You Are Invited to ...



This summer, our church sent two groups of people on intentional journeys. A group of youth and adults traveled to Montreat, NC for the Montreat Youth Conference which focused on Planting Peace. Another group traveled to Spain to walk a portion of the Camino Frances for eight days from O'Cebreiro to Santiago. At the heart of each of those trips was an invitation, an invitation to grow. Our youth didn't just go to have a good time or hear about planting peace, as if there was just a set of information to gain. They were invited to open themselves up to the growing and becoming people who plant peace. The pilgrims who walked the Camino weren't simply tourists, going to see the sites and take a lot of pictures They were invited to listen for the voice of the divine speaking as they walked in the footsteps of thousands of other pilgrims who have sought God's presence along this path for over 1,100 years. One of the many things we celebrate about both trips is all of the stories the participants came back to tell us about their experiences. They confirmed for us that they not only accepted the invitation of the trips but grew and changed because they did.

We hear a similar invitation in our ministry as we head into the fall. The invitation is a question really: how do we want to grow? Whether they realized it or not, this was the question underlying the trips to Montreat and to Spain. How do we want to grow? Sometimes we are aware of the question and other times we live into it and realize how we have changed in hindsight. Either way, how we want to grow is at the heart of being intentional people of faith and being an intentional community together.

Of course, we could let the many demands and other choices take over our lives and never actually engage the question or our faith or search for God. With the busy-ness of the fall and the return to work and school routines looming, it can be so easy to get caught up in the momentum and go along with whatever others say is important.

But one of the things we love about church is that we are a church that doesn't rest simply on being a church. We are a group of people who are in search of the sacred in our lives and in the world. We are a community who listens deeply for the movement of the Spirit in and among us. We are a church who

responds to God's work here and now, asking what is next for us. At the heart of all of that is our commitment to listen for God's invitation and to respond in faithful ways. Our life together reminds me of a quote by Madeleine L'Engle: "I do not think that I will ever reach a stage when I will say, 'This is what I believe. Finished.' What I believe is alive...and open to growth."

So, how do we want to grow as the new program year kicks off? We don't wait to ask that question until we are already in the midst of everything else or until a new calendar year starts January 1st. We ask it now, as summer winds down, and we can reflect and be intentional about the choices we make moving forward into the fall. We ask it now, as part of our life together and our commitment to be a growing community for one another. We ask it now, as a central question of our participation in church and as people who want to know the presence of God more fully in our daily lives and embody God's good news in the world.

How do we want to grow and how do we want to encourage each other to grow and discover God's presence in the midst of

their lives? Who could we invite to come and join us on this journey of faith into the future?

This newsletter is full of invitations and opportunities to grow in your faith and your relationship with God, one another, and the world. We hope you will join us as we discover God's presence with us through our ministry and mission together!






We are so very grateful to Garrett for his continued dedication and service to our church. Please congratulate him when you see him!


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CELEBRATING GARRETT



Five years ago, FPCY welcomed a dreamer and a visionary with an eye on the future into our ministry. Garrett Artman came to us after an extensive, year-long search to find the church's first-ever Director of Music Ministry. With goals to expand the styles of music included in

worship, to weave music into every aspect of church life, and to offer the congregation opportunities to express their faith through music in any format that inspired them, the search team sorted through dozens of applications. During our search, Garrett impressed us first with his authenticity, his sense of humor, his sense of adventure, and (obviously) his talent. We did not understand then that what we experienced in his interview and audition session with the choir – an inspiring experience for more than thirty choristers – was just the tip of the iceberg.



In the past few years he has shown a dedication to our congregation as music-makers that we could never have dreamed of - offering anyone and everyone opportunities to contribute to the music of our church through the FPCY Orchestra, The "Him" Singers, The Boomwhackers, drum circles, the treble choir, the bell choirs, and solo performances in everything from guitar, to French horn, to the organ (which he fixes himself!). He has helped us reach out to the community through music, inviting local and not-so-local groups to share our space and join us





in our love of music and most recently, launching our "Concerts On The Corner" concert series. Because of Garrett FPCY is a place where music lives not just on Sunday mornings, but every day of the week. We're amazed by his ability to find the perfect music to accompany worship services, especially when he writes it himself! We're blessed and grateful to have him among us.










CELEBRATING GARRETT

SCHOOL'S IN SESSION: CAN YOU HEAR THE SCHOOL BELLS?

As the co-chairs of the Faith Formation Commission, it is our absolute pleasure to be participating in the kick-off of our annual campaign of joy as we prepare for the start of Sunday School on September 15th!

