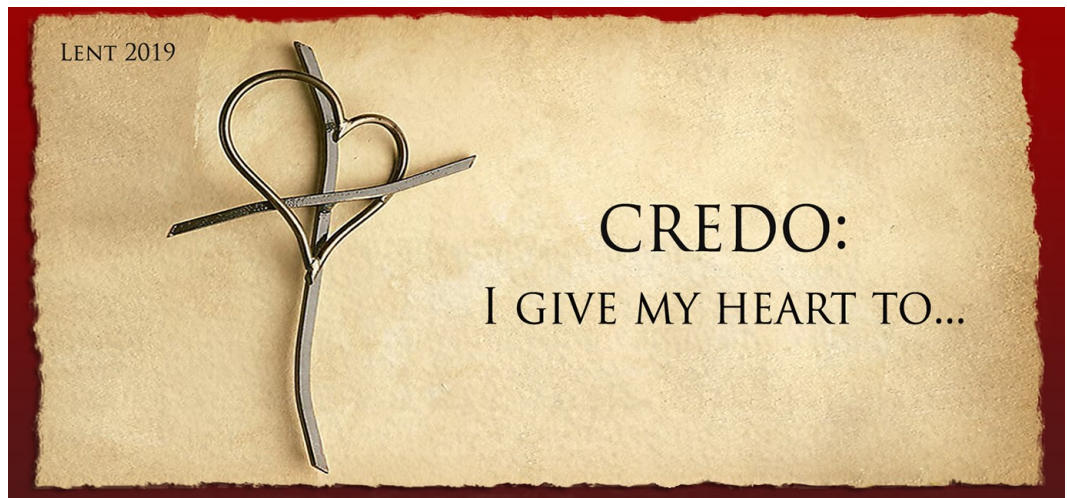

# The Disciple



***"I believe; help my unbelief!"***

**(Mark 9:24)**

Throughout the history of the Christian church, Lent has been a season to focus on our faith, on what we believe as Christians and what difference our belief makes in how we live our lives. In the early church, Lent was a special season of preparation for new Christians to study and learn about the Christian faith, so that they could profess their faith and be baptized on Easter morning, joining their lives to the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. As we prepare to celebrate the good news of Easter this year, we are going to focus on our faith and spend some time reflecting on what it means to say "I believe..."

"I believe" also happens to be the first two words of the Apostles' Creed, one of the earliest statements of faith written and used by the early church. On Easter morning when new believers were asked what they believed, they used the words of the Apostles' Creed to profess their faith before walking into the waters of baptism.

What do we mean when we say, "I believe..."?  
What do we really believe about God, Jesus, the Holy Spirit, and the church?  
What difference does believing make in how we live our lives?

This Lent we will be using the Apostles' Creed to help us think more deeply about our own beliefs and to prepare our hearts anew for the good news of Easter morning. In its original Latin language, the Apostles' Creed begins with the word Credo. Although traditionally translated as "I believe," a more accurate translation is, "I give my heart to..."

Belief is more than an intellectual exercise or theological construct. Belief is about what we give our minds, hearts and spirits to, what we are willing not only to live for, but to die for. Belief is as much about mystery as it is about certainty. Perhaps that is what led the desperate father seeking healing for his son to cry out to Jesus, "I believe! Help my unbelief!" (Mark 9:24).

Join us for a Lenten journey with the Apostles' Creed, as we engage not only our minds, but also our hearts and spirits to more fully understand and commit ourselves to the God we know in Jesus Christ, our Source, our Savior and the Sustainer of our lives.

A large part of our purpose is to provide meaningful projects for our congregation to share God's love, serve the needs of God's people and to help develop our own faith. We provide opportunities for local Mission outreach and also beyond our community.

One of our projects for many years has been the Midnight Run in New York City. For those who don't know, this is an organization that was started by former street people to address the needs of those living on the streets for whatever reason; often because shelters are dangerous and housing expensive. It includes churches, colleges, and other

civic or business groups who carry out weekly Runs. The Midnight Run group provides some large vans and they communicate with those living on the streets to provide the list of stops made by each Run.

