charitable organizations, including various houses of worship and some scout troops, share the Garden of Hope with us, and we're beginning to forge relationships with them that

are giving us a greater understanding and awareness of the need that exists within our community and of related efforts to address that need. Some may even start contributing their produce to our Pantry.

GET INVOLVED — BECOME A COMMUNITY GARDENER—Three times per week, our rows need to be watered and weeded. On the Thursday or Friday before a Pantry Saturday, we need people to help us do the harvest. And when the tomatoes become a bit bigger, we will need to stake them. To help us organize these various activities, we have created an online signup site. If you are interested in being one of our gardeners, please contact Jeff Kephart at jeffkephart@gmail.com. He will add you to the signup list, and you'll receive a link to our signup site. There, you will see a list of available dates and tasks. Once you sign up for a particular task and date, you'll receive an email confirmation and a reminder email a few days before the date. *Many congregation members have asked for more local Mission opportunities. This is a great opportunity to help those in need, to serve God, and to learn more about food justice needs in our community and (through your work and our publicizing of it) to bring that awareness back to our community.* Children are welcome to participate with adult supervision.

GARDEN HOURS — The garden is accessible throughout the weekdays and weekends, yet garden participants are asked to work around the schedule of the worship services at the adjacent church facility:

Westchester Korean Seventh Day Adventist Church—Saturday Bible Study 10:00 AM, Saturday Worship Service 11:30 AM
Taconic Christian Church—Sunday morning worship service 9:30 AM, followed by bible study groups
Assemblies of God—Sunday evening worship service

If you find yourself parking during a worship service or bible study, please allow the congregants to use the more favorable parking spaces, and engage in quiet gardening activities only. Many volunteers find weekday evenings are ideal for gardening on the way home from work, in the cooler evening conditions, etc.

Deacons' Corner

Summer is here, and many of us are looking forward to taking vacations, relaxing, getting away from it all. While we are away, the work of the church continues, fulfilling the needs of our congregation and helping our neighbors. Read on for updates on a few of the ways the Deacons will be involved, and how you can help/participate.

Food Pantry

Our expanded Food Pantry, "Pantry Plus" is off to a great start in our expanding mission to serve our community. Our Beyond Hunger / Pantry Plus initiative recognizes that necessary household expenses like hygiene products (for all ages, including diapers and incontinence supplies) and school supplies reduce the funds available for nutrition. Your ongoing financial support of Pantry Plus enables all of these ministries. We are also grateful for Item of the Month food donations to fill gaps in our ability to offer balanced food choices to our clients, and for diaper, elder care and school supply donations or coupons.

We have begun the distribution / offering of elder care products (such as Ensure protein drinks and several kinds of incontinence products) to our Pantry clients, as well as to our Beaver Ridge delivery clients. We have also begun providing food and elder care supplies to the Wynwood Oaks facility in Shrub Oak, enabled by partnership with the Senior Nutrition Center in Yorktown and a grant from the Field Hall Foundation.

We continue to enjoy terrific support from the community, in the form of both volunteers and donations. The Postal Carriers drive on May 11 yielded 6 SUV's full of food donations for our Pantry, and many community members have donated elder care and school age supplies for our use. Our diaper ministry continues to make a real difference to families with young children. And on June 8th, we were able to distribute the first produce from the Mission Commission's Community Garden initiative.

School Supplies and Blood Drives

On August 10th & 24th our Food Pantry will distribute school supplies to children. We will be purchasing kits of supplies for the younger grades, and asking the congregation to bring in supplies for older children. Thanks to a very generous donation from Office Max, we presently have enough pens, pencils, highlighters, and one subject notebooks, plus half of the binders and composition notebooks we need. See the chart to the right for our remaining needs.

FPCY will once again host a Blood Drive. This year mark your calendars for August 17th from 10-3! For more information, please get in touch with Deacon Wanda Diaz.

In closing, I'd like to encourage your support for the Deacons Fund. Although we are always glad to accept donations, the Deacons do have a special offering opportunity in August. Teacher reflection, by Liza Placido

Why do I teach cooking?

Well, the children are fun! They are the coolest and cooking with them is very exciting! If you have never seen a three year old crack an egg, or a four year old whisk up some cake mix, (batter everywhere) then you do not know what you are missing! Together we learn to scoop out egg shells bits, see through clouds of flour and wipe away different types of spills, with smiles, giggles and enthusiasm all around.