There is a lot of fun and planning behind the scenes to enable Sunday School to happen. When we celebrate the sacrament of Baptism, we, the congregation of this church, promise to support the faith formation of each baptized child. Our Sunday School is a part of our living out of that promise. As a part of this year's kick-off of this joyful fulfillment of promise, we want to share with you excerpts from stories from members of our congregation who were answering one of these questions: "Why I'm a Sunday School teacher" or "Why does my child go to Sunday School."

Jean Post-Winget: When our three children were growing up, I was very actively engaged in Sunday School, both teaching and in various leader-ship roles. I loved it. But, once our children were all Sunday School "graduates", I accepted my own diploma and for the next decades, I considered myself to have completed my duty as I passed the torch to others...Then, three years ago in August, the church was preparing to reopen as an in-person Sunday School following the long COVID shutdown. I found myself agreeing to put my professional background to work in developing the teacher training for the September reopening. During that training meeting, I was introduced to some wonderful, dedicated people whose spirit and enthusiasm were infectious...So, I rather reluctantly agreed to volunteer ..., but said, this is short-term, and I don't want to teach. And now three years later, I'm still there and I do teach. ... I am a very blessed member of a happy and supportive little community that includes wonderfully lovable, joyful children and amazing youth and a very caring group of adults. And, my life has been truly enriched!

Suzy Rishel: About 20 years ago, when my sons were young, my family joined this church. We were encouraged to enroll the boys in Sunday school. Shortly after they started, I was asked to be a Shepherd. This was the easiest job available - no teaching, just walking the kids to their classroom and watching the lesson.... As the years went by, I got more involved - always reluctantly, though. I was terrified to take on any responsibilities.... But for some reason I kept saying yes and found myself pleasantly surprised that I CAN do these things. It's not just about the actual teaching part of it. It's the people - the amazing kids and the other teachers. At first I was motivated by wanting my own children to learn about building their faith, then it was setting a good example about volunteering. Now it's because I am encouraging many children to build their faith and recognizing those teachers who did this for my kids - And because I love doing it.

Alice Chin: I've volunteered for many opportunities to serve within this great church, whether they be deacon, elder, or Sunday School teacher, because I believe our faith is not just something we talk about -- it's something we live out, day by day. We shouldn't just 'talk the talk', we need to 'walk the walk'! Serving as a Sunday School teacher both helped me learn more about God and offered me the privilege of sharing this knowledge with the children.

We live in a world overflowing with information and choices, Tim and I prioritized church because we believe it is important to give our children a strong foundation in faith. We want them to have an unwavering sense that they are deeply loved, and equip them with the tools they need to face life's challenges with resilience, strength and fortitude, grounded in God's love and teachings. We hope that reading these excerpts gives you an idea of ways that you might support our children and our faith formation efforts.

NEW IN THE CHURCH LIBRARY

I've sometimes felt there was a gap in the history of Christianity between the resurrection of Jesus and the beginning of organized Christian churches about 200 years later. Now I know there was a great deal going on. **After Jesus; before Christianity, by Erin Verncombe and others** (232 V) is "A historical exploration of the first two centuries of Jesus movements." The authors begin with the death of Jesus and look forward, describing groups that resisted the Roman empire, lived in experimental family and social groups, and relied on oral tradition to preserve Biblical and historical events.

Rabbi Sharon Brous teaches us how to hope on every page of **The Amen Effect; Ancient wisdom to mend our broken hearts and world**. (155.67 B) Through her warmth and wit, she charts a path through the darkness, giving readers a sense of hope, healing, and human connection. With original insights and practical tools, the book translates foundational ideas into simple practices, offering a blueprint for a more meaningful life and a more connected and caring world.

You might have noticed my name at the back of the bulletin: "Connie Knapp, CRE for Educational Ministries" and you may have wondered what I have been doing. Shortly after my commissioning on October 22 I had rotator cuff surgery and was basically "out of commission" (no pun intended) for the next six months. Now that I'm back, I'll be writing a short column in each issue of The Disciple. I thought I'd start by explaining the Presbytery's CRE program.

A CRE, Commissioned Ruling Elder, is a Ruling Elder who has been through an educational program and has been certified ready to receive a commission to "limited pastoral service" by the CRE Committee for a three-year term, renewable at the end of the term. The Book of Order leaves the preparation and training of the CRE in the hands of the Presbytery, requiring that the training include boundary training, sexual misconduct training, and child abuse prevention training, recertified every three years. My preparation has included all of these.