A great reason to get involved in the Midnight Run project, no matter which task you choose to do, is that it is a way to follow Jesus, to strengthen your faith and to serve others. We are told by Jesus to reach out to those on the fringes, to feed and clothe them and to let them know they are cared for; that they are also God's beloved. They have physical needs for clothing, food, etc., but often a greater need to be treated as human beings. We strive to share God's love with whomever needs it and we learn from those who can teach us about life from their point of view.

Our Confirmation Class just did a full Run to feed and clothe those experiencing homelessness in NYC. We have always had enthusiastic feedback about experiences with the clients, as well as the satisfaction of filling needs for clothing and food. Our recent Run has returned with some good experiences from our Confirmands and their helpers (see reflection below).

We have been asked by some of our other youth and a few other members to have another Run, perhaps in the Spring, for the rest of the Congregation. We are waiting to hear about our choices of dates in late May and early June. In the meantime, before we commit, we would like to gauge interest so that we have enough help and food & clothing donations, etc. There will be an interest sign up sheet in the Gathering Space after church, if you think you might want to help with this rewarding ministry. There are many tasks that need to be done, so you can think about whatever your own schedule allows. You don't have to decide now as this is just an interest survey, but here are some ideas of what is available to do: driving the vans, going on the actual Run, buying underwear, socks, etc., putting together lunches, sorting clothing donations, making soup, cleaning the kitchen after the Run (usually the next day). If you want to partner with someone to prepare lunches/soup, let us know. It's a great way to get to know & have fun with fellow members. We hope that you will consider helping to support this valuable ministry.

#### **REFLECTION     Midnight Run Friday, February 22, 2019**

It was a blessed night. We handed out all our meals, toiletries, and most of the clothing! Many thanks to our congregation and friends for their generosity! Because of your help, we met the needs of many people experiencing homelessness in NYC!

We made four stops and saw five women and fifty-four men. Our team worked well together! Some handed out your wonderful meals, others poured coffee, ladled soup made by the youth group, and the van crew, found the clothing items needed by our friends on the street, in the filled-to-the-brim-vehicle. Your clothing donations were greatly appreciated! We heard comments like,

"That's a great coat"     "I really needed a hat like that"  
 "a hooded sweatshirt is perfect"     "this soup is delicious"

We also heard a lot of thank yous! You could feel their gratitude!

## Deacons' Corner

I'd like to begin by thanking our outgoing deacons for their service: Judy Chessa, Terri Froehlich, Sue Nelson and Bill Winsted. Judy served 3 years as Moderator. We are sorry to see them go, but glad to add Carol Cornish, Wanda Diaz, Debra Farrell and Ryan O'Hare. Ethan Brown and Daniel Hager are our incoming youth deacons. Our new Moderator is Andy Torres, and our Vice Moderator is Patrick Burns.

Some of you may be wondering what the purpose of a deacon is. The Book of Order calls ordained deacons to a ministry of "compassion, witness, and service, sharing in the redeeming love of Jesus Christ for the poor, the hungry, the sick, the lost, the friendless, the oppressed, those burdened by unjust policies or structures, or anyone in distress" (G-2.0201). Quite a task! At FPC Yorktown, our deacons respond to this call in several ways:

Contact with the Homebound – Our **visitation team**, which includes past and current deacons, visits with church members at their homes, at the hospital, or in nursing homes.



**Transportation** – The deacons provide for or arrange transportation to congregants who may need a ride to church or church-sponsored gatherings such as lunch bunch. We may also be able to accommodate requests for a ride to medical appointments or physical therapy.

**Loaves & Fishes** – We arrange for meals to be brought to members of the congregation who are recovering from surgery or illness, or those struggling with other serious personal problems.

**Card Ministry** – We reach out to various members of our congregation to let them know the church is thinking about them. Recipients include college students, members recovering from surgery or illness, and those who have a special birthday or anniversary coming up.



**Bereavement** – In this capacity, our deacons host receptions for the family after a memorial service for their loved one.

**Blood Drive** – Working with the Red Cross, the deacons hosted a blood drive last August which was highly successful, and we plan to make this an annual event at FPCY.

**Food Pantry** – The Deacons are an integral part of the success of the Food Pantry. In addition to the distribution of food, we have also been active in other areas related to the Food Pantry, such as school supplies, "hat and mitten tree", the diaper ministry and the Toys for Tots program.

