

Think of us in this way, as servants of Christ and stewards of God's mysteries.

I Corinthians 4:1

Wow! Did Advent sneak up on us this year or what? We're still thinking about everything else that's been happening this fall, like how we've reopened to in-person and hybrid gatherings and how our work is unfolding in some new and different ways as a result of the pandemic. But, here we are, entering the season of Advent, the season of waiting and preparation for the revelation of God's good news. Only, we aren't waiting as if Christmas hasn't come yet. We are waiting as if there is more to discover about what we mean when we say that God became one of us. We are entering in new ways into the mysteries of God's ways in the world.

The big church word for God becoming one of us is Incarnation. We use this word in worship and liturgy regularly, and especially during Advent and Christmas, but do we know what it means? In one of our Bible study groups recently, someone asked what incarnation means and people were hard pressed to give an answer. Incarnation seems difficult to define, describe or explain.

Throughout the centuries, the church has given us help in how to think about incarnation theologically, but often from the standpoint of a dogmatic position to hold or as a way to look back at the life of Jesus in historical terms. The trouble with both of those ideas is that they don't really help us live our lives and faith now or shape how we follow the ways of Jesus and view the world into which he came. They make the Incarnation a past event rather than a way of life, something to be understood rather than a mystery in which we live.

So, Tami and I would like to invite you into the mystery of Incarnation. Not simply what happened or how, but what it means to live in this mystery of God becoming one of us, God living among us, God revealing Godself to us in the form of one of us. We don't want to simply think about the past. We want to learn how we are to be stewards of the mysteries of God now. How does the story of God becoming one of us invite us to live in it rather than simply explain it? How does incarnation change the way we think about ourselves, one another, our ministry, and our world?

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Paul wanted the Christians in Corinth to think differently about the incarnation and their lives and ministry also. Before the verse above, he addressed our "human inclination," as he described it, to play favorites and give our allegiance to certain church leaders over others. Paul reminded them that before they belong to any group or ideology, they "are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you." Paul asserts that his primary job, the most important job any leader in the church has, the first priority of Tami, me, the elders and deacons, and Sunday school teachers, our number one job is to help people understand that God didn't simply dwell in people in the past, but continues to dwell in all of us right here and now.

Our work is to help people understand how God's incarnation in Jesus helps us understand God's incarnation in each of us and in our life together and in the world everywhere around us. The mysteries of that are far greater than we can ever fully grasp and the possibilities of experiencing God and hearing God's voice in this life are far more numerous than we are aware. We are called to learn and grow and live in this mystery and even to steward it, to take care of it and share it, so that God's good news of love and grace may be heard and experienced in every corner of this world God loves.

Join us this Advent and Christmas season as we journey into the mystery of the Incarnation and discover anew the wonder, the peace, the presence of God within us, among us, and all around us.

and to conduct any other business which may properly come before the meeting.



Proposed amendment to the Bylaws of the First Presbyterian Church of Yorktown Section V. Meetings of the Church:

To be added to the beginning of: Section V. Meetings of the Church

Electronic Meetings of the Church, whether a Special Congregational Meeting, or Annual Meeting of the Congregation, may occur when calling a face-to-face meeting is impractical, or when circumstances to meet face-to-face are inadvisable (e.g., pandemic, dangerous weather conditions, etc.). Electronic meetings may occur in conjunction with face-to-face meetings ("hybrid meetings") when necessary. The Call for Electronic and hybrid meetings shall be the same as for a face-to-face meeting, and must be announced to the Congregation in advance in the same manner as a face-to-face meeting, including what necessary information may be necessary to attend the meeting whether in person or electronically. There shall be no distinction between active members of the Congregation who attend the meeting in person, and those who attend electronically. All decisions of the Congregation, whether they are adopted in a face-to-face meeting, electronic meeting, or hybrid meeting are considered actions of the Congregation.

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Pantry Plus

As the year 2021 comes to a close, the Pantry team would like to thank the congregation for the generous support we have received throughout the year. Your financial support is vital to our operations, as is your contribution of "item of the month" which has enabled us to provide balanced, nutritious food to our clients even when some items are difficult to acquire wholesale.

We continue to see increased need for our pantry services (150 families per pantry compared to 90 pre-pandemic). Our distributions of diapers and elder care supplies, as well as school supplies, are very much appreciated by our clients. Any donation to the "pantry" covers all of these ministries, as well as the winter coat distribution.

The final pantries of the year are December 4th and 18th. Coats, hats and mittens for children will be distributed on December 11th. Your donations of Thanksgiving turkeys on the morning of November 20th helped us to serve an estimated 225 families that morning. The proceeds of the Thanksgiving offering will enable us to provide pork roasts and other special items for our clients' holiday meals.

A special thanks to our volunteers, who have worked indoors on Fridays and outdoors on Saturday for the past 18 months and more. We anticipate continuing with the drive-through model through the winter. If you would like to join our volunteer team, please reach out to Liam McAuliffe, Debbie Bernardini or Katharine Frase.



Finally, if you would like to make a donation to the pantry as a holiday gift, Lisa has donation cards you can print at home or pick up in the office.

Mental Health Ministry Update

Healing and Sharing Fellowship Event – November 8, 2021

Since conducting the first MH101 class on August 26th the FPCY mental health team has continued to discuss ways to explore the impact of mental health challenges among our congregation and the community. Some of the teams efforts include: researching relevant informational pamphlets and books to add to our church library; attendance at local and national forums to network with various faith communities discussing mental health ministries; establish a schedule to conduct MH101 and Companionship training in 2022; explore potential advocacy opportunities; updating our church mental health webpage and creating short reminders in our weekly church bulletin.