The Hudson River Presbytery requires coursework in the following areas:

- Old Testament
- New Testament
- Reformed Theology
- Reformed Worship and the Sacraments
- Preaching
- Pastoral Care
- Educational Ministry of the Church
- Presbyterian Polity

I began taking courses online at Dubuque Theological Seminary in 2013 and completed the coursework in 2019. I was elected as Moderator-Elect of the Hudson River Presbytery that year and served first as Moderator-Elect, then as Moderator (2020), and finally as Moderator of Council (2021).

Usually, a CRE candidate completes fieldwork under the supervision of a Minister of Word and Sacrament and is commissioned to a church other than her home church. I was encouraged to request waivers based on my service to the Presbytery. Both of my waiver requests were granted and in October 2023 I was commissioned to Educational Ministries here at Yorktown, serving ten volunteer hours a week in this commission.

What will I do as a CRE here? I will continue my work with Faith4Life and our Cross Gen ministry, and preach and lead worship four to six times a year. I also plan to explore other opportunities for intergenerational ministry and help organize events and workshops focused on second-half-of-life issues and concerns.




Sunday Evenings @ 7:00 pm (starting October 6)



Wednesday Evenings at 7:30 pm (Informational Meeting – September 18, Studies start October 2) We would like to offer 2 different options on Wednesday evenings: Disciple Bible Study and possibly The Good News of Faith & Politics or another Bible study option for those who have already completed Disciple.

About Disciple: Have you always wanted to read the Bible but didn't know where to start? Would you like scripture to come alive for you? Would you like to get together with other folks for great conversation and fellowship? Disciple Fast Track: Becoming Disciples through Bible Study is a 24-week study that is described as "Bible study for Busy Lives." The group meets weekly; 12 weeks are devoted to the Hebrew Bible, and 12 weeks to the New Testament. Participants will be asked to read each day, complete exercises in a workbook, and attend as many of the 24 sessions as you can. Each session includes a short video recap of the previous weeks' work and a brief discussion of the current week's readings.

Women's Circle Bible Study – 1st Wednesday/month at 10:30 am (in-person or Zoom) Our study this year is called Let Justice Roll Down: God's Call to Care for Neighbors and All Creation by pastor and Old Testament professor Patricia Tull, with artwork by textile artist Lorraine Roy (attention quilters!). 

HISTORY CORNER - FPCY IN THE 1830'S

The First Presbyterian Church of Yorktown was organized in 1730 by the initial settlers of the area — people who are remembered in the names of our streets and localities. The first meeting house was built in 1738, and was burned by the British during the American Revolution. The second building was constructed in 1783, and was replaced by the current sanctuary in 1838.

The sixth pastor of FPCY was the Rev. Robert G. Thompson, installed as pastor of this church on May 18th 1836. "When I became pastor of the church," he writes, "the old house of worship was still standing. It was an exceedingly old and unsightly object. Just enough yellow ochre was visible to show that it had been painted once. The architecture, pulpit, and seats were all in the old New England style without paint and of the most common workmanship and material. It was felt that a new and more modern building was a necessity to the comfort and prosperity of the congregation. The old one had answered its day, and



though hallowed in the memory of the old members, it must now give way to another more in accordance with modern ideas of taste and convenience." The work was undertaken in the spring of 1839, and the new edifice was dedicated to the worship of God on January 9th, 1840. (picture circa 1910)

Imagine sitting in the pews with no cushions today — those old sermons lasted a long time!



Let's Talk about our Transportation Ministry

Our Church, through its Board of Deacons, offers a referral source for transportation services for our congregation.

Requests for transportation are made by individuals, referrals from the pastors, or via the various ministries of the Board of Deacons.

When we receive a request for transportation, we have a list of willing volunteers who will provide rides to medical appointments, to and from Church for worship and other

church events. A sign-up genius has also been created to facilitate volunteering: https://tinyurl.com/FPCY-drive

Also, rides are sometimes organized without the need for Deacon intervention and can be arranged on an informal, independent basis.

Please note that volunteers who help with transportation are considered friends. In consulting the church's insurance company, the church is not liable for accidents of any nature or incidents "between friends."

However, to ensure the safety of all, the Board of Deacons has developed a thoughtful screening device.

The Deacon coordinating the transportation ministry will screen each request in order to identify any physical disability that may need to be noted. If so, the information is shared with the individual who will be providing the transportation.

We thank all of our volunteers who assist in this ministry, and we always welcome others who would be willing to participate in this important ministry.

The group also knits hats and scarves for our Food Pantry clients for Christmas. The shawls are a reminder of the support and comfort which is wished for all. 
FPCY Bereavement Group


GREEN FAITH