In the Kitchen we bring Bible stories to life using cookies, pasta, cupcakes, pizza pies, fruit salads, and more. It's all quite amazing. I love to teach cooking!

I registered my own three children for Sunday school when they were two years old, four years old and five years old and I'll tell you this, at that time with them so young, I trusted no one. So I sat for an entire year in the pre-K classroom (like a spy) to "See" what they would be learning. To my surprise and delight I observed two wonderful teachers, Beth Coccodrilli and Debbie Flynn care for them, read to them, play play dough with them and make crafts with them. They were patient, loving and kind to all the children in class, and helped them to share and socialize. My oldest who was in the kindergarten rotation, across the hall, (media, art, moved by the spirit, bible skills or cooking) was also receiving God's love, nurture, and support from dedicated staff. Do you know how I knew that? I sat in those classrooms too!

Beth asked me if I would shepherd the following year which I did, that was easier said than done! I found out, children like to run all over the place. Then the year after that she asked if I would co-teach PreK with Debbie which I did, we became great friends and really enjoyed working with each other.

Now, here I am today teaching cooking. I am not a teacher by profession, I've avoided children (pediatrics) as we say in occupational therapy, throughout my career. I'm neither well versed in bible stories nor comfortable sharing the word God with anyone, let alone a precious child. However, I discovered I had in me a passion for children that I didn't realize existed. I began to consider them all an extension of my own family. Regardless of how insecure I felt, I took the chal-

lenge! I felt responsible to try and teach, care for, be patient with, and treasure each and every child with the words and stories of God, just as those wonderful teachers had done for my own children. I gave it a go! as we say in England and have not looked back since.

Children to me are God's gifts to all of us, each child important, valued, and especially the little ones, completely adorable!

I come to church on Sundays with ingredients and curriculum in hand (curriculum is very easy to follow by the way, in case you are interested) and a willing heart to try my best. We have a cooking team, myself, Barbara Wanamaker, TJ Chin, and our shepherd helpers. Each week is an adventure. I commit it all to the Lord in prayer with hope that what I'm doing will help, in some small way, lay a lifelong faith foundation in the precious little hearts of our church families children.


Interested in joining the ranks of our fabulous Sunday School staff?

A Reflection of Thanks and Challenge, Jean Post Winget, 6/9/19

I'm going to tell you the story of how and why, 32 years ago, this congregation started the Yorktown Presbyterian Preschool, how YPP grew and flourished, and why we are here today to both celebrate and mark the end of this ministry. Then, I am going to offer up a congregational challenge.

During the early and mid-1980's, this church leased classrooms to a private, for-profit preschool. While this had a positive impact on our church budget, the tenant relationship was, to say the least, challenging, and concerns were raised that the preschool's educational approach did not complement our congregation's values and understanding of how to nurture young children and families. These observations were shared among members of the Education and Nurture Commission who began a process of prayerful discussions. They felt that the Holy Spirit was nudging them to do something to address the needs of families with young children. With the approval of Session, a task force was established which began a two-year process of study, research and Biblically-grounded discernment about how we, as a congregation, might better meet the needs of young children and families within our congregation and the community. The task force took field trips to visit nursery schools and day care centers in and around Yorktown, researched the daycare and preschool certification and licensing regulations, took surveys and opinions, and they listened. The outcome was to recommend to Session a new ministry for young children and families through the founding of a parent-cooperative preschool modeled after the Circle School in Croton. This was to be an active part of this church's ministry, and to further reinforce



that, it was to be named the Yorktown Presbyterian Preschool. A cooperative model was chosen to keep the program as affordable as possible for young families and because it was believed that a cooperative model would most clearly welcome and support parents into a wholistic, family-centered early childhood experience. YPP would be a play-based and developmentally appropriate place where a family's faith traditions would be supported and encouraged and freely discussed. A daily prayer would be offered at snack time. Oversight would happen through a Board which was always to be chaired by a church member, with a parent rep from each class and with a church member to match each parent representative, one of whom would be a liaison with the Session through the Education Commission. It was the intention that the church would always maintain the deciding vote on the Board.

