# Incarnation: Bringing Jesus Home for Christmas

Sing and rejoice, O daughter Zion! For Io, I will come and dwell in your midst, says the Lord.

~ Zechariah 2:10

This year, "I'll be home for Christmas" is not just a wistful holiday ballad but the reality most of us will be living this holiday season. With the pandemic limiting our travel and holiday festivities, many of us will be home more than usual, possibly on our own and separated from friends and loved ones.

While this may not be what we had hoped for, this Advent invites us to think more intentionally and deeply about the good news of this season – that God came down to earth to dwell with us, to make God's home with us, in the person of Jesus Christ. The official theological term for this good news is Incarnation, which literally means "embodied in flesh or taking on flesh." The Incarnation is the belief that God took on human form in the person of Jesus Christ who was both fully divine and fully human. As some of our Advent and Christmas hymns remind us, one of Jesus' names is Emmanuel, which means "God is with us."

If Christmas is the celebration of God's Incarnation into our world in the birth of Jesus, then Advent is a season of preparation for God's arrival, not just in the manger, but also in our own hearts and homes and lives. How do we prepare and open our hearts, homes and lives to welcome the baby in the manger who is also the Savior of the world?

Here are some ways to prepare this Advent season:

I) Create your own Advent wreath and light the Advent candles along with us in the worship service each Sunday and on Christmas Eve.

2) Read and reflect on the Daily GIFT Advent devotions which will be emailed every morning and will include a scripture reading and a reflection from one of our church families about how they prepare for Christmas and God's arrival in their homes.






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

3) Listen to the **Centered in the Season** podcast which invites us to stop in the midst of our daily routines and busy lives, to take a deep breath and center ourselves in the true meaning of this season. To listen go to: www.facebook.comfpcyorktown

4) Set up a **Jesse tree** in your house, using the devotional guide available from the church office or creating your own. Find some time each day with your family to read the scripture lesson, put the corresponding ornament on the tree, reflect on your own place in God's salvation story, and say a prayer.



5) Read along and join our Faith4Life Advent study of the book **Christmas in the Four Gospel Homes** by Dr. Cynthia Campbell which meets over Zoom on Sunday mornings at 9 am. Books can be ordered online or picked up in the office.



Regardless of who is or isn't coming home this Christmas, we know that God is definitely going to show up because God has already decided to make his home with us and promised to be with us always. This is the good news we celebrate on Christmas Day and all year long. This is the good news we will continue to celebrate "virtually" in this pandemic season and once we are able to gather together again. This the good news we continue to embody through our words and actions, our ministry and mission together as church. Advent Blessings and Merry Christmas!



# Year-End Gifts and Stewardship

As we head into 2021 (and beyond), we ask you to help us finish this year strong by making an end-of-year financial gift to FPCY. In this unprecedented year, the government offers unique benefits to charitable giving. See below for details.

THE CORONAVIRUS AID, RELIEF, AND ECONOMIC SECURITY (CARES) ACT

offers new opportunities to maximize the benefits of your charitable giving, but only in 2020.

They include:

- $\Rightarrow$  Higher charitable deduction limits for cash gifts in the tax year 2020. Donors who itemize may claim a charitable deduction for up to 100% of their adjusted gross income (AGI) for cash gifts.
- ⇒ A suspension of the Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from individual retirement accounts. Individuals over age 72 do not need to take an RMD in 2020.
- ⇒ Continued opportunity for individuals age 70 1/2 or older to make a qualified charitable distribution (QCD). Donors may give as much as \$100,000 directly from an IRA plan to a qualified charity.
- ⇒ A new tax benefit for non-itemizers. Donors who do not itemize may take a one-time adjustment to income of \$300 for cash gifts.

In addition, consider the benefits of making gifts of appreciated property or appreciated securities—such as stocks, bonds, or mutual funds that have increased in value over time—as another tax-efficient way to give. Please talk with your advisors to see what works best for you.

You can make a donation by mailing a check to the church, dropping it off during our "December Giving Drive-By" (see below), or online at www.fpcyorktown.org/giving. Tax deductible gifts for 2020 must be postmarked and/or given before 12/31/20.




# Christmas at Home—in the four Gospel Homes

#### Advent

I love looking in my neighbors' windows during the Christmas season. From my kitchen window I can see the Christmas tree of the neighbors who live behind us. When I was a kid my parents would drive around the neighborhood to see the homes decorated with lights for the holiday.

Perhaps you, too, enjoy seeing how others decorate for the holidays. Join us on Sunday mornings at 9 AM (EST) on Zoom as we "travel" with Cynthia M. Campbell to

the four Gospel homes. From the book's description: "How might a house look for Christmas based on what each Gospel says about it? In *Christmas in the Four Gospel Homes*, beautiful illustrations from architect Kevin Burns reimagine each of the four Gospels as a "house," which the church visits at Christmas. In each section, Cynthia M. Campbell reflects on the distinctive perspective of the birth of Jesus or the incarnation offered by each Gospel."