On Monday, November 8th, the Mental Health team hosted a fellowship evening of Healing and Sharing. Recognizing that the holiday season can bring on or worsen feelings of anxiety and depression, the evening was designed to provide an opportunity for a deeper spiritual connection. With scripture as our guide we discussed the impact



mental health challenges has had on our lives and how we dealing with these challenges. During this safe and sacred time, individual prayer ribbons were created; seven word prayers were composed; individuals shared concerns; moments of silence allowed prayers for all participants. The group dynamic transitioned from shared individual expression to the creation of a beautiful poem reflecting the transition from pain to healing. The presence of the Holy Spirit led us through this powerful evening.

The Mental Health Team plans to conduct these events throughout the coming year in addition to our planned training programs.

You can also submit your covenant via the mail, in the offering plate, or by dropping it in the secure mailbox on the wall near the church office entrance.

Our Ministry Needs Moving Forward

As you discern your Giving Covenant, we ask you to *prayerfully consider increasing your financial giving in 2022* to help propel our journey forward. As a congregation, we are still living into funding our current staff design, which includes a full-time Caretaker and Director

of Music Ministries, increased hours for our Director of Youth Ministries and the addition of the Streaming Media Manager position. Fully funding our ministry and mission will require a **15% increase** in congregational giving over 2021, and the Stewardship Commission believes that FPCY can meet this challenge!

Would you prayerfully consider increasing your giving by at least 15% and making a Giving Covenant? Giving more will help FPCY responsibly resume and expand our ministry during this ongoing period of transition. We are grateful for your faithful discernment and any and all gifts that you bring to our life together.

Year-End Gifts and Stewardship

As we head into 2022 (and beyond), we ask you to help us finish this year strong by making an end-of-year financial gift to FPCY.

TAX-WISE GIVING IN 2021

If you take the Standard Deduction:

Under the CARES ACT (CORONAVIRUS AID, RELIEF, AND ECONOMIC SECURITY), in 2021, gifts to charities like our church qualify for a "Universal Deduction" above and beyond the existing standard deduction. The limit is \$300 for individuals and \$600 for married couples filing jointly.

So, gather your charitable receipts from this year, because for 2021 you can take a modest charitable deduction in addition to the standard deduction.

If You Itemize:

The CARES ACT increased the previous charitable deduction limit of 60% Adjusted Gross Income to 100%. That means, if you can afford to give away as much as you earn, you can completely offset your income with charitable giving for 2021.

CONSIDER GIFTING PRE-TAX MONEY

If you're over age 70.5, you can give to the church directly from a traditional IRA. Required Minimum Distributions were suspended for 2020 under the CARES ACT, but this year they're back. Failing to withdraw the required minimum can result in fees and penalties. By calling the financial institution that holds your IRA and asking them to send a distribution directly to the church, you won't be liable for income tax on the gift, but the total amount of the gift (up to \$100,000 per year of charitable giving) will count towards your Required Minimum Distribution.

People of all ages can make gifts of stocks, bonds, or mutual funds. When you give appreciated assets directly to the church, no capital gains tax is due. More detailed instructions can be found on our website: https://fpcyorktown.org/giving/stock-giving/

Operations & Campaign Project Management Team (CPMT)

Sometimes it is hard to remember everything that happened in a calendar year. That is certainly true for the Capital Campaign! In 2021, we have:

- ⇒ repaved the parking lots and created handicap spaces in the back
- ⇒ installed lighting in the large parking lot
- ⇒ installed new boilers and heat pumps in the office, gathering space, sanctuary and library
- ⇒ installed door openers on the Gathering Space doors
- ⇒ created a new banner closet (soon to be a full worship storage area) from the coat closet
- ⇒ installed new cameras, lighting, sound equipment and cameras in the Sanctuary
- \Rightarrow begun the renovation of the kitchen
- ⇒ completed the renovation of the preschool rooms (to create a new larger education room and to consolidate food pantry storage) and the new larger youth room
- ⇒ created a youth director office and renovated the office manager and financial/volunteer space in the office

(and as a reminder, the campaign began with solar panels and back entrance work two years ago).

Much of this work has been done by our Caretaker, Jim Gerth, as well as a stalwart team of volunteers (Dick Seymour, Jerry Amato, Bud Coccodrilli, Skip Mahncke and Matt Hager). We are so grateful for their talents and devotion!



The Capital Campaign draws to a close (financially) on December 31, 2021, although our physical work will likely spill into 2022. We still have exciting projects in front of us, particularly to complete the kitchen and the accessibility work throughout the building. We are counting on the fulfillment of outstanding pledges to carry us through the rest of this work... and if our accomplishments have touched your heart, we would of course welcome additional support!







Please note that all our gatherings will be hybrid. You are welcome to join us either in the library, masked, or on Zoom.



It's (almost) time to be planning for Christmas! The church library has several versions of the traditional biblical story, as well as many contemporary stories with varied settings. A few examples:


Journey to Bethlehem by Akiko Kageyama and A Baby is Coming, by Daphna Flegal tell the biblical birth story. Both are beautifully illustrated, and the second book has the text in both English and Spanish.


O Little Town of Bethlehem has the text of the hymn, with illustrations by Patrick T. McRae that picture a family preparing for and experiencing Christmas.


The library also owns titles with Christmas themes in more contemporary settings and experiences. A Northern Nativity by William Kurelek takes place in the dreams of a boy who sees the story unfold in various prairie and Eskimo settings. Four Candles for Simon by Gerda Marie Scheidl describes a shepherd boy looking for his lost lamb and finding it along with a baby in a manger. And most unusual, A Small Miracle by Peter Collington tells a story with no words at all, just a series of illustrations that show a starving old woman being rescued by townspeople after she used her last bit of strength to assemble a vandalized nativity scene in a village church.