If you have not yet helped us with any of these endeavors, but would like to, we invite you to contact us. Many hands make light work, and speaking from experience, I can honestly tell you that serving is a privilege, not a burden. And if you have helped us and would be willing to continue to do so in the coming year, please let us know that too!

### FOOD PANTRY MATCHING GRANT

### Things to know about our online member site:

#### 1.) MyFPCY and REALM are the same!

MyFPCY is the name of our online directory/giving site for members. REALM is the software that runs it. So when you hear one name or the other, they are basically the same!

#### 2.) What is the purpose?

MyFPCY/REALM connects our church administration, giving and community in one place—one that is safely “in the cloud” and accessible from anywhere with a web connection. It allows for better organization of church groups (commission & class notes, Sunday School attendance, etc.), and more.

#### 3.) Why should members create a log-in?

With a log-in, here are just a few things you can do:

1. Update your contact information and picture and control who sees what of your information
2. Access contact info of fellow members
3. Pledge, schedule online giving, review and print your giving statements
4. Send notes/updates to fellow group members
5. Download the REALM Connect app for quick access to your newsfeed (group communication), member contact info and giving

#### 4.) What if I don't want a log-in?

MyFPCY/REALM is where much of our members-only access will take place—including the church directory. While we hope you give it a try, we understand that some will not wish to participate. If that is the case, you can still get information from the weekly bulletin & e-mail, monthly newsletter and church website [www.fpcyorktown.org](http://www.fpcyorktown.org).

If we have your email address, you will also get email notifications from any groups that you are in (you can reply to those notes, but know that your reply will be seen by all in the group as it will be posted on the group's newsfeed). We will be offering assistance as needed for those who are tech-savvy as well as to those that are tech-newbies. So please try it out!

#### CHURCH DIRECTORY—ARE YOU LISTED?

*To make the most of our new online directory, we need your help! By default, all member info was imported as “private”—meaning only staff can see your contact info. In order for our members to connect with one another, we ask that you make at least one contact method (phone or email) public. Think of it like being in a traditional printed directory. If you haven't had a chance to log-into your myFPCY account or you just don't feel tech savvy enough to go it alone, let us make the change for you. Members of our Communications team will be around with a clipboard in the coming weeks. Look for your listing, make changes, highlight what can be shared and initial it showing your permission. Thank you!*



In February, the younger kids have been learning about Mary and Martha, and how their responses differed when Jesus came to visit. ### Registration is now open for Triennium!!!

**What is Presbyterian Youth Triennium?** It is a once every three year gathering for high school age youth from the Presbyterian Church (USA) and Cumberland Presbyterian Churches. It is five days of Conversation, recreation, learning, worship, and fun! Where is it? All over the campus of Purdue University in West Lafayette, Indiana.

**Who can go?** Current 8th through current 12th graders. (18-21 year-olds who are already out of high school can apply to be on the work crew!)

**When is it?** We will be leaving on Monday, July 15 and returning very late on Saturday, July 20 (or really early on Sunday July 21, depending on how you think of it).

**How much does it cost?** Through the generosity of the Hudson River Presbytery, the Synod of the Northeast, and our congregation, the cost to participate in Triennium is \$300 per person. Scholarships are also available.

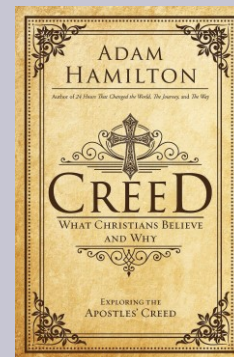

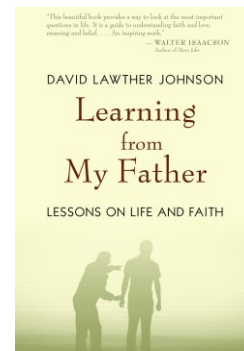

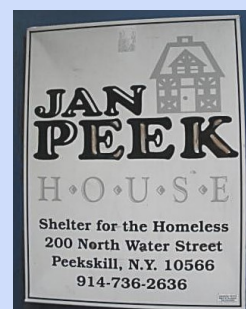


## Jan Peek Meal