# **Sunday School**



Over the past few months, our FPCY children have adapted seamlessly to online Sunday School classes meeting over Zoom.

Our children and teachers from Pre-K—4th grade are enjoying the new Shine curriculum.

The kids engage with the stories and look forward to connecting with their friends each week.



There are opportunities to share joys and con-

cerns, sing along to the Doxology, pass the peace, and receive a blessing at the end of every class. Families are encouraged to help their children complete activities that tie in to each weekly lesson.



Our 5th and 6th graders in the Connect class have been Zooming in faithfully every Sunday. They have learned stories from the Old Testament that began with Genesis and the Creation story, to the covenant God made with us. Their teachers are proud of their commitment and active engagement with the lessons and discussions.

The FaithX class of 7th, 8th and 9th graders continues to explore the books of the Old Testament in their study of the Bible. They have learned about the Torah and its importance to us as Christians, and discussed big questions such as "What does it mean when we say that the Bible is 'inspired by God?" The students come to class prepared with their Echo the Story Sketch Journals to help them connect with the texts.

The Youth Groups have been meeting (almost all) virtually throughout the fall. Big thanks to our Middle Schoolers and some of our awesome Sunday School teachers who joined in the fun when we "Zoom-ed" in to bring Chip good wishes and out-of-sync singing virtually on his birthday.

In October, our older Youth gathered in person (masked and distanced) to prepare a meal for the Jan Peek House shelter in Peekskill. Making a transportable meal to feed 40 people is no small task; there were many potatoes peeled, carrots scraped, onions cried over, green beans snipped, and mushrooms chopped. And we found that it takes many hands to slice up a frozen ham.

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# **Pantry Plus**

What a year 2020 has been at Food Pantry, and how grateful we are for the support from the congregation, community, local businesses and most of all our volunteers to enable us to help so many people under such trying conditions.

- ⇒ January through February were normal months, indoor shopping at the choice pantry, 90 families on average per pantry.
- ⇒ Then the pandemic, with restrictions and job losses, hit. We shifted back to pre-packed bags and a drive by outdoor model.
- $\Rightarrow$  By April we needed to expand our hours to keep the queue of cars from spilling out onto route 132.
- ⇒ Feeding Westchester has been our lifeline for food supply, augmented by shopping at Acme and Restaurant Depot for missing items.
- ⇒ Feeding Westchester has not charged for bulk foods since April, a policy that has saved us at least \$12,000.
- $\Rightarrow$  At the peak in May through July we were helping more than 250 families per pantry.

With your help and the dedication of our stalwart volunteers we never missed a beat at the pantry or in our deliveries to the elderly.



We are gearing up for our largest pantries of the year for Thanksgiving and Christmas. Many thanks to Wilkens Farm and the Pratt family for donating pies for thanksgiving, and to Elaine Sinecore for introducing us to Restaurant Depot. Most of all we thank the congregation for your donations, your support and your encouragement. Thank you so much!

As in past years, if you would like to give to the pantry as a gift for someone else, we have new pantry cards available that include a description of the pantry's ministry and can be printed at home.

And for December, the item of the month is cake/brownie/dessert mix, to help our clients celebrate the season.



# A note of thanksgiving and the advent of our foundation

It's been just over a year since I have been welcomed to FPCY as the director of music ministry. After reflecting on our worship themes over the past months, re-watching the sermons, listening to the weaving and nuances of how to practice being a neighbor, I have truly wondered what it means to be a part of this church.

Every day I see and hear people practicing exactly what it means to them and sharing their own perspective and experiences to build a stronger faith community.

While I am no preacher and often have difficulty expressing

my thoughts in the moment, I am thankful for this opportunity to write down and visualize my faith. Having no idea what "The Disciple" was, I seized an opportunity to speak on behalf of our music program and to share the love I have for this terrifying art we all consume and indulge (much like a thanksgiving meal).

Recently, we as a congregation have participated in a wonderful tool called the "CAT" (congregational assessment tool), allowing us to observe our starting points, strengths, and growth areas as a church. Naturally, I was interested in the worship and music questions and was shocked to see a lack of questions regarding it.

There's the old trope that church musicians are typically regarded as those who sustain the church by providing musical services. This view has them responsible for creating fellowship and good feeling in the congregation - dispensing services that keep everybody happy, entertained, and wearing a shiny badge of honor that our music is "good". First, let me say, no, I don't think we perpetuate this idea, but the implication of musical consumerism is one we should openly discuss.

It can be difficult to try to meet what are often competing demands: some people want gospel piano hymns, some want organ symphonies, some want chorales, still others don't want to sing at all and expect the choir to do it. There are those who want the choir to sing 16th-century motets and others want it to sing contemporary tunes. The musician is supposed to meet all those requests. The musician is usually not expected, however, to think, make judgments, ask questions or have a dialogue with anybody. The congregation wants the musician simply to satisfy its wants, no matter how contradictory and confusing those may be. Defined this way, the life of a church musician can be interesting. Musicians in this situation not only sense that something is wrong at the heart of things, but that they can never do anything right. They do not know what to plan and practice, or what demands to heed. They receive no direction except for the worst sort of consumerism.