In the spring of 1987, the search for a director/teacher began. Connie Stringer was hired, the first Board was established and the very first class of both 3- and 4-year old children was registered for September. In that first class, 4 out of those 7 or 8 children came from this congregation: Christina Gaetani, Drew Lodewick, DJ Keith and Bryce Kaufman. That first board included Carol Gaetani, (chair), Karen Mancke (treasurer), Gail Kaufman (parent member) and me (liaison to the Education Commission).

From the start, YPP earned an excellent reputation as a very happy, child-centered place where play, and not worksheets, were understood to be the basis for learning. There was music and movement and dressing up, learning how to share and to take turns and to "Pass the crackers, please." There were field trips to apple orchards, the library and the dentist. There was hatching of chicks and butterflies and visits from the nature center. Parents or grandparents or special aunts were always welcomed and involved in whatever ways they could be.

Over the years YPP flourished and grew to a point where it would typically have a waiting list for a coveted spot in one of its classes. Local elementary school teachers knew that children coming out of YPP were well prepared for the next steps in their formal education.

But, **times change**. In the past, many of YPP's kids came from this church. The last child from this congregation enrolled at YPP is now 8. It has become increasingly more difficult to find church members interested in or willing to serve on the Board, and currently no one is liaison with the Session. The connections felt and shown by this congregation have grown weak.

Times change. We assume that many young families today are looking for different models of preschool and childcare for their children that better accommodate the realities of working parents with demanding work schedules.

Times change. Our world feels less safe. Sadly, last year seemed to bring out the worst in a few of the parents at the expense of pastoral, staff and leadership time, energy, happiness and money.

Times change. To feel safe, today the doors are always locked and alarmed with cameras rolling. Now YPP is even more separate from the rest of the church.

Times change. Connie Stringer retired as director after 25 years and was succeeded by Lisa Eliasson for 5 years before she moved south. We have been blessed for the last 2 years to have Betsy Alberty as our director and one of the teachers. Betsy is greatly loved and has done an excellent job through some very challenging times. However, changing demographics, the availability of tuition- free universal PreK, and the changing needs of families have resulted in fluctuations in enrollment and budget deficits.

In the end, the YPP Evaluation team and the Session realized that times really have changed, as has the current sustainability of YPP. YPP is running in the red and we, the church, seem no longer to have the passion or interest or investment of willing time and talent for a ministry to young children and their families called Yorktown Presbyterian Preschool. This is why, after much difficult reflection and discernment, and with great sadness, the Session decided that the time has come to close YPP.

However, just because YPP as a ministry of this church is coming to an end doesn't mean that we cannot celebrate the commitment of so many in this church who made YPP a faithful ministry or the positive difference this ministry made in people's lives and in our community. Today we have much to celebrate and give thanks for. Three decades ago, a group of people from this church looked at our community and saw a need. They asked, "How can we minister to young children and their parents?" YPP was this church's answer to that question for over 30 years. What we need to hear God say to us today is "Well done" and to give thanks for this wonderful ministry that has had such a positive impact on many children's and families' lives.



Now, here is our challenge:

As a church we are still called to minister to the needs of young children and families.

Yorktown Presbyterian Preschool may no longer be the answer to the question of "how" we do it. But that doesn't mean we stop looking around our congregation and our community, listening, searching for the next way forward, asking, "Where is the Spirit leading us next? Where is the Spirit leading us now?" Paraphrasing one of this congregation's favorite hymns ("Here I Am, Lord"):

"Here we are, Lord!" How will FPCY, how will WE,

continue to be a church family that reaches out to, commits to, and nurtures young children and families?





YAV Sunday is August 25

On Sunday, August 25, we will commission Young Adult Volunteers of the Presbyterian Church (USA) to a year of service.

YAVs are young adults from 19 to 30 years. They live in intentional Christian community, deepening and developing their faith while serving alongside partners in sites across the United States and around the world. YAVs serve for one academic year, August - July, as they explore God's calling in their lives. Volunteers are placed in community agencies or local churches, with jobs depending on the needs of partners and the skills of the Young Adult Volunteer. YAVs are exposed to some of the hardest problems in the world: poverty, violence and reconciliation, and sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ – while living and reflecting with other volunteers on the meaning and motivation of their Christian faith. All YAVs receive health insurance and student loan repayment is available for qualified applicants. The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), you and your supporting congregation and presbytery, and some placement agencies share funding of this program.

Join us Sunday, August 25 to commission YAVs from across the country. And for those who are eligible, prayerfully consider if God is calling you to a year of service, exploration and discernment.
