The Disciple



I didn't know what to expect last July as I sat in the large auditorium at Purdue University with 5,000 youth and adults waiting for the worship service to begin. It was my first time at the Presbyterian Youth Triennium. The service turned out to be lots of fun, engaging, energizing and inspirational. There in that auditorium I saw the word that is our theme word for Advent this year. As the liturgy flashed up on the screen, I saw the word, "Expect." It wasn't made to stand out from the other words on the screen. It just jumped out at me, as if speaking to me about how to approach Advent this year.

As I've looked closer at the word, "expect" really is a great word to describe what we do during Advent. The Latin form of the word means to "look out for," which is definitely an Advent thing to do. Here are some of the dictionary definitions for "expect":

- to regard (something) as likely to happen,
- to regard (someone) as likely to do or be something
- to believe that (someone or something) will arrive soon.

All of those definitions are about Advent. Advent is this time when we believe something is going to happen, someone is likely be something and do something, someone will arrive soon. Advent is expecting God to show up, to become one of us, to be among us, to bring God's good news into the world. And it is certainly a time to renew our belief that not only did God arrive 2,000 years ago, but that God will come again soon.

What do we regard as likely to happen when the presence of God arrives? What will

Emmanuel, God-with-us, do when our long wait is over? How will our lives, our life together and this world be different when the presence of God takes on human form and dwells among us? Those questions help us examine our own expectations of Advent and Christmas so that we live and follow God's mission for the world.

In one of our Advent scripture passages this year (Matthew 11:2-11), a group of people approached lesus after all the miracles and teaching he had done and asked, "Are you the one who is to come, or should we expect someone else?" Another translation asks the same question this way, "Are you the One we have been expecting, or are we still waiting?" The questions invite us to think about what we believe Jesus will do and what he can and continues to do. What do we expect to happen in our lives, in our community, in our nation and world when God shows up? The Bible gives us signs to watch for and even calls us to live those signs of God's presence. God calls us to live not as if Christmas hasn't happened, but as clear examples that God's presence is among us already, shaping who we are, how God intends the world to be and what it means to trust that God will one day come again and finish what was started on the cross and in the empty tomb.

What are we expecting from Jesus this season? What hopes and expectations do we have that Christ's arrival will fulfill and accomplish? As we light the Advent candles each Sunday, we will name our expectations for the coming of the Light into the world and reflect on what God expects from us. We'll celebrate the good

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
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news in the music our choir performs throughout the season. We'll give gifts on Sunday, December 4th to families of those in prison, to people without proper clothes for this winter season and families who do not have gifts to put under the tree. We'll name our brokenness, pain and struggles at the Longest Night Service on December 21 and celebrate the good news

of our lives and this world on Christmas Eve. Then, we'll gather for a Service of Lessons & Carols on Christmas morning at 10:45am and worship on New Year's Day at 10:45am, celebrating the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper both days, as we live into the expectations God's presence brings for this world God loves.

Join us in waiting expectantly this season, expecting God to arrive, looking for the signs of God's presence at work among us and celebrating the Light dawning in new ways through the One who is Emmanuel, God-with-us, our Savior and Lord.

Below you will see the various ways in which you can participate in Giving Sunday. If you are unable to attend services on December 4, you may drop off items in the church office by December 10. We ask you to consider giving to one or more of these efforts.

Food Pantry Cards — Need a gift for someone that has everything? Looking for an alternative to the commercial Christmas gift? Need a hostess gift to take to Thanksgiving dinner or a holiday party? Why not make a donation to our Food Pantry in honor of a friend or

family member? Donations can be made in any amount AND they will be doubled via our matching program with the FPCY Food Pantry Trust! For each donation, you can select a card that you can mail or deliver in--person. Stop by the table in the gathering space after church.

The Hat and Mitten Tree — Have you seen the "Hat and Mitten" Christmas tree in the hallway leading into the sanctuary? The Deacons would like to invite all of you to participate in this project again this year. The hats, scarves, gloves and mittens that you provide (any time prior to Dec. 17) will be distributed during the second Food Pantry in December. Pantry clients will be able to select hats, mittens, scarves or headbands from the Christmas tree for each of their family members before obtaining their grocery items that day. "The Knit-Togethers" do an amazing job each year and contribute over 100 handmade items, but we need your help to be able to have enough to give each of our Pantry clients. It is a joyful event for ALL involved!

Bedford Prison Children's Center — We've been participating in this ministry for more than 25 years. This program helps Moms learn to be better parents and seeks to ease the burden on their children. Moms "buy" and wrap the presents and give them to their kids during holiday visits. Sometimes these are the only presents their kids get.

<u>Suggested items for smaller children include</u>: games, art supplies, building toys, and science toys that Moms can do with their kids; baby dolls (especially dolls of color) and clothing, sports equipment.

<u>Items for teens:</u> gloves, hats, nice scarves, wallets, gift cards, sports equipment, headphones for ipods and phones, art kits, make up kits, and men's grooming kits, etc.