Underneath all this is the church musicians' relationship with parishioners and with God. Here is where I can practice my gratitude and have a conversation with all of you about the function of music beyond performance, concerts, uplifting hymns, and dedicate my life to the art of being human.

While I long for the day we can be together, I give thanks that we can still provide live music with real people singing the word of God. As the gift of Christ was given to us, we can give the gift of music,

because we operate within a community of grace that is sustained by God. I am free to take risks, to "fail" and "succeed," because sustenance is not our concern; faith is. That means knowing the big story, knowing the people's stories and their capacities, and then serving them with care. The practical life of the church musician is the outcome of a vocation -- a calling -- that serves God and the people of God with God's unique gift of music.




#### From Marianna~

For the third year we are also knitting scarves for a 4th grade class in the Bronx that a friend of mine teaches. They are children of very modest means and we wanted to help to keep them warm in the winter. Anyone interested in knitting or crocheting, we can always use extra hands.

From our Mental Health Initiative (MHI) Team — Ten years ago the Presbyterian Church (USA) started an initiative called "Comfort My People" to encourage congregations to talk more openly about mental health. The Deacons and Mission Commission in response to this, has formed a mental health and wellness team to explore this initiative in our church. The team includes elders, deacons and other members of our congregation. The team has been working to gather resources for talking about mental health and wellness with family and friends as well as a ministry of our church. We have received a grant from the Presbyterian Church (USA) that will help strengthen our ministry to one another and our community in the area of mental health and wellness including reducing potential stigma associated with mental health challenges, helping families and care givers,

encouraging open communication, and ensuring that everyone feels welcome and a part of our congregational community. In the next few months the congregation will be asked to participate in a survey to assess the mental health and wellness needs of our congregation, and our community including those we serve. Based on input from the congregation, next steps in the process will be determined, aimed at strengthening our mental health and wellness ministry and our ability to support one another as a community of faith.



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
# Campaign Project Management Team and Operations Commission Update






# History Corner

As we continue to make improvements to our church for the present and future, here is an excerpt from an Historical Sermon from Pastor W. J. Cumming in 1876...

The sixth pastor was the Rev. Robert G. Thompson. During his pastorate the present church edifice was erected. "When I became pastor of the church", he writes, "the old house of worship was still standing. It was an exceedingly old and unsightly object. Just enough of yellow ochre was visible to show that it had once been painted. The architecture, pulpit and seats were all in the old New England style without paint and of the most common workmanship and material. It was felt that a new & more modern building was a necessity to the comfort and prosperity of the congregation. The old one had answered its day, and though hallowed in the memory of the old members, it must now give way to another, more in accordance with modern ideas of taste and convenience. The work was undertaken in the spring of 1839 and the new edifice was dedicated to the worship of God on January 9, 1840."

# Deck the halls...with mounds of soon to be discarded wrapping paper... NO, NO, NO! Let's not!


Here are some greener ideas.

- Separately wrap the bottom and top of a box. It may use more paper initially but the box can be used over and over.
- The easiest and most popular alternative to wrapping paper is reusable purchased gift bags.
- Often take-out orders from restaurants are placed in plain brown shopping bags. If they arrive without grease/food marks you can use them as gift bags. Use as-is or decorate them with cut up sections of old Christmas cards—or let the kids/grandkids color them.
- With online shopping at an all-time high, chances are you have shipping boxes that you can use as gift boxes. Decorate them with old greeting cards or colorful pages from magazines or draw on them.
- Fabric can also make a nice gift wrap. Buy some material with a holiday motif, (or use what you may already have), gather it around the gift and then tie it off with ribbon or yarn. Like the gift bags, the cloth can be used over and over.
- Instead of throwing away old calendars, reuse pages as gift wrap.
- Don't wrap the gift but cover the eyes of the recipient, place gift in hand, then uncover eyes.

Hoping some or all of these will become useful and perhaps inspire you on to your own creative wrapping ideas.

# MORE HOLIDAY ECO-TIPS


- If you're in the market for a new set of Christmas lights, opt for energy efficient LEDs. They use 90 percent less energy than older, incandescent lights.

# Let There Be Peace on Earth— Jane Amato's Peace Pole

When the New Paltz Regional Chamber of Commerce launched the "*Community* of *Peace*" project, Jane Amato's son encouraged Jane to participate. Artists were invited to submit a "multimedia peace pole" or a "painted (or multimedia) free-standing peace symbol." Select pieces are to be auctioned to fund a community impact art scholarship, to be awarded annually.

Jane's pole was one of 22 poles, 20 peace symbols and three soft sculptures exhibited throughout locations in New Paltz, NY and nearby Gardiner.

The project is subtitled "An artistic study on what brings us together." Jane's beautiful pole was installed in front of Garvan's Restaurant in New Paltz. The picture of Jane and her son doesn't convey the size of the pole-the painted portion of the pole is six feet. The pole itself is eight feet tall.