The Prison rejects orange, green, or grey clothing.

Toys for Teens — FPCY runs a Toys for Tots distribution each December. Most of the donations received are for young children (not too surprising given the name). However, many of our food pantry clients and other people in need have older children as well. We are asking the congregation to help us supplement the Toys for Tots program with Toys for Teens — gifts for older children and teens (ages 12-18). These will be distributed on December 10. Some ideas for gifts

For girls: nail polish sets, perfume, handbags, makeup kits, dress scarves.

For boys: cologne, Axe body wash, shave kits, hair gel, model cars.

For both: basketballs, soccer balls, diaries, books, games, CDs, winter scarves, grooming kits, art supplies, gift cards.

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The songs we teach our children in Sunday School and Vacation Bible School never cease to amaze me. They are so simple and yet they contain the greatest truths. How can it be that we adults are capable of writing such beautiful songs for children and yet so easily forget to live out their very messages in our own lives?!

Our so called "modern day" lives seem to be so completely out of control. We are always on the run, always making or missing deadlines, overloaded with emails, junk mail, voice mail, snail mail, texts, "news" and information. We are always trying to catch up, rush, make time, or running out of time. With this last election and all of the emotional turmoil it has produced we are now living in what is being called "The United States of Anxiety." What has happened to us?? and how did we get here??

More importantly, what is the answer? How do we calm down, slow down, find our center, re-group, take stock or

Life seems far from easy – we long for the old days when we could "while away the hours" - I think that is from a song – maybe "The Wizard of Oz" - Ha! Another children's song! These are "the best of times –

the worst of times – the age of wisdom – the age of foolishness" - Dickens, right?

In trying to deal with my own unease and underlying anxiety I recently came across the book, *Fearless*, by Max Lucado. Max talks about the many thing we all fear and dread and how this fear and anxiety sucks the life out of our souls and drains us dry. It's an easy read but a powerful reminder of what we actually can do to reconnect to our Source – our Heavenly Father – the one who loves us, knows us, cares about us and has promised to always be there for us.

In one part of the book, Max talks about tackling our problems or just plain approaching life with what he calls "worrystoppers." And what do you know, #I on his list is.... Pray. Pray First. Don't pace up and down, don't fret and wring your hands, don't join the chorus of complainers. Simply pray. I Peter 5:7 says," Cast all of your cares upon Him. Let God have all your worries and cares, for he is always thinking about you and watching everything that concerns you. "

#2 on Max's "worry-stoppers" list is to Slow Down. "Rest in the Lord and wait patiently for Him. "Psalm 37:7 Let God be enough. Our Heavenly Father knows all your needs. "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and God's righteousness and all

things will be added unto you." Matthew 6:32-33 Lucado has additional "worry-stoppers" you might like to check out as well which — so sorry - I don't have room for hore.

Bottom line: We need NOT fear! Our hope is not in our own strength, not in our own might, not in our own government. Our hope is in God our Father who created us and loves us – who sustains us and redeems us. Let us move forward in these strange times with hope in our hearts, with joy, with eager anticipation, in childlike trust as Jesus instructed us to do. God will help us to see what he is calling us to do – He will show us the way.

There is much Kingdom Building to be done. The Deacons are entering a new period of discernment along with our Session as we consider where God is leading us as a church and the Deacons in their ministry. The Session has recently reviewed and approved our recommendation to move forward and make our Food Pantry a model of "Choice" thereby moving away from the older model we have used in which we hand out pre-packaged bags of groceries to our clients. With this newer "Choice model, clients will be able to make choices about the foods they will select from the shelves much like when we shop in a grocery store. This model will take a great deal of planning, organization, resources and training. We will need volunteers in new and different capacities and the clients will be shown how to proceed on pantry days to pick out foods that are more suitable and appropriate for their family's needs and tastes. Another benefit is that our resources will be optimized, streamlined and there will be less waste of foods that are not desired or appropriate for our clients.

The Deacons look forward to the task at hand and hope to have a whole new system up and running before next summer. We ask all of you for your continued prayers and support as we work to make this new model a reality. We will particularly need volunteers to help us in the following ways:

- to come on alternate Friday afternoons to help unload the Food Bank truck and stack items on the shelves for distribution the following day;
- to come on Saturdays to assist in the flow of traffic in the new Pantry Set-up;
- to prepare meals for "Loaves and Fishes" for members who are home bound after hospitalization or illness;
- to transport members unable to drive to medical tests & appointments, church functions or important errands.

Please contact any one of our Deacons or the church office if you are able to serve in any capacity. We are happy to receive your help. God Bless you all and may you have a blessed and happy Christmas!



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
Adult Education Commission

"Isaiah 9:2-7 is a well-known oracle, a divine utterance given to us, that uses four royal titles in verse 6 – Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. This Advent study will ponder each title and how the people understood it then, how Jesus did or did not fulfill the title, and how Christians interpret Jesus as the representative of that title."



Join us on one, two, or every Sunday morning as we "ponder" together. Books will be available for an \$8 donation.




